

STUDY OF TURKEY
DISEASES MADE BY
FEDERAL EXPERTSArtificial Brooding Proves
Value in Prevention of
Blackhead, Menace
to Industry.

Turkey raising in the United States has been regarded as a side issue and a gamble, but increasing knowledge of parasitic diseases and their control is putting the industry on a more stable basis, says A. H. Lee, poultry husbandman of the U. S. department of agriculture. "There are now more than 3 1/2 million turkeys on farms in this country, and they constitute 1 1/2 per cent of all poultry. The 1929 crop of market turkeys indicated a decided advance in the business as compared with 1928. The estimated increase was about 9 per cent."

In recognition of the increased interest in turkeys and the need of further information concerning parasitic diseases, the U. S. department of agriculture has established a foundation flock of turkeys at Miles City, Mont. This work got under way last spring. Of 600 birds raised last season 300 were selected for the breeding flock. Everett E. Wehr, a research worker, is devoting all his time to the investigation of parasitic diseases. The work at this station will also include a study of the comparative cost of raising turkeys in confinement and on free range.

Artificial Brooding O. K.

The flock was established by purchasing hatching eggs which were incubated artificially. The young birds were brooded in special brooder houses with clean yards until they were about 8 weeks old. The investigators took these precautions to prevent infestations of the poultry by such parasites as are introduced by adult turkeys. When large enough to range the young birds were provided with large fenced lots and inexpensive shelters for roosting.

"Modern improvements in mechanical means of hatching and brooding have done much to develop the turkey industry," Mr. Lee says. "Day-old poulters are now produced by commercial hatcheries and shipped by parcel post in much the same manner as baby chicks. Artificial brooding has been of particular value in preventing losses from blackhead disease which at one time threatened to destroy the industry."

Prevention Methods

Research workers have determined that this disease is caused by a parasite which can not live long in soil, but which may be transmitted in the egg of another parasite, the cecum worm. The blackhead parasite survives for long periods in the worm egg. As both turkeys and chickens may have blackhead, usually in a chronic form in mature birds, and as both may also have cecum worms, prevention of the acute, destructive form of the disease in young turkeys calls for rearing on clean ground away from chickens and older turkeys.

GAS BOMBS USED
TO FORCE SON TO
GIVE UP CORPSE

SEATTLE, April 23.—Seattle police today were forced to use tear gas bombs to gain entrance to a house and overcome Ephraim Doucette's resistance to the removal of the body of his father, Henry, who had been dead for two months.

Tenants of a house owned by the father, alarmed because he had not appeared to collect the rent, went to the home today to inquire if the 70-year-old man was ill. The son slammed the door in their faces and they called police.

The body was removed to the county morgue from the bed where it was lying, fully clothed. The 45-year-old son was taken to police headquarters. He will be given a sanity hearing, police said.

HARBOR INQUIRY ON
AT CRESCENT CITY

CRESCENT CITY, Cal., April 23.—Attorney W. P. Ellis developed a picture of southern Oregon and northern California as the "most remote rich producing area in the United States" from a standpoint of freight rates to consuming centers as testimony opened in the Crescent City harbor hearing today before Major E. H. Ropes, army district engineer.

Ellis was present before the hearing by C. E. Gates, Oregon highway commissioner and president of the Northern California-Oregon Development association.

Success of the state of Oregon in securing interstate commerce commission order for the \$10,000,000 cross-state line and the possibility of a northern line joining with California carriers opens the way to extension of rails from the Rogue River valley in southern Oregon to Crescent City if a harbor is constructed, it was testified.

EX-JUDGE SENT TO
MISSOURI PRISON
ON LIQUOR CHARGE

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., April 24.—Ben Schaeffer, 65, former judge of the Osage county court and a leading citizen of Westphalia, was sentenced to a year and a day in the Leavenworth, Kas., federal penitentiary and fined \$1,500 in U. S. district court here yesterday for violating the national prohibition law.

