

NO RIGHT EXISTS FOR INDIVIDUALS TO PROCURE LIQUOR

Dry Law Not Invasion of
Personal Liberty, Says
Wickersham in Talk
to Journalists.

Campaign of Education on
Evils of Intoxicating
Drink Suggested
by Speaker.

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Chairman Wickersham, of the Hoover law enforcement commission, today told the American Society of Newspaper Editors that the individual had "no inalienable right" to procure and consume liquor.

He said there was no pretense that such a right was protected by the constitution but the excuse was offered that the prohibition amendment "constitutes an inexcusable invasion of personal liberty."

"It is comparatively venal for one to break the law, with one's eyes open to possible consequences," he continued. "But to unite with others in openly aiding and abetting the violation of any law, upon the plea that it ought not to have been enacted and cannot be enforced, is inviting revolution and anarchy."

Flouting is Decried
After reviewing the long fight waged to ban liquor, Wickersham said opinions differ as to whether it may be found desirable to modify the eighteenth amendment.

"But I appeal to you, and through the press of America," he said, "to aid in demonstrating that so long as the law stands as it does now, no patriotic American should advocate flouting its provisions, or boast of violating its commands."

The law enforcement chairman asked the editors:

"Will you not choose to exercise your power in behalf, not of unrestricted license, but of observance of the law?"

He said experience "has demonstrated that when there is a widespread popular demand for a change in the constitution it is not difficult to secure amendment."

Minority Can't Modify.

"On the other hand," he continued, "a minority, however militant and clamorous, can modify or change the fundamental law, except through the apathy and indifference or apathy of the majority."

"If any considerable body of citizens object to any part of the constitution, it is their right to organize and work for its change by methods provided in the constitution itself."

There is no reserved right in individual citizens to select particular laws which run counter to their tastes, wishes, habits or interests, and preach systematic disregard for or violation of those laws. And there is no 'inalienable right' in the individual to procure and consume intoxicating liquor."

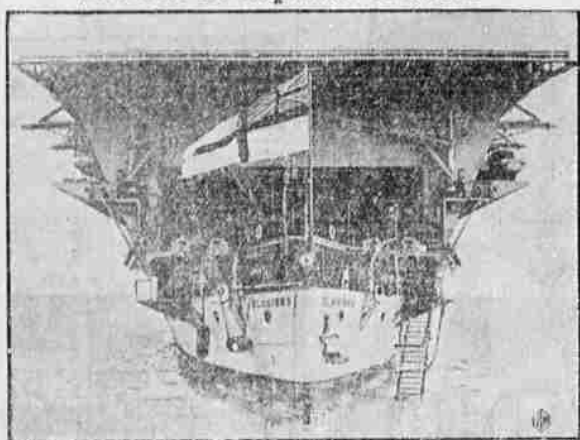
"Success at the Polls"

MRS. OESTERREICH AND SANDHUBER ARE HELD FOR MURDER

LOS ANGELES, April 18.—Mrs. Walburga Oesterreich occupied a cell in the county jail today where Otto Sandhuber, the man who imprisoned himself in garrets for more than a decade to be near her, also is held. The pair was indicted jointly yesterday by the grand jury for murdering the woman's husband, Fred Oesterreich, retired Milwaukee, Wis., garment manufacturer, August 22, 1922. At the arraignment at which Mrs. Oesterreich stood by the side of Sandhuber, not a flicker of recognition passed between them. Sandhuber pleaded not guilty and not guilty by reason of insanity. The woman said she was unprepared.

The indictments have not ended investigation of the case. The grand jury has summoned John Oesterreich, brother of the slain man, for questioning next week in connection with the allegations that Sandhuber burned in his garret a will unfavorable to Mrs. Oesterreich. The will probated following Oesterreich's death left the \$250,000 estate to his widow.
