

EXPERT TALKS ON EXISTING SLUMP IN SHEEP MARKET

Betterment Not Expected Soon, R. L. Clark Says; Consign Only Fat Lambs, Advice.

At the call of the Myrtle Creek Livestock Shipping association, a large number of sheep owners assembled at Myrtle Creek grange hall last Tuesday evening, to discuss the marketing of lambs and methods to be used to meet the present unfavorable situation.

R. L. Clark, secretary of the Portland livestock exchange, was the principal speaker. He stated that while the sheep business is in one of those temporary depressions which come in all industries, at more or less regular intervals, he is of the opinion that the present situation will be of comparatively short duration, and will not prove disastrous if handled properly.

According to Mr. Clark, the present situation in the lamb market is very unsatisfactory, and not likely to improve at an early date. Market demands are for fat lambs only, and growers are advised to send no feeder lambs at this time. In view of the circumstances, lambs should be sent to the market as rapidly as they attain the proper finish and weigh as much as 50 pounds.

The growers in the Myrtle Creek section were complimented by Mr. Clark on their foresight in forming the shipping association, as in this manner lambs can be graded and marketed as a unit, and as readily as they reach the proper weight and finish, and sold at favorable prices.

Three Needs Cited.

In Mr. Clark's opinion the three factors which will aid in solving the present problems in lamb marketing are: (1) Organization; (2) fuller use of the telephone and telegraph; (3) rapid transportation.

H. A. Lindgren, extension animal husbandman, urged the growers to give more consideration to feeding of lambs. If top prices are desired, he stressed the importance of early lambing to make full use of the good feed conditions existing for the three or four months period previous to the coming of the dry season. According to Mr. Lindgren, a system of "green feeding" is being successfully used to supplement the grass with small amounts of grain, and may be profitably adopted by many Douglas county sheep owners.

Growers were further advised to sell the lambs while they are still "milk fat," and before they start to lose in weight, which usually occurs sometime in July.

Marketing Success.

The Myrtle Creek Livestock Shipping association was organized in 1929 by J. C. Leedy, county agent, cooperating with the agricultural commission of the Myrtle Creek grange, and has been very successful in marketing lambs.

The first shipment for the present season was made May 5, when a truck load was sent to the Portland market and sold for \$10.50 per hundred weight.

The membership of the association is rapidly increasing, according to a report given at the meeting, and several thousand lambs are expected to be handled during the season.

The present officers of the association are: T. L. Brewer, president; E. V. Weber, treasurer and secretary; T. R. Dunnivan, R. W. Alsmuth, Hans Weaver and Lynn Hurst, directors.

PRISON JAMS, STIFF PENALTIES ARE HIT BY WICKERSHAM

WASHINGTON, May 8.—Present methods of dealing with criminal offenders were assailed before the American Law Institute today by Chairman Wickersham, of the Hoover law enforcement commission.

Chief Justice Hughes praised the institute for its fact finding endeavors concerning a "restatement of the common law," which he said would need to be carried on for years.

With these facts, the chief justice said "even legislation may become intelligent."

Wickersham said the "present day practice" of endeavoring to prevent crimes by augmented penalties, "was based upon a fallacy which has time and again been demonstrated."

"Pending the discussion of this subject," he added, "men and women are being sent to prison to languish, over-crowded, unsanitary and unwholesome institutions, under conditions which cry aloud to high heaven for immediate improvement."

He cited the recent disastrous fire at the Columbus, Ohio, prison. Wickersham said he "would not have the construction of new, fairly decent and adequate prisons wait upon the reformation of the penal laws, and other holocausts."

CHURCH FUND NOT USED POLITICALLY, CANNON DECLARES

DALLAS, Texas, May 8.—Bishop James Cannon Jr., chairman of the Southern Methodist Episcopal church board of temperance and social reform, reported to the church convention today that his activities against Alfred E. Smith in the last presidential campaign were "taken as a private citizen and not as chairman of the board."

"The chairman of the board,"

said the report, "did actively and openly oppose the election of Governor Smith as a man who had actively supported the liquor traffic. In taking this action he was acting as an individual citizen with a record of forty years of active anti-liquor warfare. No funds of the board were used by the chairman. The board itself took no part in the campaign."

CONSTABULARY AND FILIPINOS BATTLE; 4 DIE, 22 WOUNDED

MANILA, May 8.—The Philippine constabulary clashed tonight with Moro outlaws on the island of Mindanao in the most severe fighting in many months.

One constabulary officer and three privates were killed and three officers and fifteen privates were wounded. The fighting continued in the mountainous Kawayan district.

The injured included the American captain, J. R. Grinstead, commander of Lanna province. Although his wound was in the leg, it was thought it might result fatally. The officer killed was Lieutenant A. C. Maynes, a Filipino.

The fighting, which started last night, is still in progress. The Moros are firmly entrenched in a fort and are fully provided with firearms. All constabulary companies in the Kawayan district have been called to the fight.

The Moro casualties and the size of their force are not known. Their number, however, must be large to have resisted so long the well armed constabulary troops.

The outlaws include men wanted for various crimes. They have given the authorities trouble constantly.

WILD BOYS STEAL TRUCK OF PRODUCE

PORTLAND, May 8.—The mystery of a missing truck containing \$2000 in produce was said by police today to have been cleared up today with the arrest of two youths, Jack Armstrong, 17, and Robert Lillie, 18. Officers are searching for Vernon Levy, 15, driver of the truck, which was owned by John Cawood, vegetable dealer. Cawood had hired Levy to drive the truck. The boy and the truck disappeared Tuesday.

