CANDIDATES NOW DISPLAY MORE PEP IN PRIMARY RACE

Bennett Assails Record of Norblad in Radio Talk; Joseph, Corbett and Hall Very Busy.

Two Opponents of Korell Aggressive; Democrats Plan to Nominate C. H. Martin.

(Associated Press Local Wire) While most of the aspirants for governorship honours trained their heaviest guns on Multnomah county during the week, upstate was by no means neglected. Almost every mode of transportation was used to cover dates that included many places in the hinterland.

Obviously the greater interest was shown in the gubernatorial contest, but Oregon politics were not one whit the usual picture of scurrying candidates for lesser offices. Candidates for the state legislature moved forward with greater speed with the usual flood of endorsements and blanket tickets lacking work for printers and giving employment for their distribution.

One League Quits While many political organizations were giving endorsements, one, the Progressive Citizens' league, closed up shop. D. C. Thompson, chairman, blamed inability to secure school houses for meetings for the failure of the organization. He aired his views in a stinging letter to Mayor Baker. Optimistic reports came from the camps of the republican gubernatorial.

Managers for Harry L. Corbett said he planned a number of meetings next week and in the meantime planned to meet the voters personally. Senator George W. Joseph was compelled to press Tex Rankin, noted aviator, into service the latter part of the week in order to meet an upstate speaking engagement.

Bennett Raps Norblad Senator J. E. Bennett reached what many of his followers believed the high point in his campaign in a radio speech. After referring to legislation for which he was responsive and asserting that much of it had resulted in great good for the people, the senator assailed the record of Governor Norblad declaring that as a member of the legislature the incumbent had opposed many measures that were "for the best interests of the greatest number of people."

A state-fostered program to attract tourists, home-seekers and industries was advocated in many addresses by Charles Hall. He returned to Multnomah county during the fore part of the week and, according to his headquarters, will spend a deal of time here until the primaries in May.

J. A. Jeffreys continued to make a lively campaign with many friends making house-to-house visits in his behalf. Others are also busy Much interest is displayed in the congressional fight in which Robert Gordon Duncan and L. B. Sandblast are opposing the incumbent, Franklin Korell. Duncan has recently used the radio in expounding his cause and Sandblast is conducting an aggressive campaign.

The democrats are planning to write in the name of Major-General C. H. Martin which is the only way they can nominate him at the primary election.

While the republicans are happy in the battle over their six gubernatorial candidates the democrats are jubilant in the race between their four aspirants, George R. Wilbur, Ed S. Piper, Edward F. Bailey and A. C. Hough appear confident and word comes from their camps that all is well.
