COURT HOUSE YARD TREES UNDERGOING TRIMMING

The county court is making considerable improvement in the appearance of the courthouse yard by a thorough pruning of the tall loc-

ust trees that surround the building. Clinton Gorthy had been employed to do the work and is cutting out dead branches and shaping the trees. Nothing of this kind has been done for several years, and a very noticeable improvement is resulting.

PAROLED PRISONERS PAY OFFICERS WATCHING THEM

NASHVILLE, Tenn., April 29.—Paroled prisoners in Tennessee put up money to capture themselves if they break faith with the state. This, according to Fred Neuf, parole officer, accounts for the fact that about 80 per cent of those paroled make good.
Employment is obtained for all prisoners before they are released on parole at never less than \$20 a month and board. The freed man signs an agreement to pay the state \$2 a month out of his wages. This money is used to pay salaries of parole officers who check up on the state's charges.
Employers turn over to the state one-third of the paroled man's wages, which is held and returned to the prisoner when he is finally discharged.

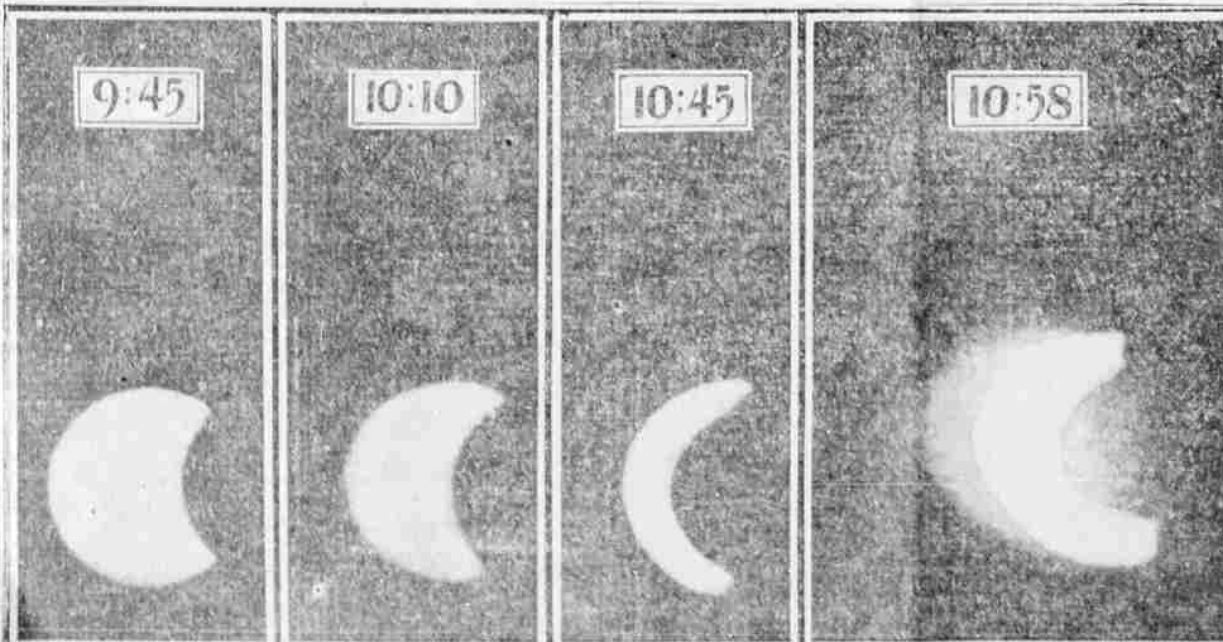

22-POUND UMPQUA CHINOOK LANDED WITH 8-OUNCE ROD

Pasadena Visitor's Catch
Believed Light Tackle
Record: Delighted
With Region.

What is believed to be a record catch with light tackle on the Umpqua river was made today by E. F. Kohler of Pasadena, who this morning landed a 22-pound chinook salmon using an 8-ounce steel rod and No. 2 trout spinner.

Mr. Kohler was fishing with Ed Payton at Umpqua bridge and had just started to let his trout outfit drift into the edge of a fast eddy, when the chinook struck. For twenty minutes the fisherman had a thrilling battle. Mr. Payton handled the boat as skillfully as possible to aid the lucky fisherman, who used every trick he knew to hold the big fish. The salmon was finally brought up to the boat where it could be reached with a gaff hook and was safely drawn in.

While larger salmon have been caught in the Umpqua, it is not believed that such a large fish was ever caught on such light tackle. Mr. Kohler was not fishing for salmon and was using only a light trout outfit.

"I came a thousand miles to fish the Umpqua river," Mr. Kohler said, "and if I don't do another day's fishing the trip will have proved worth while."

