provisions, it would pave the way for final disposition of the measure.

Those Present
Those at the breakfast were Senators Watson, Indiana; Smoot, Utah; and Shortridge, California; the three republican senate conferees; Representatives Hawley, Oregon; Treadway, Massachusetts; and Bacharach, New Jersey; the three republican house conferees; Speaker Longworth, Representative Tilson, Connecticut, the house floor leader; Chairman Snell of the house rules committee, and Senator McNary, Oregon, assistant republican leader of the senate.

Walter H. Newton, one of the president's secretaries, also attended the meeting.

After the white house conference, house members from 15 sugar producing states began plans to insist on as high protection as possible for the sugar growers and refiners.

The house bill increases the existing duty on Cuban raw sugar from 1.75 to 2.40 cents a pound. The senate measure provides a 5-cent rate.

New Grain Head Named

WASHINGTON, April 24.—The appointment of George S. Milnor, of Alton, Ill., as general manager of the Farmers' National Grain corporation, was announced today by Chairman Legge of the federal farm board.

Milnor, Legge said, will continue to act as head of the wheat stabilization corporation. The chairman said that he did not expect any change in the marketing policies of the corporation. Milnor succeeds W. G. Kellogg who resigned ten days ago.

Legge said that the present

for J. M. Sen Gupta, imprisoned for six months as a consequence of his activity in behalf of the civil disobedience movement, had died or been killed in prison. They stormed the gates of the prison demanding to be shown Sen Gupta, dead or alive.

The authorities refused to do this, although issuing a statement that he was alive and was not undertaking a hunger strike. Mrs. Gupta, British wife of the imprisoned mayor, maintained a vigil outside the prison throughout the night. Police ultimately dispersed the mob.

Bloody Encounters

Beyond Calcutta in the Chittagong neighborhood troops continued their pursuit of the "insurgents" who Friday night attacked the police arsenal, killing six of the defenders. In a skirmish yesterday Burma Valley light horse killed twelve of the insurgents, seriously wounded two, and arrested four.

Troops sought also the four suspects, who while being searched for weapons at Feni, pulled guns and shot five police.

Meanwhile Mahatma Gandhi, leader of the civil disobedience movement continued to preach his doctrine of passive non-violent resistance in Gumerat. In a speech at the village of Bardoli he pointed



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PROHI STATUTE NOT FAVORED BY FOOTBALL COACH

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Testimony that prohibition has failed to prohibit in American colleges and neighborhood settlements, and that Ontario province across the border in Canada abolished its bone dry regime because it didn't work, was given the house judiciary committee today as its long prohibition hearing neared an end.

W. W. Roper, head football coach at Princeton, describing himself as a teetotaler and a worker for temperance, said secret drinking had thrown bad influences about the young men and women in colleges, and had made parents fearful of the result.

Speaking for the Rife neighborhood settlement in New York, Mrs. Jacob A. Rife declared in a letter put into the record that "the impossibility of enforcing an impossible law" was having a demoralizing effect among the poor of the great city.

Sir Henry Drayton, head of the liquor control board of Ontario province, told the committee that the province had gone from prohibition to government control after multiplying hip flasks and an inundation of illicit liquor had convinced the people that they needed some more effective method of supervision.

As chairman of the football coaches association Roper said he had observed conditions at many schools.

Representative Moore, republican, Ohio, asked if under dispensary system, the youth would not be able to obtain liquor. Roper answered he assumed a dispensary plan would be operated with some judgment.

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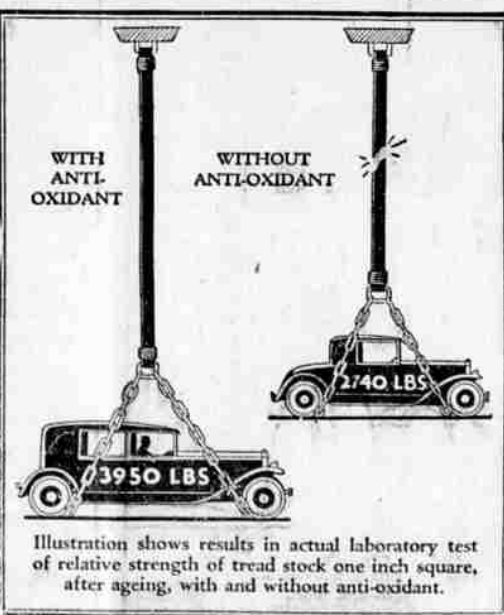
