COCKS INTERESTED IN FLAVOR NOW

The Use of Sugar Encourages Art of Seasoning

Old-time cooks remember when most of the day was spent in cooking and baking. Great pride was taken in the amount and variety of hearty food that was prepared.

Today, however, there is a new departure in cookery. Attention is directed to heightening the flavor of simple, wholesome foods rather than changing them with rich sauces and gravies. Strange as it may appear, sugar is an important ingredient in this new seasoning.

In flavoring many vegetables, sugar shows its worth. This is especially true regarding peas and corn, which lose their original sugar content between the time they are picked and cooked. To restore this flavor a dash of sugar to a pinch of salt is a good rule to follow.

Sugar also modifies the flavor of sharp fruits and improves the taste of spinach, carrots and tomatoes. And a dash of sugar to a pinch of salt makes a simple meat stew much more palatable and satisfying.
