

POULTRY RAISERS WARNED TO AVOID "FAKE" REMEDIES

10 Diseases Without Known
Cure Cited by Federal
Expert—Nostrums
Being Seized.

Ten diseases of poultry exist, which, so far as is known, do not yield to treatment with drugs or mixtures of drugs. Consequently, the food, drug, and insecticide administration of the U. S. department of agriculture is taking every precaution to keep off the market nostrums claimed to effect cures of these diseases, says Dr. H. E. Moskey, veterinarian of the administration. The administration seizes such nostrums whenever they are discovered in interstate or import commerce.

Doctor Moskey explained this policy as the reason for his recommendation for the seizure at Oakland, California, of drug preparations labeled for chicken cholera and roup. This one shipment intended for wagon distribution would have robbed the western poultry raisers of \$1745 directly and might have been indirectly responsible for considerable loss resulting from improper care of sick birds.

The ten diseases of poultry for which there are no adequate drug treatments are: Typhoid, cholera, coccidiosis, fowl pest, roup, diptheria, chicken pox diarrhea and gapes, and blackhead of turkeys. Some of these can be prevented by proper precautionary methods, but once contracted do not respond to drug treatment. The false sense of security these drug preparations create, says Doctor Moskey, is likely to result in the spread of disease through an entire flock and to delay or prevent the application of suitable scientific methods of control used.

Growers Warned
The food, drug and insecticide administration has removed from the market hundreds of preparations of this nature and has forced the revision of labels on many others so that the purchaser will not be defrauded. New preparations making extravagant claims are constantly appearing. Many are sold locally and never come under the jurisdiction of the federal food and drug act, because they do not enter into interstate commerce. Doctor Moskey warns poultry raisers to beware of such preparations claimed to be a treatment of the diseases mentioned.

Poultry raisers should not place any confidence in claims made for any drug products in circulars or advertisements, advises the veterinarian, when such claims do not appear on the label. In many cases the administration has forced the removal from the label of all objectionable claims, only to have similar, warranted statements appear in advertising over which it has no control.

ELECTRIC BOND AND SHARE CO. MADE BIG PROFITS, CHARGED

WASHINGTON, April 16.—The assertion that the Electric Bond and Share company in 1927 made a 105 per cent profit on supervision fees assessed holding companies under its supervision was made before the federal trade commission today by Judson C. Dickerman, commission accountant.

Dickerman testified that the Electric Bond and Share in 1927 received \$9,353,172 in fees for supervision, engineering, construction and financing.
Those services actually cost only \$4,563,527, giving the company a profit of 105.4 per cent, the witness said.
The federal trade commission has court action pending in an effort to force the Electric Bond to turn over its records to commission accountants.

POSTAGE STAMP OF 1845 WORTH \$10,000

WASHINGTON, April 17.—Old letter files will get a searching scrutiny from philatelists as a result of the discovery of Miss Natalie Sumner Lincoln, editor of the D. A. R. magazine, of a rare stamp tentatively valued at \$10,000.

The stamp, one of a provisional issue by postmasters in 1845, was found by Miss Lincoln on a letter written to her father, Dr. Nathan Smith Lincoln by his uncle, Dr. Nathan Smith, of Baltimore, in 1845. It is a white oblong stick-

er on which is printed in black letters at the top "James M. Buchanan" and beneath it "10 cents." The stamp, one of the few of its kind in existence, is in an excellent state of preservation.