Judge Schaeffer pleaded guilty to selling liquor at his home, and admitting in effect the place was a rendezvous for students from the University of Missouri at Columbia and residents of Jefferson City.

CHICAGO, Ill., April 24.—Nineteen of 24 men recently indicted by the federal grand jury on charges of conspiracy against the dry laws, pleaded guilty yesterday and were given sentences ranging from \$500 fine and eight months in prison to \$100 fines for minor defendants.

John J. Garibaldi, president of the Bacous Bottling company, New York, was sentenced to serve eight months and fined \$500, heading the list.

Those indicted were implicated in an alleged nation-wide conspiracy, including the manufacture of counterfeit whiskey labels and stamps.

John Matteo, secretary of an ex-assistant United States district attorney in New York, was sentenced to eight months and fined \$2500.

SUIT AGAINST DOCTORS

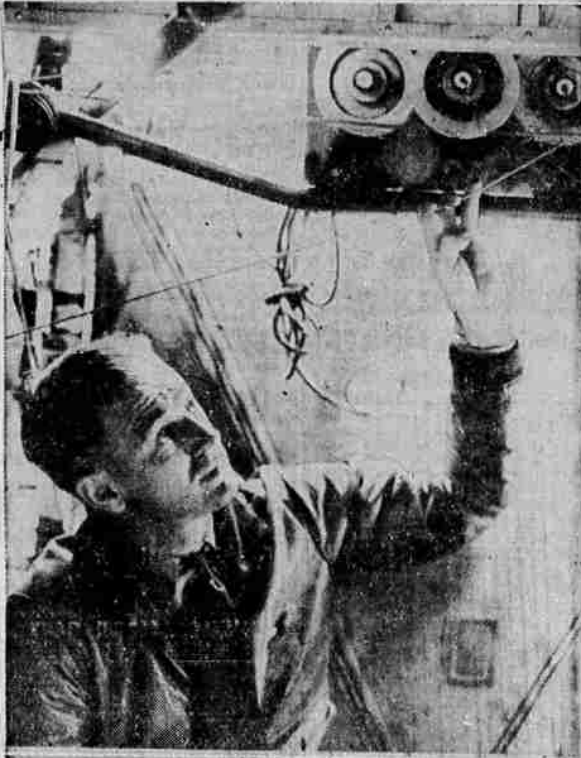
WOMAN GIVES DATA TO

BROOKLYN IN WILD
DUEL OF SLUGGINGWeird Contest Ended With
16-15 Score—Cubs Nose
Out Cards, Browns
Tame Tigers.

Between them, the Brooklyn Robins and Philadelphia Phillies have about the greatest array of sheer slugging talent any pair of teams in the two major leagues can produce, but they haven't displayed it to a very good advantage through the first games. Their blows were rather weak and ineffective until they got together yesterday and then there were more than plenty.

It all started when Fresno Thompson, Phillie leadoff man, stepped up to the plate in the first inning and drove the ball into the stands to raucous home. It didn't end until the ninth inning when Spotts, the third Phillie catcher to appear, took advantage of an error by Flowers to romp home from third with the run that gave Philadelphia a 16 to 15 victory. In between there came 38 hits, 21 of them going to the Phillies, a parade of pitchers and pinch hitters and one big scoring rally after another. Starting with Jim Faulkner and ending with Bill Clark, the Robins used six hurlers while the Phillies called on four. In all 35 players took part in the game. Southern and Thievenow of Philadelphia and Frederick and Flowers of Brooklyn took the leading slugging roles, yielding only to Chuck Klein's third homer of the season.

The Brooklyn-Philadelphia was the only major league game in the east which survived the wintry rigors of the weather. One western contest in each league reached its end while Pittsburgh tried to hold its home opening against Cincinnati but gave it up in the third inning when a snowstorm swept over the field.

Cubs Beat Cardinals

The Chicago Cubs, champions of the National league last season, got back above the 500 mark by beating out the St. Louis Cardinals 6 to 5, in the other National league game. The Cubs got five runs in the third inning only to have the Cards get them all back again before the ninth. Charley Grimm came through in the ninth with his third hit of the game to bring Hack Wilson home from third with the winning run. Charley, winning his first game of the year in three starts, outlasted a trio of Cardinal pitchers.

