

LOUGHRAN DROPS DISPUTED DECISION TO ERNIE SCHAAF

(Associated Press Local Wire)
PHILADELPHIA, April 29.—Tommy Loughran's heavyweight championship aspirations have received another severe jolt, this time at the hands of Ernie Schauf, 24-year-old Boston sailor boy.
Schauf belted his way to a referee's decision over the former light heavyweight titleholder in a sensational round battle here last night. One of the judges scored Loughran as the winner and the other voted for a draw.
The verdict of Referee Leo Loeck precipitated a noisy demonstration on the part of the fans. Police were called to disperse the crowd, which stormed about the center of the arena for several minutes after the final gong. Most of the fans declared that Loughran should have gotten no worse than a draw.
Tommy on the heels of his knock-out at the hands of Jack Sharkey last summer, the defeat in the opinion of experts, has lowered Loughran's heavyweight prospects materially.
A year ago Loughran, then holder of the light heavyweight title, won a decision over Schauf in Boston. But last night he found the Boston "Gob" a greatly improved fighter. Loughran, still the closer boxer of old, excelled in that department, but Schauf was by far the better fighter.
There were no knockdowns, but there were many hard blows exchanged and both men were bleeding from cuts on the face and over the eyes.

VELASCO WEDDING DECISION CAUSES BISHOP TO RESIGN

LEXINGTON, Ky., April 29.—The Rt. Rev. H. P. Almon Abbott, bishop of the Episcopal diocese of Lexington, tendered his resignation today to the standing committee and council of the diocese here. The bishop said that he was resigning because of the verdict in the recent trial of the Rev. Julia A. Velasco, a "reflection upon my integrity."
Bishop Abbott had brought Mr. Velasco to trial on charges he had violated a promise to resign his orders if he married a Catholic. The young Dayton, Ky., rector, was exonerated of all charges except that of using defamatory language to the bishop. The trial court which met here last week, ordered him admonished by Bishop Abbott for that. Mr. Velasco was married in January to Catherine Rogers of Baltimore, and the bishop's charges followed.

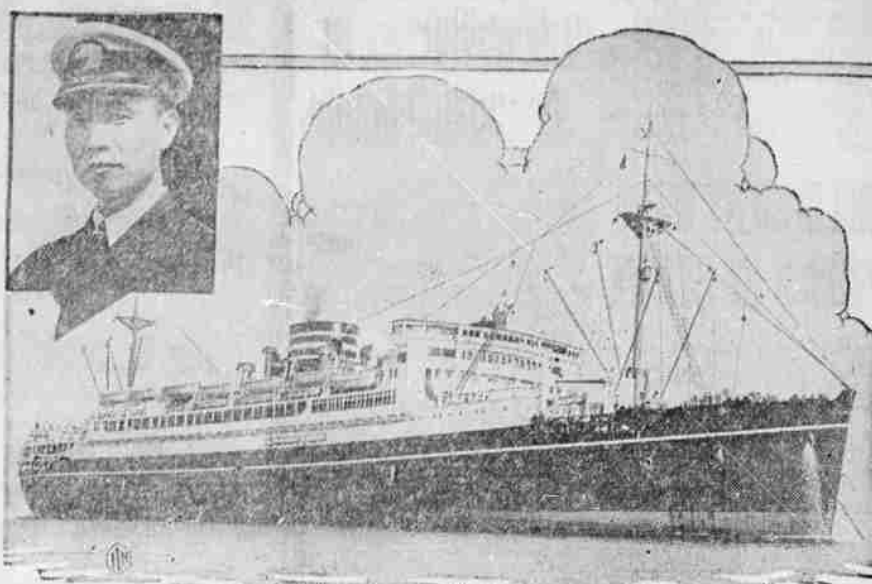
BARNES' CIRCUS TO SHOW HERE MAY 20

beyond the power of language to express." Senator Robinson said the American delegation throughout the sessions "cooperated in a spirit of nonpartisanship."
"It has seemed that political issues, entirely appropriate in connection with domestic problems, have no proper place in efforts to adjust relations in which all of our citizens have common interest."
"The limitation of naval armament under such terms as will promote friendship and good will among the peoples concerned, is a purpose in which the adherents of all political parties may join without the sacrifice of any principle worth advocating."

