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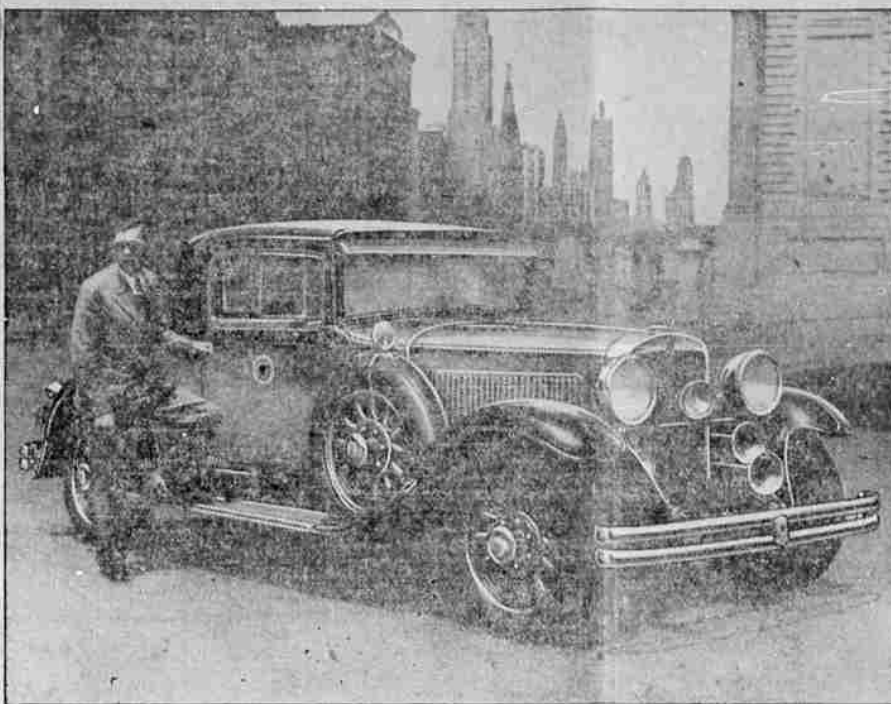
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Ready to Map the Long Trails

PORTLAND DUCKS BEAT HOLLYWOOD BY 3-RUN RALLY

A revised lineup with Joe Bowman, an outfielder playing third base, helped the Portland Ducks defeat the Hollywood Stars, 5 to 3, in a free-hitting game at Portland yesterday. The Ducks came from behind to score three runs in the seventh inning. "Junk" Walters, pitching his first game since the opening week of the season, was the winning hurler.

Yesterday, for the fifteenth straight time, San Francisco defeated Sacramento by a score of 8 to 6. Ray Keating and his spitball were unequal to the occasion. Los Angeles saw red yesterday when the Oakland aggregation visited Wigley field for the first time this season. They won 5 to 4. Howard Craghead, pitcher, scored the winning run after hitting a double to open the ninth inning. Ken Douglas, southpaw of the Missions, stopped a ninth inning rally by the Seattle Indians and the former team won 2 to 1. A home run by Bill Ronda, Mission shortstop, in the eighth inning was the winning hit.

CARNERA AND AIDES SUSPENDED BY N. Y.

NEW YORK, April 30.—Primo Carnera and four members of his managerial staff today were suspended by the New York state athletic commission. The suspension followed disciplinary action by California boxing authorities growing out of the big Italian's questionable bout with Leon Chevalier at Oakland. Three members of Chevalier's staff were declared ineligible, as they did not hold New York licenses.

In addition to Carnera, the suspensions included his manager, Leon See and Billy Duffy, Walter Friedman and Frank Churchill. The latter is Carnera's western representative, and also is manager of Tod Morgan, former junior lightweight champion, a title which has been legislated out of existence.

The trio declared ineligible were Tim McGrath, Chevalier's manager, Bob Perry, a second who threw in a towel in the Oakland bout and Bob Laga, who also was in Chevalier's corner.

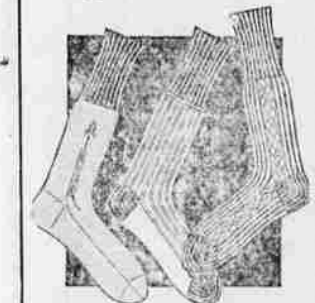