Armstrong and Lillie told police they accompanied Levy to Newport and back to a point between Willamina and Grand Ronde where the truck was abandoned.

Lillie is held under \$1000 bond on a charge of larceny of an automobile. Armstrong, under a similar charge, was turned over to the juvenile court. Police say the three youths are on parole from the state training school at Woodburn.

ality of visitors. That the north Umpqua road would attract travel to the Umpqua valley is shown by the increasing popularity of Diamond lake and Crater lake among tourists—tourists who would rather come down the Umpqua river to the Pacific highway or the coast highway than travel back over the same road twice.

Crater Guests Increase

Crater lake is one of the outstanding sights of the world and attracts an increasing number of tourists each year. The count of tourists bound for Crater lake made at Prospect, Oregon, according to figures from the Oregon Journal, are as follows:

Diamond lake is a veritable city in the summer months. A population equal to that of Roseburg may be found there, and 74 per cent of the cars bear California license plates. It is estimated that \$75,000 worth of supplies for Diamond lake alone would come from and through Roseburg because of its nearness.

State Figures Show

Non-resident cars coming into Oregon from other states by years are as follows:

From this table the rapidly growing importance of tourist travel may readily be seen. Going to the \$25,000,000 income left in the state by tourists and comparing this amount with the total produce in the state amounting to \$175,000,000, one more quickly appreciates the real value of tourists to any community.

Oregon Gets Little

That Oregon does not get the most from its tourists is indicated by the following table of comparison with California:

Estimates of all tourist cars from other states (including cars missed in actual registration)—
Ore., 165,000; Calif., 170,000.
Popular estimates of money spent by tourists from out-of-state—
Ore., \$25,000,000; Calif., \$400,000,000.

Estimate of amount spent by people in each car—Ore., \$147; Calif., \$235.

Estimated ration of dollars from approximately the same number of tourists—Ore., \$1; Calif., \$16.

How is it that in the state of California tourists spend money at the rate of \$235.00 a car when in Ore. they spend only \$147 a car? Following men will tell you of overbearing conversations among tourists in which they boast of the number of miles they covered the previous day. In brief, Oregon highways are used either to "shoot" through the state or just to "dip" into the state for a novelty. Little effort has been made to get these tourists to stay for any length of time.

Neighbors Compoete

In California there are more than 2,000,000 automobiles licensed, and out of them all only 60,000, or 3 per cent, come into Oregon. Of this 60,000, or 3 per cent, only about half of them get as far north as Roseburg, according to a recently published account.

Medford and Klamath Falls both claim Crater lake and Diamond lake as their attractions. When one of our residents was in Klamath Falls and said that Diamond lake was in Douglas county, the retort was that it did the county no good as the people cannot get to the lake. The Medford Chamber of Commerce some time ago went on record as favoring improvement of the road from the Crater lake highway to Diamond lake.

What better deal could this North Umpqua road district do than help build an outlet for these tourists, and encourage them to use the Pacific highway and the coast highway for their return trip?

ed them to disperse. Instead, the crowd, increasing in numbers every minute, refused and the police were ordered to open fire.

In an instant the fury of the mob was unleashed. The fire of the troops was returned with missiles. The mob surged forward. The small detachment of officers was thrust aside.

News of the clash spread rapidly throughout the area. In the night, wine shop picketers, who earlier had been warned to disperse, joined in the affray, and their non-violent attitude changed to violence. One group started a fire. Others quickly took the cue and soon the business section of Sholapur was dotted with fires, adding to the confusion.

The city of Sholapur is about 165 miles from Poona and in 1931 had a population of about 120,000. It manufactures silk and cotton and has a steam weaving and spinning mill. With the opening of the railway in 1859, Sholapur became a trade center for a large extent of surrounding country. Sholapur has a small port built in 1945. The city was partly pulled down in 1872.

Gandhi Removed to Fort

LONDON, May 8.—An exchange telegram dispatch from Bombay today said that Mahatma Gandhi had been removed secretly during the night from Yeroda prison, Poona, to Parandhar, where Shilpa, a famous fortress, is located. Parandhar is a military station, twenty-five miles from Poona. Parandhar hills has two forts, one situated about 300 feet below the summit, which is about 4,500 feet above sea level. Both forts are protected by perpendicular embankments.

Parandhar was attacked and captured by the British in March, 1818 and is still used as convalescent hospital for troops and a sanatorium for summer visitors.

Four hours after the regular breakfast hour, the convicts in the stockade, where one lone tent survived the fire, had not been fed. Colonel Haubrich said, "We are too busy doing other things to feed them."

Identification Chaos

The two men who met death from bullets had escaped death narrowly in the tragic fire. Both were injured during the blaze, and had been released from the hospital only a few days ago.

Prison officials and National guardsmen were finding it an almost impossible task to identify any of the prisoners. Many of the men changed shirts since the disorders started, and all shirt tag numbers are hopelessly involved. Fingerprint checks must be made before the identity of most of the convicts will be established definitely, it was said. When questioned as to their names, most prisoners refused to answer.

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today, except the woolen mill and machine shop.

Incendiary Act Seen

"In the first red glow I discerned a man wearing a prison cap pass from one tent to another, firing them with burning paper," said an unnamed prison guard. "Then others joined him, pushing one tent against another, already ablaze, until the whole place was afire. Many of the convicts pulled their beds and cots to safety. There was no open disorder. As the fire died out so did their spirit."

Ed Sullivan and Russel Thomas, long termers, were taken from the stockade after the tents were destroyed and placed in the "hole," a dungeon-like block of cells.
