PORTLAND, Ore., April 30.—One man was injured and several thousand dollars damage resulted late yesterday when a Spokane, Portland & Seattle mixed train left the rails near Goldendale, Wash.

There was one passenger coach in the train but it remained upright and no one in it was injured. Several freight cars tipped over. COLORS ENHANCE VALUE OF AUTOS

Operators of trucks, busses, delivery cars and all other types of commercial vehicles can increase the value of their investment by giving more attention to suitable color combinations for finish and lettering, according to Howard E. Sneathen, director of truck sales for Dodge Brothers.

"The appearance of delivery units today can be made a definite business asset," said Mr. Sneathen. "The character of the business may be expressed to the customer and to the public by the truck as it travels over the streets and highways if the owner will take the pains with colors and the lettering on it that he does in dressing his windows or in preparing his advertising for newspapers and magazines."

"For instance the vehicle may be made to look long, graceful and powerful or else short, squat and freakish depending upon the choice of colors and lettering. Elongated, perpendicular letters that appear loud and flashy often defeat the purpose for which they are intended. They may be visible for considerable distance but because of their bizarre design scarcely readable even at close range. They may spoil the appearance of the entire vehicle and undo the whole effect of presenting a sales message."

"In all busses, color combinations and color distribution should be selected and arranged to express stability and dependability. The darker, heavier shades should always be confined to the chassis and lower parts of the body. The lighter shades should be used on the upper structure. This will avoid any suggestion of top-heaviness or tendency to tip and put emphasis on the roadability and massiveness of the vehicle. "Cream and pastel shades will serve to create an air of spaciousness when used for interior finish in busses. A blending of the softer greens will tend to make the passengers feel more comfortable on long trips."
