

BARNES CIRCUS TO SHOW IN ROSEBURG; EVERYTHING NEW

Bright and gay posters adorn the walls, sheds and billboards of Roseburg while colorful lithographs depicting the wonders of the Al. G. Barnes circus, hang in store windows. They all tell of the coming of this famous circus for two exhibitions on Tuesday, May 20, at Bellows field.

Two score of advance billing agents have visited this city within the past few days and the herculean task has been well accomplished. In town the choice available locations have been posted or lithographed and in the surrounding countryside advantageous spots mark the visit of these advance representatives.

Great interest attaches to the coming of the Al. G. Barnes circus, because it is the world's largest

trained wild animal show and has a world wide reputation for excellence. Moreover the circus comes with new equipment, which cost into the thousands of dollars. Some of it was built in foreign workshops by the best artists, sculptors and spectacle originators of the old world. Every inch of the ten acres of canvas, every costume, every one of the elaborate vehicles—in fact every piece of property—is entirely new.

This is the first time in the history of the Al. G. Barnes circus that it has come forth from winter quarters new from start to finish. It has not retained even so much as a quarter pole of the old outfit.

The menagerie is stocked with jungle-bred animals, with the aim of keeping on exhibition only those rare creatures which in the past have been considered too expensive for circus purposes and with just enough of the common zoological exhibits on display to make the menagerie a complete exposition of natural history.

It will be the first big circus of the year and brings hundreds of costly features.

REVOLVING FUND URGED AS AID TO FARM LOAN PLAN

WASHINGTON, May 4.—A revolving fund to be used in handling land bank bonds has been asked of congress by the National Grange, the American Farm Bureau Federation, the Farmers' Union and other agricultural groups.

It is sought as an amendment to the federal farm loan act, along with four other changes which farm leaders believe necessary to increase the usefulness of the farm loan system.

As proposed, the fund would be used to purchase bonds during periods of financial distress and hold them until the market became more favorable.

L. J. Taber, master of the National Grange, said in presenting the new farm loan bill that the problem is not alone one of marketing bonds, but of preventing real estate and frozen assets from crippling the loaning efficiency of the banks.

"When interest rates are soaring," he said, "it is impossible to market farm loan bonds. Too, during periods of unusual losses and when real estate holdings have increased, marketing is sometimes difficult. It is during just such periods that agriculture is in the greatest need of a reservoir of credit at reasonable rates."

Other proposed amendments would make it possible for expenses of the federal farm loan board to be met in the same manner as those of the federal reserve board are met, define more clearly what constitutes a farm unit and permit a greater spread than one per cent on certain classes of loans, the excess to go to a reserve fund for the purpose of stabilizing interest rates.

The first of these latter proposals, the farm groups say, would relieve the banks of considerable expense and enable them to increase their service to farmers.

The second, they say, would be of benefit to the operators of small farms in poultry and truck territory and farms under intense cultivation which now, no matter how high their value, cannot obtain satisfactory loans.

The third proposal is based on the theory that the present spread of one per cent does not give banks in sections where loans have been great a sufficient margin of profit.

1 KILLED, 17 HURT IN MADRID CLASH

MADRID, May 5.—A battle between rioting students of the San Carlos medical college and police today resulted in a casualty, undoubtedly reported as one dead—a workman—and 17 injured. The authorities would give no official information regarding casualties or arrests.

Republican sentiment seethed in Spain today, with strong police detachments stationed at strategic points in the capital to prevent recurrence of last night's rioting between monarchists and anti-monarchists.

METHODIST PASTOR DRAWS JAIL TERM

LOS ANGELES, May 5.—The Rev. Robert P. Shuler, radio broadcasting Methodist preacher, today was sentenced to serve twenty days in the county jail for contempt of court. He was tried last week as the result of his radio criticisms of two superior court judges concerning their actions in various phases of the Julian corporation stock over-issue scandals.

Superior Judge Clair S. Tappan, before whom the preacher was tried, also imposed a fine of \$100.

Shuler was found guilty on five

counts of contempt of court for each of which a four-day jail imprisonment was imposed.

SCIONS OF FAMOUS TREE SENT TO SECRETARY HOSS

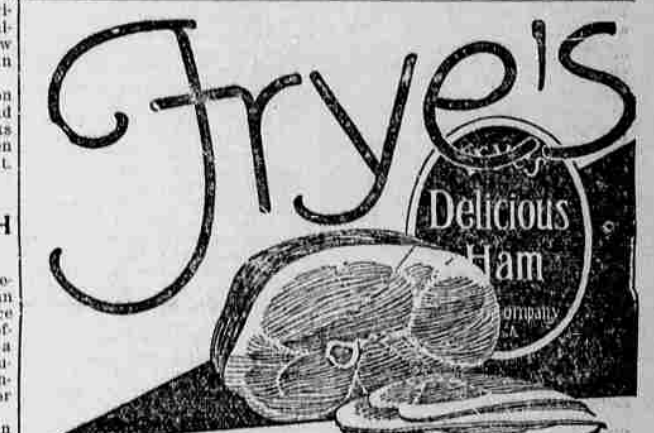
