DRY AGENTS WITH BOOZE LIBERATED TO 'WORK ON CASE'

PORTLAND, May 6.—Arrival of two federal prohibition operatives last night on liquor charges, was followed this morning by their release on their own recognizance, and departure of one of them for Medford in company with the federal prohibition field agent of Oregon. Federal officers said the two men were working on a "big case." When Patrolman O'Halloran and his squad raided a westside place last night they found prohibition Agent Moon and ten gallons of liquor in his automobile, parked just outside the establishment, police reports said. Jack Grant, said to be an undercover man, had just entered the place, where police seized a quantity of liquor. At police headquarters where the pair was taken, Moon, who said his name was Earl Bradley, produced credentials tending to show his connection with government dry forces.

Police said Prohibition Field Agent Shirley asked that Moon and Grant be released. They were released on their own recognizance pending appearance in police court on possession charges. Shirley explained that he wanted to take Moon out of town today, and police later were informed that the two had gone to Medford, where they were working on a "big case." Moon, told police, he and Grant were required to deliver to liquor. They were delivering the liquor, he was quoted as saying, but were not taking money.

WET BLOC DEMANDS WITHHELD REPORTS

WASHINGTON, May 6.—An appeal for representatives opposed to prohibition to sign petitions instructing the judiciary committee to report anti-Volstead measures was addressed to the house today by Representative Litchicum, chairman of the wet bloc. None of the bills before the committee, which held extended hearings, has been reported. Litchicum directed attention to petitions by Representative LaGuardia, republican, New York to have his modification resolution to permit the sale of 2.75 beer reported and Representative Marty T. Norton, democrat, New York, for a national referendum.

To place a measure before the house by petition, signatures of a majority are required.

She said nothing to her associates about the message, but rearranged her program in order to sing first his favorite song, "Beautiful Blue Danube." She hoped that somehow he might hear it.

After singing two numbers she collapsed and was taken to her home. Even then she did not tell the reason for her breakdown. Late Sunday night word came of her father's death.

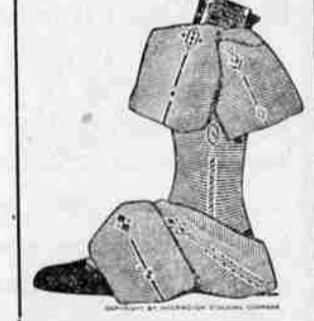

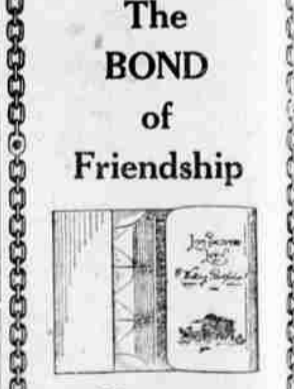
