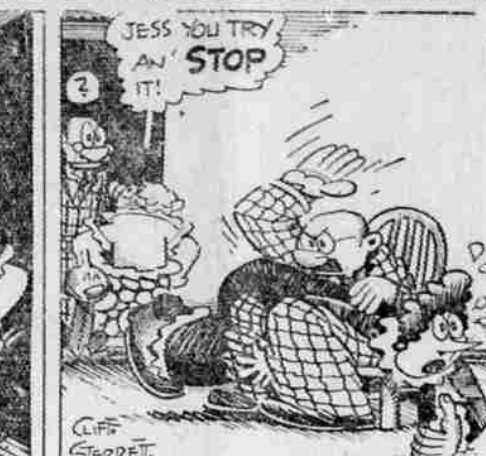
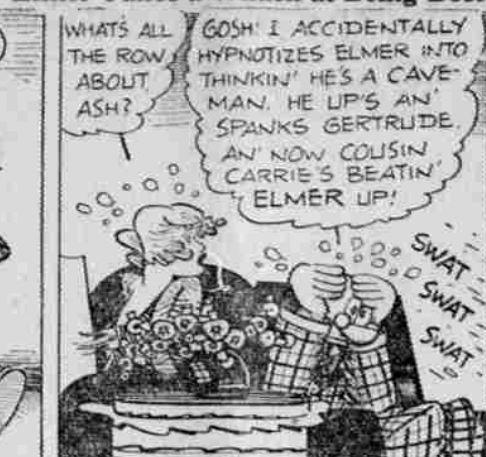

Return of Long Skirts Declared by Style Authority Due to "Horrible" Sights Revealed by Abbreviations

NEW YORK, April 17.—Women's legs are responsible for the long skirts they're trailing around today, in the opinion of Baron de Meyer, international style expert and widely known fashion writer.

"Women have advanced a great many reasons for those long skirts, but the real reason lies in their legs," said the baron who has just returned to America after a visit to the leading dressmaking salons of Paris.

"When the couturiers saw how the skirts were everlastingly going up and up, when they saw the horrible sights were revealed in their knees and that they find it the top of the calf, they knew something had to be done. There was only one thing to do—pull the skirts down—and they did it as fast as they could. That's the real story of the long skirt."

At that, the couturiers never intended skirts to be really long by day or sweeping the floor by night, he believes. Just long enough to give a lady a degree of the grace and dignity that is supposed to be her heritage.

Home Buying Increases—American women are wearing them so now, he said. In fact, he said, American women are wearing long skirts these days with as much dash and distinction and chic as any woman in the world.

Moreover, seventy-five per cent of America's wealthiest women are buying their clothes right at home in the United States, he said.

"To be sure they're buying models originated in France, but they're buying them in New York and not in Paris."

"American buyers and dressmakers work so fast and their execution of Parisian models is so perfect that when an American woman goes to Paris she sees the same clothes she could buy at home. Only a few frocks that have been originated within the last few weeks are different. Why should she waste her time in Europe shopping? She'd rather play."

Will America ever originate the styles of the world?

Baron de Meyer thinks not. "They haven't the background for it, not the patience. In Paris the whole city is tuned to the production of styles; between half a million and eight hundred thousand people work all year just for that and nothing else. Many of the French style creators come of families who have been designing clothes for generations; it's in their blood; and there is nothing in America to compare with it."

THE ELOQUENCE OF SILENCE

George Fisher Baker of 2 Wall street will be 50 years old next Thursday, March 27.

It is doubtful if the old fashioned premises of the First National bank will show the slightest evidence that the chairman of the board has reached such a milestone. Mr. Baker himself will be at Jekyll Island, Georgia, with his son and several friends, yet it will be a birthday of which American prosperity itself might well take notice. Few men who have ended finance and industry will challenge the statement that Mr. Baker has never had an equal as an investor in the development of the United States. A handsome majority probably also would vote Mr. Baker as one without ever having a peer as a banker.

Next to Mr. Baker as a banker and an investor, Wall street looks to him as a man who can and has kept silent with more success than any of his great figures. Mr. Baker can keep quiet in any language. When the bond club honored him a few years ago the full text of his speech was "thank you and God bless you." At the dinner in his honor in 1925 he said even less—not a word, in fact. He has given one newspaper interview, of 114 words, mainly in praise of silence. He said:

"Business men of America should reduce their talk at least two-thirds. Every one should reduce his talk. There is rarely ever a real good enough for anybody to talk. Silence uses up much less energy. I don't talk because silence is the secret of success."

"I did nothing unusual when I began. My first job that I chose to call a job was in a small bank in Albany. I was a very quiet worker and that served to distinguish me. It was there that I made and invested my first thousand dollars. Then I simply planned my way to Wall street. It was with this money that I bought the First National bank."

Second word from the Cross: "Mercy. Scripture: Luke 23:44-45. Hymn: "When I survey the wondrous Cross." Prayer. Address: "Today shalt thou be with me in paradise."

Third word from the Cross: "Pity. Scripture: John 19:11-13. Hymn: "O love that will not let me go." Prayer. Address: John 19:26-27. "Behold thy son... behold thy mother."

Fourth word from the Cross: "Atonement. Scripture: Matthew 27:39-47. Hymn: "My faith looks up to Thee." Prayer. Address: "My God, why hast thou forsaken me?"

Fifth word from the Cross: "The word of Agony. Scripture: John 19:30. Hymn: "Alas and did my Savior bleed." Prayer. Address: "I am a sinner."

Sixth word from the Cross: "Word of Perfection. Scripture: John 19:30. Hymn: "Just as I am." Prayer. Address: "It is finished."

Seventh word from the Cross: "Sonship. Scripture: Luke 23:46. Mark 15:34-39. Hymn: "Rock of Ages." Prayer. Address: "Father into thy hands I commend my spirit." Close—prayer and benediction.
