FEDERAL CHURCHES UNDER FIRE FROM SOUTHERN BRANCH

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

CHARLOTTE, N. C., April 18.—Alleged political activities of the federal council of churches were under fire today in an overture of the Mecklenburg presbytery to the general assembly of the Presbyterian church of the United States.

The presbytery urged the general church body to withdraw from the federal council of churches, because, it was asserted, the council "is being investigated by the congress of the United States for its political activities on questions which Christ did not commission the church to settle."

The overture further declared that the church council "has been charged from reliable sources with being in sympathy with communism, and with Russian soviet propaganda" and "that the federal council of churches radio program has been the means of widespread error of fundamental truths."

The overture was adopted yesterday at the presbytery's meeting at Mint Hill. It will be presented for consideration at the southern Presbyterian general assembly at Charlottesville, Va., May 22. Rev. J. G. Garth, of Charlotte, clerk of the presbytery, said. The presbytery embraces 34 churches.

DRY CHIEF DENIES NEAR-BEER PERMITS

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Seymour Lowman, assistant secretary of the treasury, said today a request that Palmer Canfield resign as special supervisor for the national prohibition enforcement unit in Washington had been withdrawn but that Canfield's application for a leave of absence would be granted.

Canfield, in a statement issued after discussion with his treasury department superiors, denied all connection with any incidents relating to the issue of permits for near beer manufacture which were alleged to have created opportunity for bribe acceptance.

FIRE DESTROYS BRIQUET FACTORY AT LINTON
