ABORTION TEST TO PROTECT HERDS AT NEXT STATE FAIR

SALEM, Ore., May 7.—The Oregon state fair will be the first state fair in the United States to require the infectious abortion test for all dairy cattle exhibited, and no dairy animals having the disease will be allowed on the grounds. Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, said today that a resolution covering this ruling has been adopted by the fair board. It will be effective this year.

It is believed the requirement will increase the number of dairy animals exhibited for the reason that herds from outside the state, whose owners have heretofore kept them away from the fair because of danger of infection, will now bring them to the state.

Beef animals will not come under the requirement this year since they will be judged in the open, as in previous years, and will not come in contact with the dairy animals.

A MAN WHO GREW GREATER THROUGH DEFEAT

The appointment of Charles Evans Hughes as Chief Justice of the United States, caps a public career of extraordinary range and significance. To look at him, or to talk with him or to read about his early life, you would not suspect that this son of a Baptist minister, a plodding professor of law for some years before the insurance investigation pitched him into public life, was destined for any such role as fate had in store for him.

Yet Mr. Hughes' career has been nothing if not dramatic, from the moment when he so greatly relieved the minds of the reactionary bosses of New York by accepting a post on the Supreme Court. Some of his friends felt at that time that where the court had gained they had lost a great leader. It looked to them as if he had entered a monastery. Then, suddenly, after six years he resigned from the court to accept the republican nomination for the Presidency. It hardly seems fourteen years ago that that ill-omened campaign marched to its extraordinary conclusion on the night when Mr. Hughes went to bed thinking himself President-elect and woke up the next morning a private citizen.



The incident would appeal to the philosophers no less than to the historians. Few men are called upon in the course of their mortal careers to suffer so bitter a disappointment. The ambitious Mr. Hughes, rather, it served, as hard blows had served his New England ancestors, to strengthen his character, and perhaps to broaden his understanding and sympathy. For five years he resigned the practice of law. Then he returned to the public life of Washington as Secretary of State in the cabinet of Warren Harding, ready for that dramatic entry on the world's stage when he rose at the opening session of the conference on the limitation of armaments to propose the sinking of the mine of war.—Harold Phelps Stokes in the New York Times Feb. 16, 1929.

SHOW AT ANTLERS IS RIOTOUS FILM OF LAUGHS, MUSIC

If you don't like an evening of laughter, if you don't like superb acting, if you don't like an unusual show, then you won't like "The Golden Calf" which opened a three-day run at the Antlers last night.

This show is full of laughter, contains superb acting and is unusual. El Brendel, the imitable Swede of "The Cockeyed World," "Sunny Side Up" and "Hot for Paris," furnishes the laughter. He's even funnier that in the other three pictures. Marjorie White, who also made a name for herself in "Sunny Side Up" helps El keep the audience in an uproar.

Sue Carol, the feminine star, does most of the acting, although Jack Mulhall is good in his role. The story concerns a search for a perfect leg (the golden calf). Sue Carol as the demure artist's stenographer who is secretly in love with her employer and who yearns to win the prize for having the golden calf. When she finds that her leg actually measures perfect according to the specifications in the contest she is not privileged to get measured because her artist employer considers her impossible on account of her old-fashioned dress and ways.

How she overcomes this obstacle, is changed to a flashing beauty and finally wins the laurels in the contest forms the major part of the interesting plot.

The musical numbers are excellent, particularly the modernistic revue scene. No picture ever had a larger variety of legs and it's a picnic to see El Brendel acting the part of a judge of perfect calves. Don't go to "The Golden Calf" unless you want to laugh.