The St. Louis Browns were the

only American leaguers to increase their average, defeating the Detroit Tigers for the second time in succession, 5 to 1. Dick Coffman was rather stingy with hits although generous with walks but the two Tiger hurlers, Herring and Samuels, gave freely of both at the times that counted. Schulte led the Browns with three hits in as many times at bat and was on the scoring end of a double steal.

EPISCOPAL CLERIC
WHO WED CATHOLIC
GIRL BEING TRIED

LEXINGTON, Ky., April 23.—Because he married a Catholic, the ceremony being performed by a Catholic priest, the Rev. Julius Arnold Velasco, rector of St. John's Episcopal church at Dayton, Ky., faced trial today before an ecclesiastical court of Lexington diocese.

The rector, it is charged by a standing committee of the diocese, which will prosecute him, violated an agreement he had made with the committee. It was charged that he promised to resign as rector if he should contract such a marriage, but the Rev. Mr. Velasco has annulled the agreement.

The rector married Miss Catherine Rogers, of Howard County, Maryland, at Elliott City, Md., on January 25, the ceremony being performed by Father Michael O'Ryan, rector of St. Paul's Catholic church at Elliott City.

The charge against the rector is styled "for conduct unbecoming a clergyman and violation of his oral word to his bishop and his written promise to the church that he would resign his orders if he married a Roman Catholic." The bishop is the Right Rev. H. P. Almon Abbott, formerly of Chicago, installed last year.

DEATH STAYS HAND
UNTIL CENSUS GETS
MICHIGAN RECLUSE

CADILLAC, Mich., April 23.—"Old Jim" Todd, 79-year old recluse, was afraid he wouldn't live to get in the 1930 census but he was counted, with the undertaker as a witness, and today he is dead.

"Old Jim" lived most of his life in a shack on the outskirts of Cadillac. His 79 years were "weighing heavy" on him, he told friends, and he wanted, above all things, to be counted among the living in 1930.

Then Ed Althouse, a neighbor, found the old man unconscious in his shack. Thinking he was dead he called the undertaker. The undertaker found "Old Jim" alive, but critically ill.

While Althouse and the undertaker were preparing to take him to a hospital, the census taker came along and "Old Jim" Todd was counted in the 1930 census. He died a few hours later in a hospital.

PROPOSED BAN ON
FILIPINOS BEATEN
IN U. S. SENATE

WASHINGTON, April 23.—The senate today rejected the Shortridge proposal to bar all Philip-

pine immigration for five years except students and visitors.

The Philippine restriction proposal was voted down by 41 to 23. It had been advanced by Senator Shortridge, republican, California, as an amendment to the Harris bill to place immigration from Latin American countries on a quota basis.

An amendment by Senator Kendrick, democrat, Wyoming, to allow unrestricted entry of laborers engaged in season work of less than eight months duration, was approved 32 to 30.

Another proposal by Senator Hayden, democrat, Arizona, to place Canada and Newfoundland under a quota was rejected 14 to 44.

The senate judiciary committee today reported to the senate a series of house bills providing prison relief and including authorization of two new federal prison institutions.

FIRST TIME, ADDING
TO LEAGUE'S LEAD

JOHNSON BILL TO
AID VETS OPPOSED

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Chairman Wood of the house appropriations committee yesterday declared in the house he was opposed to the Johnson bill to extend relief to World war veterans, because it probably would cost the government an additional \$400,000,000 annually.

Wood said the bill was not fair and he did not believe it had the approval of any one. He read a letter he received from President Hoover urging a curtailment of expenditures because of the serious

possibility of a deficit in the national treasury.

The Indianan predicted if the bill were enacted within two years more a \$1,000,000,000 annual expenditure would be required for the veterans' bureau. Already the expenditures for that government agency amounted to a fourth of the government receipts, he said.
