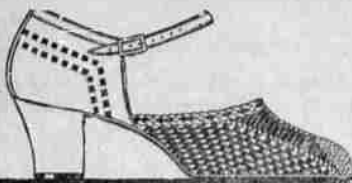

MRS. MCCORMICK ADMITS SPENDING \$252,500 IN RACE

Money From Own Purse,
Committee Informed;
Deneen's Expense
Put at \$24,493.

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Informed today by Mrs. Ruth Hanna McCormick that she spent \$252,500 from her own purse in her successful race for Illinois republican senatorial nomination, Chairman Nye of the senate campaign funds investigating committee said "we will investigate this thoroughly."

The committee held a lengthy closed session after Mrs. McCormick testified.

In connection with his subsequent announcement, Chairman Nye indicated the commission would go to Illinois to make its inquiry "after we have digested" the detailed statement submitted by Mrs. McCormick.

The republican nominee, who was the first witness before the committee, said she received no contributions except some from members of her family.

She added she was supported by only two organizations in Cook county—the voters progress club and the Ruth Hanna McCormick volunteers.

Close Scrutiny Asked

Mrs. McCormick read a statement in which she urged that legislation be enacted to provide a closer scrutiny of all campaign activities by senatorial candidates.

"I could not undertake to make a statement of expenditures in my recent campaign," she said, "for I do not know what period such a statement should cover. When does a candidate for the senate become a candidate?"

"One of my opponents in the recent primary formally announced his candidacy, but had been organizing and campaigning for two years in advance of the primaries."

"Another of my opponents announced his candidacy in mid-winter and two others entered the race merely by filing their names with the secretary of state."

"New legislation should also take into account the necessity of checking up on money expenditure in a campaign as against opposition in the form of patronage influence, patronage promises and the use of payrollers in canvassing the districts."

"A law is needed, both in the public interest and in justice to the candidates themselves."

Senator Deneen informed the committee his losing campaign against Mrs. McCormick cost him a total of \$24,493.

JUSTICE HUGHES' DAUGHTER TO WED LAW FIRM MEMBER

NEW YORK, May 1.—Chief Justice and Mrs. Charles Evans Hughes have announced the engagement of their daughter, Miss Elizabeth Evans Hughes, to William T. Gossett, an attorney associated with the law firm of which Mr. Hughes formerly was head.

Miss Hughes recently was graduated from Barnard college. Mr. Gossett, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Gossett of Salt Lake City, Utah, was graduated from the Columbia law school in 1928. He is now with the firm of Hughes, Schurman and Dwight of New York.

No date has been set for the wedding.

LAWYER LESSARD QUILTS PORTLAND BABY CASE

PORTLAND, May 1.—Dellmore Lessard, attorney for Mrs. George F. Schaefer, today announced that he had withdrawn from the Schaefer "baby mystery case."

His withdrawal is understood to have been the result of a dispute over contemplated use of a certain witness and introduction of certain testimony in a hearing to be held Monday to determine parentage of Georgianna Jane, 4-month-old "mystery baby."

The baby is claimed by Mrs. Schaefer and by Geraldine Watson, each of who contends she gave birth to the child.

GOLDSBOROUGH ON WING AGAIN AFTER NIGHT ON DESERT

EL PASO, May 1.—Frank Goldsborough, 19-year-old transcontinental flier, arrived here today.

The flier was forced down by darkness last night on the desert between Midland and El Paso about 10 miles east of here, he said. He spent the night in his ship and took off at daylight for El Paso.

In the takeoff he struck a telephone pole and one wing was damaged but did not prevent him from continuing his trip here. The ship is being repaired at El Paso air port. Goldsborough said he would continue to Tucson, Ariz., today.

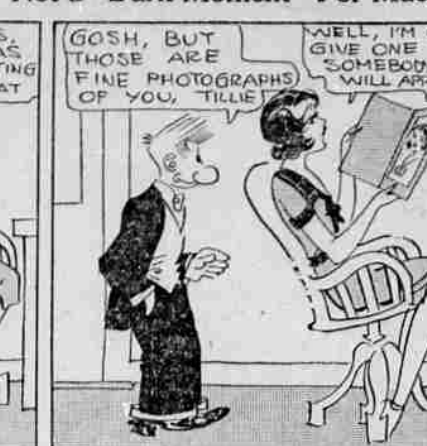

CHICAGO, May 1.—Tuffy Griffiths, of Sioux City, Ia., today was back on the list of contenders for the world heavyweight boxing championship, the stain of a technical knockout defeat by Jack Gagnon removed from his record by a 10-round decision victory over the Boston sailor last night.

LOCAL GUARDSMEN DO WELL IN SMALL ARMS TOURNEY

Roseburg national guardsmen made an excellent record in the 102nd infantry individual small arms championship match fired April 6, according to word received here today. The match was fired on a standard indoor target at a 50-foot range, the marksmen shooting 10 shots from prone position and 10 standing.

Private S. Karlinger took third place in the state with a score of 178, making 95 prone and 83 standing. He won a handsome bronze medal for this achievement. Private S. C. Dunlap was 10th with a score of 157; Lieutenant Morris Bowler was 12th with 155 and Private S. Bernish was 15th with 149.

Others who won places in the match were Private Jack Gibbs, 133; Corporal Bonebrake, 128; Corporal Kenneth Clark, 128; Sergeant Frank Erno, 114; Private D. Shoemaker, 112.

The company received the congratulations of Lieutenant Colonel Fred M. West, chief of small arms firing, for the excellent showing made in the regimental contest.

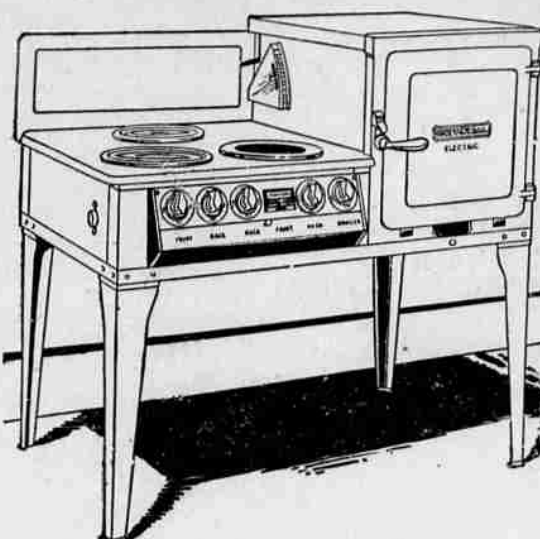
