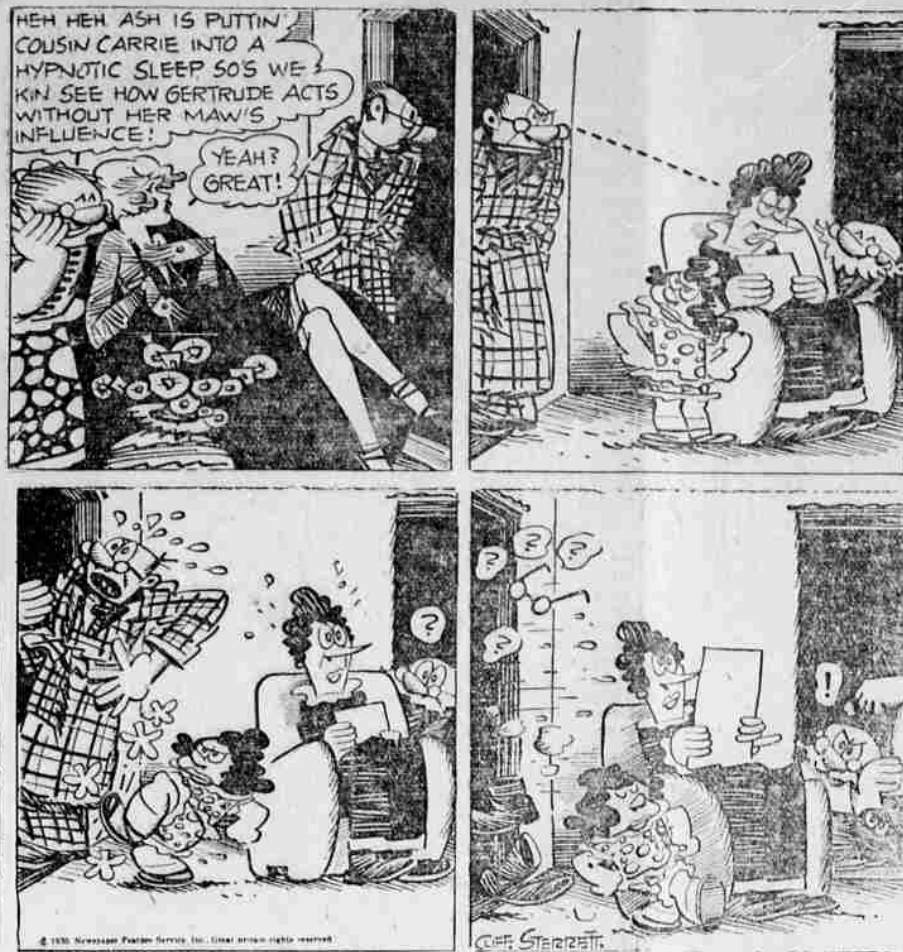

A GREAT DAY TO BE YOUNG

In a thundering power station at Niagara, on a wall of the dynamo-room, there hangs an arresting and startling placard. It reads: "Tradition is the enemy of progress."

If I were a young man, I should copy that placard and hang it on the wall of my own room. Why? Because it answers a question which is in the minds and on the lips of thousands of eager young men today. You—or perhaps your son, or your brother, or your nephew—are saying: "What chance is there for me to make my mark in the world?"

Even above the thunders of that great power station, the six words on that placard fairly shout the assurance that the chance is waiting for you. For, in those six words, which sum up the whole spirit of our industrial and commercial life today, there is an absolute guarantee that Opportunity never has knocked more loudly at the young man's door than at this very time.

You may say: "That sounds fine enough. But can you produce any evidence to back it up?"

Yes; I think I can.

In the first place, the helm of American business is now under the control of youthful leadership. When I say "youthful," I don't mean that the men who have this leadership are in their twenties, or thirties, or any other specified span of years. I use the term in a broader sense. I mean that they have a fresh, new outlook, an impatience with the past, an eagerness to hurry on and to discover what is just over the horizon of the hill.

That is the real essence of "youthfulness." And this restlessness, and eager ambition, this forward-looking urge of youth, are the dominant forces behind the drive of America's present-day business.—Dr. Julius Klein, assistant secretary of commerce in the American for February, 1930.

ADVENTIST CHURCH HERE DISRUPTED BY INTERNAL DISCORD

Fellowship Test Dispute Causes Disbanding of Organization; Some Members Ousted.

Declaring their allegiance to the testimony of Jesus and the commandment of God, but denying the prerogative of any ecclesiastical organization to demand or enforce any dogma, articles of faith or procedure not taught or lived by Jesus when he was on earth, a group of men and women, some of them communicants of the Seventh Day Adventist church since 1874, were ousted from membership in the Roseburg church at a series of meetings held here early in the week by T. B. Westbrook, president of the Southern Oregon Conference of Seventh Day Adventists, assisted by J. K. Fish, local pastor. The ouster came in the way of disbanding of the local church as the easiest way of getting rid of those who denied the right of any officials to create a system of espionage by making the matter of tithing a test of fellowship, or demanding that every communicant must recognize in the life and work of Mrs. E. G. White an infallible prophet.

Roster To Be Revised

Alleging that many members of the Seventh Day Adventist church, not only in Roseburg but in numerous localities, were out of harmony with the policies and teachings of the leaders of the denomination, T. B. Westbrook, of Eugene, spent two or three days in this city paying the way for the revision of the church roster and elimination of those who refused to subscribe to the doctrines laid down by ecclesiastical authorities.

In former years, it was stated by men present who had been in the organization since 1874, the Bible, and the Bible only, was accepted by the denomination as the only rule of faith and practice. The chief feature of this old-time position assumed by the leaders fifty years ago, it was made plain by those charged with heresy, was "the commandment of God and the faith of Jesus," and no other creed admitted as permissible or necessary.

In the articles of agreement, or the new creed, presented by T. B. Westbrook to the people seeking membership in the reorganized congregation, it was made obligatory upon all to pay into the conference treasury one tenth of one's income. In addition to this tenth of income, the agreement called for communicants to also pay into

the conference treasury free will offerings from week to week, to take active part in all campaigns inaugurated by the leaders for collection of funds for various projects from the public, such as "Big Week" and "Harvest Ingathering," both of which are annual events, while the paragraph relating to the alleged inspirational writings and visions of the late Mrs. E. G. White, stressed the belief of the applicant in claims to have been divinely bestowed upon the lady and exercised by her during her life.

Still another paragraph of the new creed presented for acceptance to those asking for membership in the reorganized congregation, exacted a promise that the lady would explicitly follow the leaders in all practices and religious instruction.

While other sections of this creed called for obedience, on the part of the lady, to the church's doctrines on health reform, dress reform, prohibiting the wearing of jewelry, a pledge to surrender one's own personal opinions and privileges to the government of the church and a pledge to attend all regular and special services, emphatic emphasis was given to those three articles of faith claiming prophetic power for Mrs. E. G. White, the payment of tithes and offerings, and that binding one's self to follow the instructions of leaders in all religious practices or forms, were the sections that caused many of the old membership, it was stated today, to refuse allegiance to the Seventh Day Adventist organization, or to any cult or religious sect or people sponsoring such complete renunciation and abandonment of all individual rights of conscience or privileges pertaining to the worship of God.

Many other matters of minor im-

portance concerning what the member may eat or drink were also a part of the program endorsed by the people composing the new organization.
