

ENMITY TO PARKER DECLARED BASED ON CULPABLE GROUND

Senator Hastings' Charge
Followed by Letter
to Show Playing
of Politics.

WASHINGTON, April 30.—Opposition to Judge Parker of North Carolina, as a member of the supreme court was said in the senate today by Senator Hastings, republican, Delaware, to have been "stirred up by the liberals as an opening wedge to their plans."
Conceding the defeat of Judge Parker, Senator Hastings asserted, "It is not the Red Jacket Coal company decision that is about to defeat Parker."
"I think it may be true that the liberals are stirring the country and the senate to reject this man as an opening wedge to their plan," he continued. "It is demanded now that nominees for the supreme court bench shall be liberals and no longer conservative. That not only is a dangerous policy but a culpable one."
"I resent the effort of the laboring man to come here and undertake to control the only independent body of this country. I say it will bring chaos. I am in favor of giving him legislation, but I am not in favor of giving him legislation contrary to the constitution."
Senator Wagner of New York was as severe in his opposition to the nominee.
Senator McKellar read to the senate a letter by Joseph M. Dixon, assistant secretary of the Interior, to Walter Newton, executive secretary to President Hoover, urging the nomination of Judge Parker to the supreme court as "a major political stroke."
The letter, dated March 3, stated that Dixon was a native born North Carolinian and called attention that North Carolina gave President Hoover a majority of 65,000. Dixon was a candidate for the senate as a republican in Montana last year.
"If the exigencies of the situation permit," said the Dixon letter, "I believe the naming of Judge Parker to the supreme court would be a major political stroke." Senator McKellar said he did not contend that President Hoover was influenced by the letter but he argued that friends of Parker should not charge politics in the fight against him in the face of this letter.
Senator Walsh, democrat, Massachusetts, noted the date of the letter and said, "The letter was apparently written before the body of the late Justice Sanford was very cold."

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P. E. THOMPSON TO BE SUPERVISOR OF CASCADE FOREST

EUGENE, Ore., May 1.—Perry E. Thompson, supervisor of the Colville national forest, with headquarters at Republic, Washington, will be appointed supervisor of the Cascade national forest, according to a message from Major John D. Guthrie, assistant district forester in Portland. Mr. Thompson will succeed Nelson F. MacLuff, who was shot and killed near McKenzie Bridge, April 5.
Mr. Thompson will assume his duties at the Eugene office of the forest service May 15. It was announced. He has been supervisor of the Colville forest for the past three years and prior to his appointment to that post he was assistant supervisor of the Whitman national forest with headquarters at Baker, Ore., and before that was assistant supervisor of the Malheur national forest with headquarters at John Day, Ore.
Mr. Thompson is a World War veteran, having entered the army as a private in the engineering corps and come out as a lieutenant in the aviation corps.

LINDY RESUMES AIR MAIL FLIGHT

COLON, Canal Zone, May 1.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, homeward bound, took off this morning for Puerto Cabezas, Nicaragua, carrying 201 pounds of Montevideo-New York airmail. The colonel planned to continue to Miami tomorrow delivering the mail there to a regular New York plane.

CAPTURED PRIEST TAKEN FROM CHINESE

SHANGHAI, May 1.—Jesuit Fr. Anking, capital of Anhwei province, telegraphed today that Taihu and Hwoshan, Anhwei, had been taken by bandits April 27, and that the Rev. Julio Herrera, Spanish priest who had been captured by the outlaws, had been rescued by provincial troops on the same day. The Rev. Father Herrera was taken to Anking.

The fate of Fathers Hidalgo and

Avila, who were believed to have fallen into the hands of the bandits, was unknown but provincial authorities promised to undertake their rescue.

JAP SHIP GOES TO PIECES; CREW SAFE

TOKYO, May 1.—A boat of the Imperial life saving service effected the rescue of the 39 members of the crew of the Luzon Maru, Japanese freighter which ran aground yesterday on the rocks near Cape Inubo, Ibaraki prefecture. None of the Luzon Maru's crew was injured but they were suffering from exhaustion. The grounded steamer broke into three parts.

J. B. BELL, SENATOR FROM EUGENE, DIES

PORTLAND, Ore., May 1.—State Senator John B. Bell of Linn and Lane counties died Wednesday at the Veterans hospital. He was a veteran of the Spanish war. He was operated on Monday.

Bell, resident of Eugene, was elected joint senator from Linn and Lane counties in 1918, serving in the 1919 and 1921 sessions, and two special sessions in 1920 and 1921. He was a member of the "Faithful Fourteen" that opposed the Portland fair in the legislature. He again served after 1916, when appointed by the Lane county republican central committee as nominee when L. E. Bean resigned. He was elected in his own right again in 1928.

Bell was joint author of the bill which abolished the boards of regents of the state educational institutions and established the board of higher education.

DANGER OF DWARF PROBLEM FORESEEN

DEL MONTE, Calif., April 30.—Dr. George M. Curtis, associate professor of surgery, University of Chicago, in an address here today told the California Medical association that a race of dwarfs may spring up in the United States to present unusual medical and social problems.
In his talk on cretinism, Dr. Curtis pointed out cretinism was a thyroid gland disease definitely associated with goitre and confined principally to mountainous districts. He said cretins or mid-gets are becoming a problem as their numbers increase in the Alps, Himalayas, Andes and Carpathian mountains, and asserted there is danger of cretinism in the Pacific northwest.

He urged iodization of water and improved sanitary conditions to prevent further increase in the number of dwarfs and goitre cases in the region.

TOKYO ROCKED BY 5-MINUTE QUAKE

TOKYO, May 1.—An earthquake of unusual strength and duration shaking Tokyo shortly after mid-

night did no great damage. There were no reports of casualties.
The tremor's epicenter was reckoned as probably at sea, 75 miles north of Tokyo. Seismographs registered the quake for 30 minutes after its start at 12:58 a. m. Residents felt it for a full five minutes.

OKLAHOMA RIVERS INUNDATE TOWNS

OKLAHOMA CITY, April 30.—Two rivers presented flood menaces today in eastern Oklahoma as drought breaking rains overdid themselves.

More than 100 homes in Picher were flooded by Chat creek, a tributary of Neosho river, which also was approaching flood stages to threaten a part of the residence section of Miami.

At Bartlesville, the Caney river was threatening a repetition of the flood of October, 1926, when a considerable portion of the city was inundated.
