## MODERN MACHINES WILL BE USED ON MELROSE ROAD JOB

Modern equipment has done much to make good roads a realization in these days, and this fact is impressed on the mind when one sees the massive machinery at the Miller-Sanford display rooms on West Oak street and Pine. E. M. Dyer is manager. Just now there is a huge caterpillar tractor on the floor that in a day or two goes to the contractor on the Melrose road project, and with this powerful 60-horse power "cat" is a gigantic scraper, built by an Oregon firm at Albany and having a capacity of five cubic yards. This piece of road equipment alone cost the contractor in the neighborhood of \$1900, with an outfit of over \$5000 for the tractor, totaling approximately \$7000 for the outfit. But with that "cat" and the scraper hundreds of yards of dirt and rock can be moved in a day. The scraper, powered by the tractor, will pick up more than 15,000 pounds of dirt and rock at each trip, and when the load reaches the fill it is automatically dumped by hydraulic pressure as easily as the now obsolete but once indispensable Fresno scraper formerly unloaded its shovelful of dirt when the teamster and assistant got into action. Douglas county roads are built up in an amazing manner, and every year still more money is voted for this line of improvement. Modern machines are doing their bit in helping along this much needed and laudable work, enabling farmers and stockmen to get their product to markets at lowest transportation costs.

## COOS BAY PREPARES FOR ENDEAVOR MEET

## STATE MOTOR CAR TAX LEVEL RISES

Motorists Confronted With Material Increase in Taxation Over Previous Year.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 23.—State motor vehicle taxation continued its upward trend in 1929 and increased nearly three times as much as motor vehicle registrations.

At the same time, the average per vehicle tax for the country increased 13 per cent in 1929 over 1928.

The total increase in motor vehicle registrations for the United States last year was 8.6 per cent, while the increase in the total amount of special motor taxes (exclusive of personal property taxes) for the forty-eight states and the District of Columbia was 22.8 per cent.

These figures were revealed in the annual registration and taxation survey by the American Automobile association made public here today.

Following is a summary of the facts brought out in the review:

First.—The average per vehicle tax for the entire country was \$28.56 in 1929 as compared with \$26.24 in 1928, an increase of 13 per cent in a period of twelve months. The per vehicle tax has increased more than 300 per cent since 1919, when it was \$8.55.

Second.—Special taxes collected from car owners by the states reached a new high peak last year, with a total of \$767,011,555 as compared with \$624,325,676 in 1928, an increase of \$142,685,925.

Third.—The states' revenue from gasoline tax increased 32 per cent in 1929, the total being \$422,216,641 as compared with \$319,906,417 in the previous year.

While New York reported registrations well over the two million mark, seven other states showed registrations in excess of one million. These are: New York, 2,230,430; California, 1,974,341; Pennsylvania, 1,666,241; Ohio, 1,738,000; Illinois, 1,615,988; Michigan, 1,574,496; Texas, 1,343,307; and Massachusetts, 1,016,916. The latter state was the new addition to this list.

In state fees, drivers' licenses and gasoline taxes, the highest five were: Pennsylvania, \$65,131,078; New York, \$55,539,734; Ohio, \$45,556,000; Michigan, \$43,310,800 and California, \$43,094,142.

Pennsylvania led in the amount collected from the gas tax, with \$35,970,388, while other leading states were: Ohio, \$34,200,000; California, \$29,932,159; Michigan, \$21,309,009 and Texas, \$18,373,772.

New York collected \$16,536,868 from the gas tax, which went into effect for the first time on May 1, 1929.

The five states with the highest per vehicle tax were: Florida, \$50.10; Arkansas, \$46.73; Oregon,

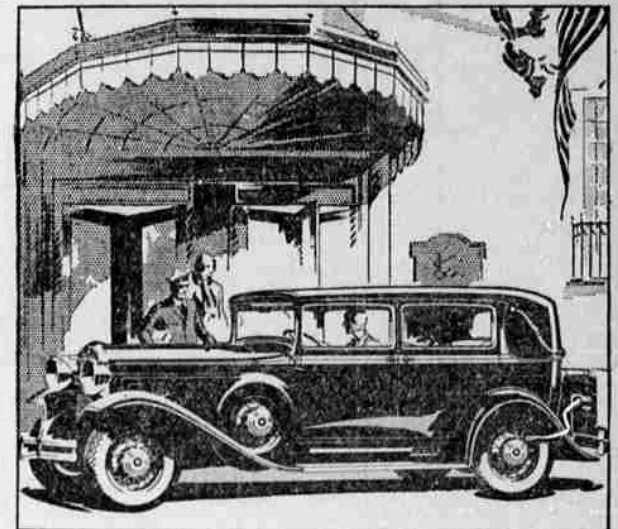
