

LAMONT SEES ROSY COLOR ON HORIZON OF U. S. BUSINESS

Over-Supply Not Serious
and Cannot Exist for
Very Long Period,
He Declares.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—(P)—
Lamont, secretary of commerce,
declared today that the over-
supply of commodities is not
serious and cannot exist for
a very long period.

In his opinion, based on ob-
servations from his official post as
well as on long and rich business ex-
perience, such an over-supply of com-
modities as now exists, as com-
pared to demand, is relatively
small. Serious as has been its ef-
fect on prices—bringing about a
fall in the general index ratios that
range from 6 to 8 per cent since
December—he is inclined to regard
the surplus as one that showing in
many lines may swiftly disappear.

"It is rather remarkable how
small a difference is needed be-
tween supply and consumption to
put a weight on prices, or conversely,
to thrust them up," Lamont
said. "We used to find in the case
of pig iron that a variation of
one or two per cent of supply over
demand or the reverse, was more
than sufficient to vary prices."

CANADA READY FOR TARIFF WAR WITH UNITED STATES

HALIFAX, N. S., May 6.—Canada
is on the eve of a tariff war with
the United States, J. H. Woods,
president of the Canadian cham-
ber of commerce, told the Halifax
board of trade at a dinner given
in his honor.

"Mr. Woods, who has just return-
ed from Washington where he ad-
dressed the United States cham-
ber of commerce, said the American
chamber was well aware of the im-
pending economic contest. He ex-
pressed faith that Canadians will
be able to meet every challenge
and hold their own in any combat
their good friends and neighbors to
the south may care to seek."

CIVIL WAR CRAFT PURPOSELY BURNED

DETROIT, May 6.—The U. S. S.
Yantic, battered old training ship
and veteran of many civil war
naval engagements, was consigned
to its final resting place in the De-
troit river today.

Taps were blown from the Yan-
tic's deck and while naval officers
stood about with bowed heads the
old ship was burned to the water's
edge. The Yantic was built as
"President Lincoln's yacht in 1863
but was turned into a gunboat.
Serving through the Civil war and
on foreign duty, the Yantic later
became a training ship for sailors
who saw service in the Spanish-
American and World wars. The
vessel was assigned to Michigan
in 1897 and served until 1922.

ABILENE, TEX., HIT BY 66-MILE WIND

ABILENE, Texas, May 6.—A se-
vere windstorm struck Abilene to-
day, a maximum velocity of sixty-
six miles being recorded.
The storm demolished the roof
and two walls of the \$10,000 gymna-
sium at McMurray college, and
some tiles were blown from the
roof of the Hilton hotel and fell
through a skylight, striking several
persons. None was injured seri-
ously.

the bank and turned over several
times. The machine was being

which we hope it will, we of this
district would probably have to
levy a three (3) mill tax, which
would raise a fund of \$15,000.00.
The county would match this
amount, the state would add \$30,
000.00 and the federal government
not less than \$40,000.00, making a
total of \$125,000.00. Douglas county
in the year 1922, of which, as stated,
our district would only have to
contribute \$15,000.00. This amount
would make possible a passable
road to Diamond Lake.

What Figuring Shows
Then in the year 1933, suppose
we voted the same millage and
would receive the same aid from
county, state and federal govern-
ment. Our highway could be wid-
ened where most needed and be
made a road that would be used
by thousands of tourists, as well as
our own people for both pleasure
and commercial purposes. This
program continued for five years
would give to Douglas county a
first class highway for all time.
What would be the total cost cov-
ering the years 1931, 1932, 1933,
1934, 1935 and 1936? Figure it up
for yourselves: 2 mills first year
and 3 mills for 5 years, a total of
17 mills, or less than three mills
each year. The total expenditure
under this program would amount
to \$770,000, of which this district
could pay \$50,000, Douglas county
the same, or state of Oregon \$160,000
and the federal government \$450,
000.00. By that time or without
doubt before this road would be of
such importance in the highways
system of the state, that it would
be taken over as a state road, for
it is now recognized by the offi-
cials of both state and federal gov-
ernment that the North Umpqua
highway will be one of the most
important trunk highways in the
Pacific coast.

Of course if we wish to continue
to remain in a "rut," while other
cities and counties are going
ahead; if we desire to see a still
further decrease in our population,
we will not our little hamlets and
go to the polls on the 18th and put
an end to the future development
of the hills on the 16th and out
of this beautiful Umpqua valley.
But I am confident that where one
will cast a vote against this im-
portant project, there will be 10
progressive citizens supporting
prosperity and development. But
remember that every one oppo-
sant will be on hand to try to kill
the proposed Interstate District,
and every friend of the proposal
must be awake to the importance
of voting.

