ANNIVERSARY OF ODD FELLOWSHIP IN U. S. CELEBRATED

Annual Gathering of Lodges
of Douglas County
Held in Drain
Saturday.

Rev. Alexander Muirhead
Roseburg Pastor, Chief
Speaker; Musical
Numbers Given.

DRAIN, April 25.—The 111th anniversary of Oddfellowship in the United States was celebrated here Saturday by the lodges of this county, which formed an association several years ago, as did most of the lodges in the state in their respective counties. On account of incomplete heating facilities in the new community hall the meeting convened in the M. E. church near by for the morning session and was called to order by President J. T. Redford. After singing the Star Spangled Banner the invocation was pronounced by Rev. Finley, of the M. E. church. The president then gave a brief address of welcome to the visiting members of the Rebekah degrees. Twelve of the sixteen lodges of the county were represented at the meeting, besides about twenty Rebekahs. The musical numbers on the program for the morning session were, a selection by the Mormon orchestra; solo, by Prof. Lehman; song, by a quartette of ladies, Mrs. Gorsline, Mrs. Ellenburg, Mrs. DeMerit and Mrs. Cowles; Mrs. E. C. Whipple, accompanist; another orchestra number; song, "Spring Time in the Rockies," by six eighth grade girls and another orchestra selection.

The president then presented the speaker of the morning session, Rev. Alexander Muirhead, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Roseburg, who was called to give the address in place of Rev. J. K. Howard, of Glendale, who was unable to be present on account of sickness. Rev. Muirhead used "Love" as his theme, as exemplified in the second degree of Oddfellowship and the universal command was "a splendid address."

Mrs. Rader, of Kellogg, read a paper on "Joining the Lodge" basing her more or less humorous experiences and observations in the Kellogg and Elkhart vicinities. Recreations were then taken during which a basket dinner was spread in the community hall. The meeting convened again at two o'clock in the hall, this being a closed session for the transacting of business.

After reading the minutes of the last annual session and hearing the reports of committees the matter of a place for the next meeting was taken up, the result being that Elkhart was chosen. Then came the election of officers. Mr. Hudson, of Elkhart, was elected president and R. O. Thomas, also of Elkhart, was elected secretary.

The association came together again in the community hall, at eight o'clock, for the evening session. At this time a splendid program of music, both vocal and instrumental, was presented. It began with a number by the Mormon orchestra which was followed by a solo by Mrs. Edna Patchen-Kenny who also responded to an encore, Miss Leona Ellenburg, accompanist. The ladies quartette of the morning session sang another number and also responded to an encore. Another number by the orchestra was followed by two solos by Jim Whipple and this by a cornet and trombone duet by Ray and Ruby Bishop, of the Mormon orchestra. Miss Margarette Anderson, of Sutherlin, then gave two

humorous readings, in negro characterization, which were well received. A vocal solo and response to an encore were given by Miss Mary Myers, of Roseburg, and a solo by Marjorie Moorman concluded the musical part of the program.

The president again introduced Rev. Muirhead, who was asked to give the evening address on account of the inability of Mr. H. A. Canaday, of Roseburg, to be present. The speaker used as his subject the founding of the order of Oddfellowship in America, by Thomas Wilkey. Beginning with the bringing together of five Oddfellows, four Englishmen and one Scotchman, the number necessary to form a lodge, Mr. Wilkey, on April 25, 1819, started an organization that now numbers more than a million members.

THREE AIRPLANES CRASH; DEATH TO THIRTEEN RESULTS

One Machine Strikes Group
of Spectators, Killing
Eight and Injuring
Twelve Others.

Jas. H. Kelly, Noted Flier,
and Two Companions
Die When Storm
Hits Craft.

FAYETTEVILLE, Tenn., April 28.—Eight members of nearby farming communities who climbed to a railroad embankment to watch a Sunday airplane exhibition lay dead today, victims of a slight-sewing plane which crashed into the spectators. More than a dozen others were injured, four critically.

The pilot, Milton P. Covert, 23, Columbia, Tenn., who with two companions escaped uninjured, was held in jail in another county on a technical charge of murder pending a hearing today. Covert was exonerated of blame by the manager of the exhibition and Sheriff M. W. Rhea, but the officer said he removed the pilot to a neighboring jail as a precautionary measure against possible violence.

The dead:
Boone Beard, 14; Kelly Towery, 23; Lawrence Smith, 23; Monroe Marbury, 37; Marvin Ashby, 39; Hurley Spray, 26; Rufus Wade Bonner, 5, negro; and Jasper Hielston, 40.

Four of the victims were decapitated by the propeller of the plane and the others were crushed by its weight.

Flyer and Boy Die
MILWAUKEE, Wis., April 28.—Albert Roden, 26, Saukville, Wis., aviator, and Harry Wagner, 15-year-old Graton, Wis., high school student, were killed yesterday when Roden's plane went into a nose dive at a height of 300 feet and crashed onto Holterhoff field.

Witnesses said the crash was apparently caused by a rudder jamming as the ship was preparing to land. Roden held a private pilot license.

Fahy Succumbs
GRAYLING, Mich., April 28.—Arrangements were made today to take the body of Herbert J. Fahy, widely known aviator, who died yesterday of injuries, to Washington for burial.

Fahy, who was 33 years old, was injured when a plane in which he was attempting to take off from a field on the estate of Cliff Burnant near Rossmore, Mich., turned over last Friday. He did not regain consciousness. His wife, Mrs. Claire Fahy, a well known aviatrix, was in a different cabin in the same plane. She escaped injury.

Among Fahy's accomplishments was a solo endurance flight of 36 hours, 56 minutes and 35 seconds, which established a record in May, 1929. He was employed recently as a test pilot and salesman for a Detroit aircraft manufacturer.