Mr. Kohler, however, will do a lot more fishing this summer. He came to the Umpqua two years ago from Grants Pass, after he became acquainted there with Earl Vosburgh, who induced him to come from the Rogue river to try his luck in the Umpqua.

After a trip to Idleyd, Mr. Kohler moved his camp from the Rogue to the Umpqua and spent several weeks fishing. He came back last spring and then returned again in the fall, bringing nine of his friends with him.

This spring he closed up his home in Pasadena and came to Roseburg to spend the entire summer. Mr. Kohler is an ardent booster for the Umpqua river and during the winter has been contacting many of his friends and has been urging them to come to the Umpqua this year. He states that he expects a great many of them to come to Roseburg soon. He is endeavoring to hurry them up by sending them a picture of the wonderful catch he made today.

"HEAVEN HELP US," WAIL FROM BERLIN

BERLIN, April 29.—"Der Aufrechte," the monarchist die-hard periodical which still carries the subscription "With God for Kaiser and Reich," has finally broken with its old, President Hindenburg, over the latter's signature of the Young plan.

In a mournful editorial the paper said that "now indeed the last illusion is gone, and the last earthly support broken." It admonishes its readers to place their trust in God. "Who will grant the German nation victory again in His own good time."

Simultaneously, a call was published by the ex-kaiser's fifth son, Prince Oscar of Prussia, urging protestant nobles to choose the church as a career for their sons.

As chief of the Brandenburg division of the Knights of the Order of St. John, the prince launched his appeal to the nobility as being the true carriers of the traditional Prussian virtues, so that these may be infused into the youth of the country. He said:

"If many of our beloved old army barracks are now closed, our churches are still open and are crying aloud for faithful shepherds to guide our poor people the way they should go."

HOOVER NOMINATES

GANDHI PREPARES FOR ANOTHER BLOW AT SALT MONOPOLY

Another of His Sons, Also
Follower, Sentenced to
Prison on Charge
of Sedition.

BILIMORIA, Gujarat, Bombay, April 29.—Mahatma Gandhi, leader of the Indian nationalist cause, today laid down a rigorous code for selection of those followers who will march with him to Dharasana to raid the salt depots there. The requirements include proficiency in carding, spinning and in the manufacture of imitation spinning wheels.

Prominent women in Gujarat last night dispatched a letter to Viceroy Lord Irwin expressing sympathy with Gandhi's campaign of civil disobedience to the salt laws.

NEW DELHI, India, April 29.—Dev Das Gandhi, youngest son of Mahatma Gandhi, Indian nationalist leader, today was sentenced to one year's rigorous imprisonment.

He had been charged with sedition in a statement before the court yesterday he said: "The moral wrong done my country by Great Britain has no parallel in history and even surpasses the material wrong which requires to be declared from the house tops."

"This is the second son of Gandhi to be sentenced to prison during the present disobedience campaign. The first was sentenced to six months rigorous imprisonment for defiance of the salt laws.
Ramanand Sanyal, a preacher, today was sentenced to two years rigorous imprisonment on the charge of sedition.

BOMBAY, India, April 29.—A government communique today detailed reports the salt duty would be abolished or reduced.

Such reports had led traders to cancel orders or take up only sufficient quantities for immediate needs, with a consequent rise in salt prices in several districts.

The communique points out that only a few weeks remain in which salt can be removed from the salt works because of the advent of monsoons, and says if traders hold up business in the belief the duty will be abolished a salt famine with a severe rise in prices will follow.

SHANGHAI'S RICH ORGANIZE TO FIGHT KIDNAPPING PERIL

SHANGHAI, April 29.—Because the business of abducting rich men in Shanghai has become more a game of hide and seek than crime, the wealthy residents of the city have formed the Anti-Kidnapping society.

To become a member, one need only be rich and thus a target for the kidnapers. The society urges immediate execution of all convicted kidnapers and seeks to teach rich men how to avoid being taken. Kidnappings are every-day occurrences and no Chinese of means dares to drive down the street, even in daylight, without an armed bodyguard. But the guards and chauffeurs are not always trustworthy and often cases are reported in which these servants have "put the finger" on their employer. The wealthy bankers, merchants and brokers are constantly devising schemes to out-guess the gangsters. Some of them wear coolie clothes to hide the fact, but they possess money. They seldom take the same route twice between their homes and places of business and every new plan for protection that occurs to a rich man is passed along to others.

NEWTON D. BAKER HAS CHANGE FOR THE BETTER

Baker was suffering from bronchial pneumonia today, but physicians said there was no cause for alarm so long as he continued to show the improvement noted last night. Baker has been confined to his home since attending a democratic rally Saturday night.
