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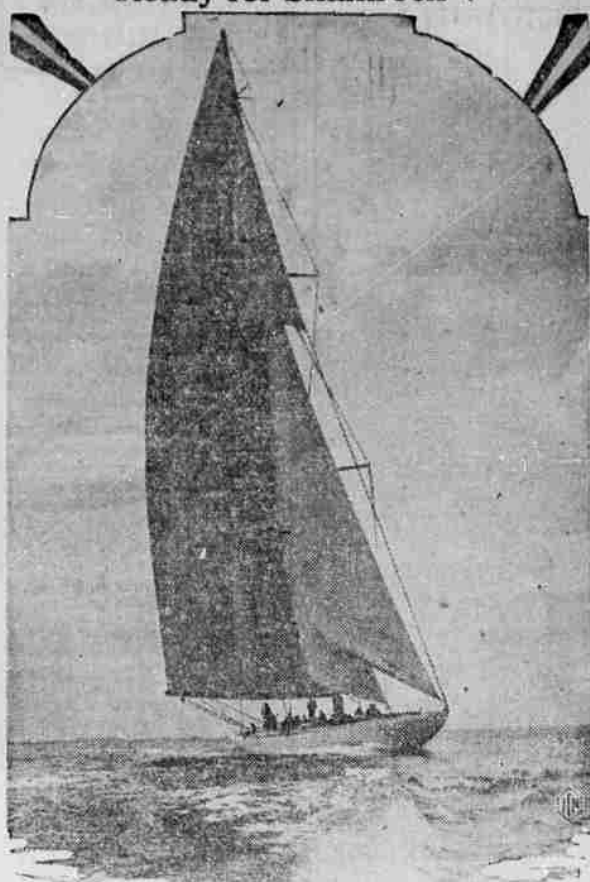
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Ready for Shamrock V

DUCKS SPLIT TWO WITH HOLLYWOOD BUT TAKE SERIES

The Portland Ducks won the series from the Hollywood Stars, four games to two, splitting a double header with the movie city team yesterday. The Ducks took the forenoon game, 8 to 3, after a spirited contest which was featured by a fight between Chatham of Portland and Pitcher Wetzel of the Stars. The Ducks felt that Wetzel was a bit too careless in "beating" Orwoll in the eighth. Walter "the Great" Malls shut out the Stars for seven innings in the second game only to have Hollywood rally in the eighth to score five runs and tally four times in the ninth to win 9 to 2.

The Sacramento Senators not only broke a two-year losing streak to the San Francisco Seals last week but also moved into the favored position in the Coast league standings by virtue of a series victory over the locals, four games to three. The Senators wound up the series in impressive style taking a double-header from the Seals at Recreation park yesterday. Fay Thomas pitched masterful ball to give the Senators the morning game 7 to 2 while Zinn and Freitas gave a fine exhibition to win the nightcap, 4 to 3.

The Los Angeles Angels also climbed in second place after walloping the Oakland Oaks, league leaders last week, in a double header. Truck Hannah homered over left wall of Wrigley field with two men on bases to give the Angels the morning fracas, 3 to 2, while Ballou held the Oaks to six scattered hits with his teammates bunching timely bingles to win the nightcap, 5 to 2.

Fortunately the day was very favorable and a very interesting shoot was conducted.

Grover Southern of Coquille was winner of the men's target event with a score of 1294. Henry Barr and John Store, also of Coquille, took second and third places with 1062 and 1013 respectively.

The ladies' target shoot was won by Mrs. Trachsel of Sweetwater, with a score of 874. Mrs. Beale of Portland was second with 866, and Mrs. Thompson of Corvallis third with 734.

In the men's flight shoot, Dr. George Cathey of Portland was first with 350 yards; Homer Prouty, Portland, second with 355 yards, and Mr. Store of Coquille, third with 315 yards. Mrs. Thompson of Corvallis, won the ladies' flight shoot with 238 yards, Mrs. Harris of Coquille, second and Mrs. Earl Ulrich of Roseburg, third.

Homer Prouty was first in the men's clout event, and Mrs. Harris was first for the ladies. Mr. Prouty was also winner of the field event, scoring 29 points. Mr. McLaughlin of Corvallis was first in the target, flight and clout events for the intermediate class and Mr. Hammock of Coquille first in the same events for the novice class.

The tournament was held at the government rifle range and prizes of cups, medals, archery tackle and merchandise were awarded.

When "White Wings" was first produced in New York at the Booth theatre in 1926 it created a furor of delight among the reviewers as one of the best comedies that had opened there in many a year.

"White Wings" is a readily comical and stimulates one's imagination and taste for seeing it translated in stage dimensions.

PRESBYTERIAN PLAN FOR ORDAINING OF WOMEN DEFEATED

PHILADELPHIA, May 5.—Announcement was made today at the offices of the Presbyterian general assembly that the overtone which would permit women to become ordained ministers in the Presbyterian church in the U. S. A. had been defeated. Returns received today showed that 101 presbyteries voted for the overtone and 149 against. It requires a majority of 147 of the 293 presbyteries to adopt an overtone.

The results of the vote on the overtone permitting women to become elders in the church was in doubt today. The vote up to date was 142 for and 108 against.

The vote cast for the overtone permitting women to become licensed evangelists today stood 131 yes and 115 no.

HAWLEY'S SLOGAN BADLY HANDLED

SALEM, Ore., May 5.—The secretary of state's office was startled today when it discovered that on bills sent out to Marion county precincts, instead of the slogan, "No interests to serve but the public interests," that Congressman W. C. Hawley has used for many years, it appeared on the ballots "No interests to serve but the party interests." A check with the secretary of state's records show that it was correct in the official certification, as the error apparently falls either on the Marion county clerk or on the printer who printed the ballots.