NEW YORK, April 29.—The American delegates to the London naval conference set foot again on United States soil today when they departed at the Battery to the cheers of 5,000 persons.

None of the delegates would make any formal statement excepting Ambassador Morrow, who said: "It is a good treaty, a good treaty for the United States, a step forward in the movement for world peace."

"Secretary Stimson is entitled to the highest credit for accomplishing the aims for which President Hoover sent the delegation abroad. By his high character, his great courage and his constant patience he earned the respect not only of his colleagues and helpers on the American delegation, but all of those at the conference."

to insure that "speculation be kept within reasonable bounds, and that it not be permitted to contribute in large degree toward bringing about business disaster."
The Worcester publisher further recorded an opinion that the "enthusiasm for railroad consolidation

tions and for the development of national systems has abated considerably."
"Certainly some shippers are beginning to feel that so far as transportation is concerned there is in regulation no adequate substitute for a certain amount of competition."
He said the electric light and power interests present "the railroad story all over again," he said there were "obvious weaknesses in federal regulation" of utilities and presented the view also that "state control of utilities has not been and is not now effective."

MORTUARY BEYOND CORPORATION RULE. VAN WINKLE HOLDS

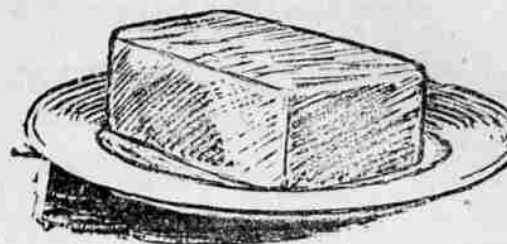
SALEM, Ore., April 29.—The Merrill mortuary, whose operations in Oregon have been protested by independent undertakers, is not subject to regulation by the state corporation department in the sale of burial service certificates, says an opinion by Attorney General Van Winkle. The attorney general holds, however, that the concern is prohibited by law from selling its permits under representation that they are sanctioned by the state.

When the concern came into Oregon about a year ago it was granted a permit by the corporation department to sell its burial certificates. Later the permit was cancelled by the department because the concern failed to file certain reports. When it applied for reinstatement a protest was made by the independent undertakers and a hearing was held about two weeks ago.

HOSPITAL CHANGE HURTS CITY CENSUS

PENDLETON, Ore., April 29.—A preliminary census report of Pendleton given today by C. McIntyre, district supervisor, listed 6,621 residents within the city limits. The 1929 population was 7,387, which included the Eastern Oregon state hospital patients. Hospital inmates were not counted this year as the institution is outside the city limits. There are 1,057 patients in the hospital, compared to 550 in 1929.

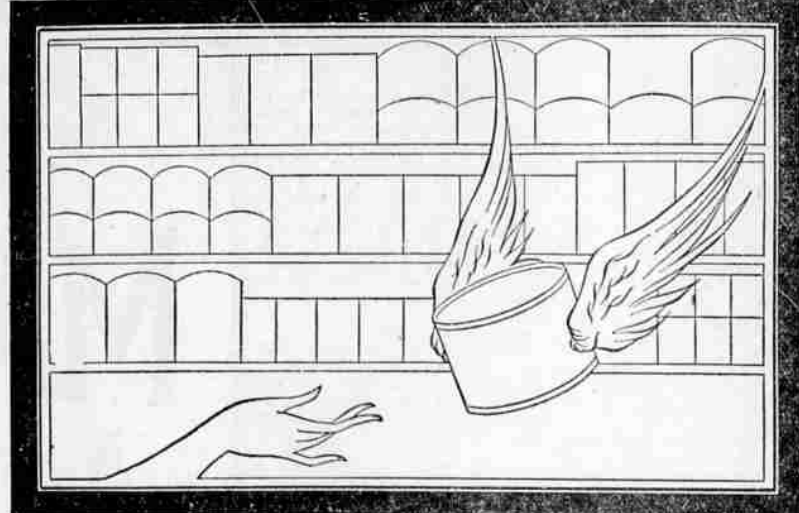
