COURT REFUSES TO HALT PRIMARY BARRING HEFLIN

MONTGOMERY, Ala., April 17.—The Alabama supreme court today refused to stop the democratic primary of August 12, from which the state committee had excluded as candidates Senator J. Thomas Hefflin and others who failed to support the democratic national ticket in 1928.

The court affirmed the decision of the Jefferson county circuit court denying a writ of mandamus to stop the August 12 democratic primary, as asked by Horace C. Wilkinson, Birmingham attorney, who was a leader of the anti-Smith forces in the 1928 election.

The state democratic executive committee in session here December 16, 1929, voted 27 to 21 to exclude from the primaries as candidates all who failed to support the ticket in 1928, but did not restrict them from participating as voters.

Wilkinson contended the election would be illegal because of the state democratic executive committee's action in fixing different qualifications for voters and candidates. Senator Hefflin has announced he will run in the general election despite the ruling of the state committee.

In addition to Hefflin, Hugh M. Locke, of Birmingham, gubernatorial candidate, who also supported Hoover, was affected by the decision.

COTTAGE GROVE TO ORGANIZE GRANGE

A new grange is being organized at Cottage Grove and will take in a number of the residents of the northern part of Douglas county. A meeting was held last Monday to start arrangements for the proposed grange. Melvin Paul being named master and Mrs. Grace M. Thiel, secretary. Other officers are to be elected at the meeting to be held Monday night, April 21. Cottage Grove once had the largest grange in the state, with a membership of 400. Much interest is being shown and a large attendance is anticipated for next Monday's meeting.

TROUT HIT FLIES ON NORTH UMPQUA

Fishermen are reporting very good conditions on the North Umpqua river, but are not having much luck in the smaller streams. Trout are hitting flies on the North Umpqua, a gray hackle with peacock body being the best lure. A royal coachman is also being used with success. But fishermen are getting good catches on salmon, eggs and worms. The water is reported to be still a little high and milky in the smaller streams, and the fish are apparently settling so much natural food that they are slow to bite artificial lures.

Salmon catches are still being reported. Several good catches have been made around Umpqua and Tyee, as well as at Winchester. Carl Johnson caught a 25-pound chinook this morning at Hulton's grove.
