"Twelve years ago we were thrilled at the sight of khaki uniforms, the many activities around every training camp and the loaded trains of soldiers as they silently passed toward the Atlantic sailing ports."

Today how hazy are these memories, yet at that time we felt we would never forget them. We knew many of those boys would never return and many would return with lifelong physical disabilities.

"Poppies, the symbol of their service, will be worn in all parts of America on Memorial day, and every American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary poppy worn in the state of Oregon will be made by disabled non-compensated service men in Veterans' hospitals in Portland. The poppies cost these boys so much, but how little they cost those who buy them! The proceeds of these sales are devoted exclusively to the relief and welfare of these disabled and to meet conditions of distress among families of disabled and needy service men."
