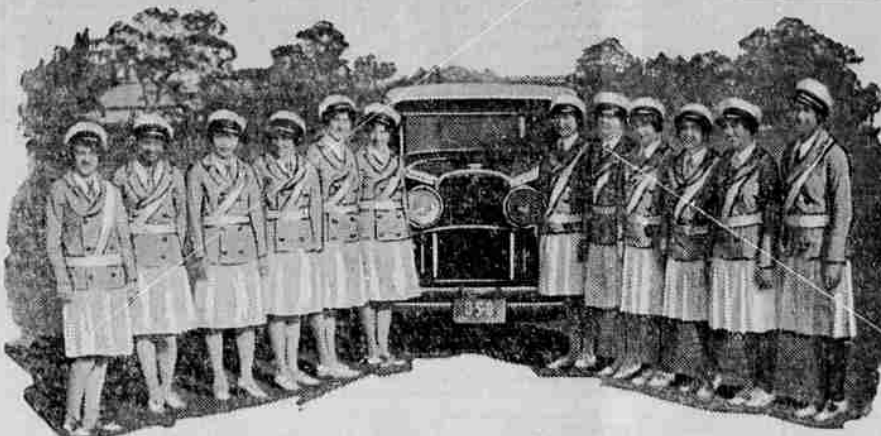

OAKLAND STANDS IN TOP POSITION IN COAST LEAGUE

Seals Trounced Despite 7 Run Start—Portland Loses to Missions in Home Debut.

Exactly fifteen days after the opening of the 1930 Pacific Coast league season the Oakland club, picked by most experts as a second division outfit, today stood at the top of the percentage column. Overcoming a seven-run handi-

cap handed the Seals on a mixture of poor pitching and bad fielding in the first inning, the Oaks took the lead in the third inning when they hammered Elmer Jacobs, star hurler of the Seals, and Jack Knight all over the local lot, registering seven runs on four hits. The final score was 13 to 7.

Bob Hurst, young right hander of the Oaks, proved to be the hero of the battle. He relieved Andrews in the first inning and set the seals down without a run for the remainder of the game.

Ken Douglas, southpaw relief pitcher, was the hero for the day in the eyes of his Mission mates when he drove in two runs with a hit over the infield in the ninth inning of the season's inaugural at Portland. Douglas' timely hit gave the Missions a 5 to 3 advantage.

Beavers Drop Home Debut
"Dutch" Lieber, smart young curver of the Missions, and Carl Mays, veteran right hander, hooked up in a pitchers' battle.

Thirteen thousand five hundred and sixty two paid customers, the best opening day attendance of the league this year, witnessed the game.

Ernie Johnson, manager of the Seattle Indians, cemented himself with the home owners yesterday by driving home six of his team's seven runs to give the tribe a victory over the Hollywood Stars, 7 to 6.

Johnson's home run over the left field fence with the two men on the bases in the fifth tied the score, and in the seventh frame Ernie batted in the winning run when he singled to score Ellisworth.

The Sacramento Senators enabled the Oaks to take possession of first place by humbling the Los Angeles squad, 8 to 2.

Ray Keating, spitball pitcher for the Senators, baffled the Angels and held them in the palm of his glove throughout the contest. Three Los Angeles hurlers were unable to stop the Sacramento batsmen, twelve solid smashes being collected by the Senatorial clubbers.

NEW TREND IN SEASONING FOOD

Heightening Flavor Instead of Changing It the Secret

The problem of making certain wholesome foods tasty, used to be solved by serving them with rich, thick, flavorful sauces.

Cooks have discovered, however, that there is a much simpler and more wholesome method to make essential foods palatable. The use of sugar is one of the secrets.

A dash of sugar to a pinch of salt ideally heightens the flavor of bland vegetables or those which have lost the sugar content so apparent when fresh picked. Such use of sugar in restoring the flavor of peas, carrots, corn, string beans and turnips makes them more pleasing carriers of the vitamins, minerals and roughage they contain.

Doctors and dietitians recommend this use of sugar especially when children "shy" at these foods. They also are in favor of adding a dash of sugar to stewed fruits and tomatoes to modify their sharp taste.

Many cooks keep a mixture of sugar and salt on hand for seasoning purposes. Equal parts of sugar and salt are popular but the taste preferences of the family and the food in question should be considered. Most foods are more delicious and nourishing with sugar. The Sugar Institute.
