AMERICAN LEGION AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES

National President of Auxiliary to Visit Oregon

Mrs. Donald Macrae of Council Bluffs, Iowa, national president of the American Legion auxiliary, who makes her official visit to Oregon within a few weeks is one of the outstanding women in the United States in a organization work. She comes from a long line of distinguished statesmen. Her ancestors on both the maternal and paternal side of the family won distinction during the Revolutionary war.

Her husband, Colonel Donald Macrae, served as surgeon in the Spanish-American war, the Mexican trouble and the World War. Her son also served in the World War and attained the rank of captain and her daughter served with the motor transport corps of Council Bluffs.

Is Woman of Outstanding Achievements

During the Spanish-American war Mrs. Macrae helped to organize the Comfort club whose membership consisted of the women folks of the men in war. Through her efforts in this club and her own individual efforts, large sums of money were raised to supply the needs of the soldiers. When the United States entered the World War her husband organized a medical unit and left for New York. With her usual dispatch, Mrs. Macrae immediately prepared to do her bit. She sold her automobile, discharged her servants and was the moving factor in the organization of the Unit K club.

Each morning found her on duty at 8:30 o'clock and she with the other mothers, wives and sisters of service men, made bandages and knitted. The Comfort club was also revived and these two organizations were very active in supplying the needs of the men and women in service. Since the World War Mrs. Macrae has taken an active interest in a number of worth-while organizations but her main efforts have centered around the American Legion auxiliary. An account of her connection with the auxiliary is a chronicle of many

places of honor and service which she has held with great honor to herself and the organization.

Has Held Many Places of Honor

Mrs. Macrae came to Oregon with a thorough knowledge of auxiliary work in all its phases on her service in the organization since its inception. She is a charter member of the auxiliary unit at Council Bluffs, Iowa, and at all times has been very active. In 1921 she served as state auxiliary president of Iowa and during her regime a remarkable growth in membership and influence was attained.

She was re-elected to the department presidency in 1922 and the membership showed a steady increase. During both years she served as state president, the state of Iowa led all other states in membership. In 1921-22 she served as chairman of the national child welfare committee and was Iowa's representative on the national executive committee. In 1922-23 she again served as a member of the national executive committee and was national vice-president of the central division. In recognition of her splendid service, she was made a life member of the department executive committee in 1923. In 1924-25 she was chairman of the department rehabilitation committee and was unit Americanism chairman. Her service on the unit executive committee dates from the organization of the unit. In 1925-26 she was national membership chairman and department chairman. In 1926-27 she was department and unit Americanism chairman, national chairman of the past presidents' parley and unit president. In 1928-29 she served as department finance chairman, national Aloha chairman, unit national defense chairman and central division regional chairman of the past presidents' parley.

Her position has been won by real ability and long years of willing service and auxiliaries are looking forward with anticipation to her official visit to Oregon in the near future.