Carnival Show Banned
A request presented by the
strawberry carnival committee
that the Browning Amusement com-
pany be permitted to bring their
carnival attractions to Roseburg
for a five-day engagement during
the week of May 18, was denied by
the council. Walter Fisher and
John McClintock, members of the
carnival committee, appeared be-
fore the council stating that a con-
tract had been signed with the
Browning company for the dates of
May 18 to 22, inclusive. When it
was decided to call off the festi-
val, the contract was cancelled, but
having made its booking for Rose-
burg the amusement company de-
sired to keep its dates here. The
committee said that it felt obli-
gated to the company to that ex-
tent and to requested permission
to bring the amusement here. The
proceeds, it was stated, would be
divided with the chamber of com-
merce, which was guaranteed \$200.
The point was brought out that
the carnival company can force its
dates here by paying the city li-
cense of \$50 per day, if it desires,
although the council can refuse
permission to use any of the

streets, for which request was
made by the committee.
The council held that outside at-
tractions, which will take large
sums of money out of town, should
not be encouraged under present
conditions and declined to grant
the permission asked by the com-
mittee.

War on Weeds
Cooperation with the Roseburg
chamber of commerce in an effort
to control grass and weeds on va-
cant lots in the city was voted by
the council. A committee com-
posed of Councilmen Harris, McKean
and Dight was appointed to work
with the chamber of commerce
committee, which was represented
before the council last night by A.
S. Coen and C. S. Heindl.

Mr. Coen, spokesman for the
chamber of commerce, stated that
it is desired to secure a general
clean-up of vacant lots this year,
and that it is hoped to secure strict
enforcement of the city ordinance
covering weed control. The coun-
cil agreed to lend its influence to
this campaign and its committee
was directed to act in co-
operation with the chamber in its
undertaking.

Dump Ground Problem
The matter of improving the
road to the city dump ground was
also given consideration. The
council was informed that its re-
cent order, providing the dump
grounds to the public for one day
each week only had not been ef-
fective and that garbage is being
hailed in and dumped promiscu-
ously, in spite of the efforts of the
manager to keep the place clean
and in order. It was reported that
various towns had been given out-
own authority of the mayor and
some of the councilmen, and that
it was impossible to keep the place
locked.

The manager stated that he was
willing to pay the expense of im-
proving the road, providing he had
authority to keep other persons
from using the road unless they
shaded in the cost of the improve-
ment. The matter was left to the
committee on health and police
with power to act.

To Ice Fountains
Councilman Wharton reported
that a careful investigation had
been made in connection with the
request of the chamber of com-
merce that ice-boxes be built into
the drinking fountains. He stated
that it had been found impossible
to provide such ice-boxes, due to
the fact that no drainage could be
secured. The committee, however,
has secured plans for a portable
type of fountain that can be put in
use during the summer months
and removed during the winter.
This fountain consists of a large
ice-box, with coils inside, and can
be connected to the water pipes
and drained into the gutter. The
committee was given authority to
secure prices on the construction
of these units and to purchase
them if the cost is deemed reason-
able.

Other Items Considered
A bill for \$29.15 for repairs to a
truck belonging to a Eugene bak-
ery company was referred to a
committee for investigation. The
Eugene truck was damaged when a
street repair truck backed into it,
smashing a fender and running
hoard and causing other damage.
Residents of Pleser street, who
recently asked the council to take
action regarding the construction
of sidewalks along that street,
were instructed to present a peti-
tion in regular form if the improve-
ment is desired.

The street department was given
instructions to clean up an
abandoned house on Winchester
street and to board up the resi-
dence. It is reported that it has
been occupied by transients and is
in a very unsanitary condition.
A proposition for the purchase
of paint for use on the lamp posts
along the main street was present-
ed by a San Francisco firm offer-
ing a special type of paint for
metal work. The council, however,
voted to purchase the paint locally.
A special committee, composed
of Councilmen Shoemaker, Whar-
ton and Hutchins, was appointed
to confer with City Attorney L. B.
Riddle regarding the refunding of
the city's bonded indebtedness
which comes due September first.
In the past this situation has
been successfully met by the re-
issuance of bonds covering the
amount of the bonds falling due.

RESOURCES OF U. S. BANKS SHOW HUGE DROP SINCE DEC. 3

WASHINGTON, May 6.—The
aggregate resources of the 7,316
national banks in the United
States, Alaska and Hawaii were
\$27,248,498,000 on March 27.
John W. Pole, comptroller of the
currency, announced the figure to-
day.

The total was a decrease of
\$1,533,985,000 since December 3,
the date of the preceding bank
call.

It also was a decrease of \$1,673,
414,000 in resources since the call
of March 27, 1929.
Loans and discounts, including
rediscounts or last March 27 were
\$11,648,750,000, a decrease of \$501-
292,000 in three months and a de-
crease of \$201,173,000 in the year.

Total deposits on March 27 were
\$21,600,578,000, a drop of \$1,332-
55,000 in three months and of
\$1,231,902,000 in the year. In the
total deposits, demand deposits
amounted to \$10,264,021,000 and
time deposits were \$8,514,864,000.
In the time deposits, savings de-
posits totaled \$6,041,194,000 and
represented 15,576,492 savings ac-
counts.

Capital stock paid in was shown
to be \$1,704,480,000, a decrease of
\$65,000 in three months but an in-
crease of \$71,137,000 in the year.

Surplus and undivided profits
aggregating \$2,094,739,000 showed
increase of \$49,320,600 in three
months and \$27,569,000 in the
year.
