LAST NEW PLAY MORONI OLSEN CO. HERE ON MAY 13

One more play is to be offered by the first circuit repertory company of the Moroni Olsen players, before disbanding and leaving the circuit that it has established in the past seven seasons. That is, one more new play. It will be Philip Barry's "White Wings," which will close the season with the superb tour and will come to this city at the Antlers Theatre Tuesday, May 13, under the auspices of the Roseburg Klans club. There will be a fall tour to follow, as a farewell, but this tour will bring a revival of St. John Ervine's, "The Ship." Moroni Olsen will direct the production, which is to be the most pretentious and, so far as staging

goods, the most difficult that the company has ever taken on the road. It will require an augmented cast that will bring back the entire personnel of the company with which the followers of the players have become familiar in the past seasons. "White Wings" is an ironic fragment from American folk history, covering the span between 1855 and 1915, during which civilization was turning over the horse and buggy to motor driven vehicles. It is none the less accurate in its portrayal of the fluid and fermenting spirit of those times, because it treats it in the manner of burlesque. The Inch family, loyal adherents to the horse drawn civilization, and "white wings" represent the negative and conservative spirit of those times, just as the Todd family pushing forward with automobile development, represents the spirit that drove the inches into the discard. The comedy is twisted merrily around the pathetic love affair of Archie Inch, "white wing," and Mary Todd, progressive daughter of the progressive inventor.

SENATOR JOSEPH SETS MAY 10 FOR ROSEBURG SPEECH

Senator George W. Joseph, who in order to meet the demands for speaking engagements throughout the state, has found it necessary to press Tex Rankin, famous aviator, and his airplane into service in eastern and southern Oregon, will speak on the issues of his campaign at the Knights of Pythias Hall in Roseburg at 8 o'clock the evening of May 10th. The cardinal planks in Senator Joseph's platform are: freedom of speech and justice; abolition of the public service commission, and government, state or municipal development of water power resources without cost to the taxpayers. Among the constructive measures which he introduced where the bill creating a state highway board which was the forerunner of the present splendid highway system, and a resolution recommending the adoption of the women's suffrage constitutional amendment. He was also instrumental during these legislative sessions in blocking attempts made to undermine the direct primary law, the initiative, referendum and recall. Senator Joseph was born in California in 1872 of Scotch-Irish parentage and when a youngster moved to Lake County, Oregon, where he worked his way through school and read law. He was admitted to practice in 1892. His grandfather on his mother's side of the family was Reverend George W. Heath, a pioneer Methodist minister after whom Senator Joseph was named.

MAKE LEARNING ACCESSIBLE

The democratic civilization of our state becomes really modern only as it discards the rule-of-thumb and substitutes the rule of research.

The large-scale business and industrial organizations of the United States know this, and they are in position to spend millions of dollars in putting a research basis under their policies and their methods. But in all our states there are hundreds of small businesses and less opulent occupational groups which cannot afford to employ great research staffs. And yet the stability and worth of the social and economic life of the nation would be vastly increased if they could.

It has always seemed to me, therefore, that good social statesmanship must devise ways and means of enabling the smallest business man, or farmer, or manufacturer, or labor group in any of our states, to have access to just as good research counsel as the United States Steel corporation or the General Electric are able to employ.

Here, I think, is one of the important functions of the state university as it is being developed in the United States. I like to say to the state of Wisconsin that we are developing there the University of Wisconsin rather than a university in Wisconsin. And there may be a genuine difference between the two.

A university in Wisconsin might justifiably concern itself only with the development of a culture for men's leisure hours; the University of Wisconsin must concern itself with a culture for men's working hours as well.

A university in Wisconsin might specialize in the culture of the ages; the University of Wisconsin must help the people of the state in the conflicts of the hour.—Glenn Frank, president Wisconsin university, in the Christian Science Monitor, April 19, 1930.
