ATTEMPTED DUTIES DODGING MAY LEAD TO \$200,000 SWAT

TWO BIG PROJECTS AHEAD FOR PLANE OF UNIQUE TYPE

LOS ANGELES, April 18.—Charles F. Rocheville, vice president of the Enefo Aircraft corporation today announced plans for a non-refueling endurance flight in Enefo's new "Flying Wing" monoplane in an effort to better the German record of 65 hours, 29 minutes.

The flight will be made at Long Beach, Cal.

Immediately following the endurance flight, Rocheville said, the plane will be crated and shipped to Tokyo, Japan, from which place it will take off within a month on a non-stop flight to Seattle, Wash.

Rocheville, a veteran pilot, said he would be at the controls on the Japan-to-America hop. A co-pilot has not been named.

The plane, the only one of its kind in the world, is unique in that its motor, a 200-horsepower Junior Wasp, and two open cockpits are contained in a nacelle, or body, which extends only two feet behind the nine-foot wide wing. The plane has a wing spread of 60 feet.

The rudder and elevators which control the ship while in flight are suspended 24 feet back of the wing and nacelle by two outriggers made of duralumin.

Rocheville yesterday made a successful test flight with the ship at the company's airport at Downey, Cal.
