PROSPECTS SEEM BRIGHTER FOR O. K. ON JUDGE PARKER

Confirmation Vote Will Be
Close, However; Borah
Resumes Attack on
the Nominee.

Injunction in 'Yellow Dog'
Contract Case Issue in
Controversy Waged
in the Senate.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—Heartened by the belief that prospects were better for the confirmation of Judge John J. Parker as a supreme court justice, his friends in the senate today heard Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, resume his attack upon the nominee. Overnight developments led supporters of Judge Parker to feel that his chances were better, although it was yet felt the result would be extremely close.

Borah today again centered his attacks on Parker's ruling upholding an injunction in which the "yellow dog" contract was involved. Judge Parker today telegraphed a denial of published reports that he withheld evidence favorable to defendants in a war fraud case he prosecuted while assistant attorney general.

Borah Challenged
Senators Gillett, Massachusetts and Hastings, Delaware, republicans, challenged Borah's contention. Senator Gillett insisted that Parker was not committed to the position that the "yellow dog" contract cannot be broken even by peaceful persuasion. He and Hastings both insisted Parker had been bound by the supreme court.

Senator Gillett contended it made no difference whether public opinion held the labor contract in question obnoxious or illegal. Judge Parker got the "United" opinion of the supreme court telling him it was legal and was bound by that decision regardless of his own personal views.

"The supreme court is the law for the judges of the inferior courts," he continued, adding that the highest tribunal needed men upon it "who would not be bound by precedent as opposed to their own sincere convictions."

"Do you think Judge Parker is a man who would stand alone?" asked Senator Dill, democrat, Washington.

"From what I'm told he has," Gillett replied. Dill disagreed and expressed the opinion that Parker should have acted independently of the supreme court in the labor case.

HOUSE O. K.'S BILL ON VETS' AFFAIRS

WASHINGTON, April 29.—The Williamson bill to carry out President Hoover's plan to consolidate government agencies handling veterans' affairs was passed today by the house and sent to the senate. The vote was 190 to 41. Before passage, the house restored a provision to grant the president board authority to effect the consolidation of the veterans and pension bureau with the national home for disabled volunteer soldiers.

SQUATTER QUARTET TRIAL POSTPONED

PORTLAND, April 29.—Federal Judge McNary today allowed extension of time until May 4 for trial of Emory Davis, E. H. Best, J. E. Brahan and Edwin Martin, Unquema national forest squatters, charged with trespassing on a government reserve. Formal charge of trespass was filed against Martin on his appearance in court today with the other three defendants. J. K. Carson, attorney for the four, requested the time extension. Each of his clients has pleaded not guilty.

AIR MAIL CHANGED TO MILEAGE BASIS

WASHINGTON, April 29.—President Hoover today signed the Warren bill authorizing the postmaster general to award air mail contracts on a mileage and space basis instead of by weight. The bill, which is designed to stimulate commercial aviation, further authorizes the postmaster general to let airmail contracts to passenger lines in addition to changing the rate-making basis. The bill was sponsored by the postmaster general, who urged its enactment to eliminate what he termed unethical practices developed by some mail carriers to swell their volume.

TWO CHILDREN DIE IN APARTMENT FIRE

MINNEAPOLIS, April 29.—Two children were burned to death and five others were burned or injured seriously in a fire that swept the Washburn apartment building on the edge of the downtown district today.

More than 100 persons were driven into the streets by the fire, which firemen estimated caused about \$50,000 damage.

The dead are Loretta and Lorraine Carlberg, aged 6 and 8 respectively, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Carlberg. They were trapped in their room.

Mrs. Carlberg, severely burned and suffering from shock, was taken down a ladder by firemen and Carlberg, also seriously burned, leaped from the window into a net held by firemen.

Others were hurt less seriously.

Daniel Barnett, local Western Union messenger boy, was today notified that he was winner of second place in the Easter greeting message contest, staged by the company. STUDENTS RETURN FROM FARM MEET AT STATE COLLEGE

Maynard McCormack Only
Boy to Capture 2 Blue
Ribbons; 10 Receive
Highest Degree.

Agricultural students of the Roseburg senior high school have returned from the annual Smith-Hughes week-end conference at Corvallis, where the Oregon State college was host to 205 boys, representing 23 of the 34 Smith-Hughes agricultural departments of the state.

Roseburg was represented by Calvin Smith, Luther Ellison, Maynard McCormack, John Burck, Kl Lane Matthews and Harold Cloake, who were accompanied by their instructor, Homer Grow.

The boys stopped in Eugene on their way to Corvallis and inspected the egg packing plant of the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers association, arriving at the time the Douglas county shipment was being unloaded.

Thursday afternoon the boys reached Corvallis and were furnished with meal tickets, contest tickets and assignments to sleeping quarters, the local boys being housed at the Theta Delta Xi fraternity.

In the evening the annual meeting of the Oregon Association of Future Farmers of America was held in the home economics building and the officers and committees for the coming year were named. The annual basketball elimination contest was held at 8:30 o'clock in the gymnasium, notably winning the state championships.

Friday from 8 to 11 p. m. the boys participated in the grain and hay judging contest, poultry judging, egg grading, milk testing, feeding and breeding, row work, rubber cutting, blacksmithing, soldering, tool sharpening, dairy cow evaluation, livestock evaluation and tool identification. The public speaking contest was held in the women's gymnasium from 11 to 12 p. m. Douglas Bryan of the college was the subject of several demonstrations which were interesting and practical.

The afternoon ball game ended in the fourth inning because of rain.

Award Winners

Friday evening the boys enjoyed the annual get-together banquet

with Dean Jewell as toastmaster. A. D. Adams, director of vocational education, introduced the members of the state board of vocational education. Dr. A. B. Cordley awarded the Alpha Zeta essay contest cup and other prizes for the contests of Friday morning. Maynard McCormack of Roseburg won first place in dairy evaluation and livestock evaluation in competition with 125 boys in each class. He was the only boy present to win two blue ribbons.

Earl R. Cooley, state agricultural supervisor for vocational education, awarded the degree of Oregon State Farmer, the highest degree in the Future Farmers of America. Then boys received this honor and three of the ten had projects last year netting them over \$1,000 each.

Saturday morning a tour was made of the various college agricultural departments followed by a swim in the natatorium of the men's gym. The conference ended Saturday noon.

5380 ARRESTS AND 1947 STILLS, MARCH FEDERAL RECORD

WASHINGTON, April 29.—Prohibition Commissioner Dorian announced today that during March 1,947 stills had been seized by prohibition agents and a total of 5,380 prohibition arrests made.

The commissioner said 38 stills operating on molasses had been captured and 436 gallons of mash taken; 263 cane and beet sugar stills with 164,285 pounds of sugar; 685 cane and beet sugar stills in which 975,978 gallons of mash were seized; 126 stills operating on corn sugar with seizure of 232,196 pounds of corn sugar; 698 stills with 1,190,496 gallons of corn sugar mash; 110 stills operating on corn meal and other grain in which 24,696 pounds of the grains were seized.

Eighty-eight stills along with 47,750 gallons of corn meal and other grain mash was captured, and 35 stills operating on denatured alcohol and alcoholic preparations in which 24,795 gallons of the mixture were seized.

In listing the number of stills there were some duplication in some of them found to be operating on more than one of the various bases were listed under both.
