

AERIAL CARNIVAL PLANNED HERE BY WORLD WAR VETS

Fifty-Plane Exhibit Will
Appear in Roseburg If
Needed Guarantees
Are Obtained.

An aerial carnival, sponsored by the National Aeronautic association, consisting of from 40 to 50 airplanes, may be brought to Roseburg during the early summer, provided sufficient local interest is shown to guarantee the event. Umbona post of the American Legion, it is stated, is prepared to sponsor the air circus, providing there is an assurance that necessary funds can be raised to finance the post from suffering a financial loss.

The national association is arranging a tour of the states of Idaho, Oregon and Washington. There will be probably 50 planes in the group, with all types of aircraft from the one-place army and navy pursuit planes and two passenger sport planes to the giant tri-motored ships.

There will be two "stunt" teams, one composed of professional acrobatic fliers and the other composed of army and navy fliers, who will demonstrate various maneuvers and stunt flying. The air circus will not only be entertaining, but will also be an excellent education, particularly for boys and girls, who will become better acquainted with the growing industry.

This tour is sponsored by a national association and is a non-profit enterprise, as its purpose is to better educate the public with regard to aircraft and create a mindness on the part of the people in the communities visited.

The pilots and passengers included in the tour will pay their own individual expenses, but the various communities are asked to guarantee the expense of the carnival in each community and the cost of flying from place to place.

The cost is apportioned on a basis of population, and Roseburg is asked to guarantee \$250 cash, together with a limited amount of fuel for the planes, free transportation to and from the airport for the members of the party, and to provide guards for the planes and police for handling the crowds to prevent injury to spectators.

Practically all of the larger towns of the three states have already signed up for the tour, which will be the greatest aeronautic show ever attempted in this section. Many private planes will probably join the group in Washington and Oregon, so that the number of ships may be considerably increased over the quota definitely assured.

In the event there is sufficient local sentiment to justify staging the spectacle here, a scout plane, bearing officials of the association, is prepared to come to Roseburg to assist in arranging preliminary matters and to give further details and particulars of this mammoth air tour.

OREGON PROGRESS SHOWN IN REPORT OF STATE CHAMBER

Township developments, sales of large acreages for specialized crops, new payrolls and "canned" butter manufacturing are all mentioned in the monthly report of the state chamber of commerce just released. For the first four months of 1930, Manager W. G. Ide's report shows 219 families located in all sections of the state who purchased 43,826 acres of land and invested in all forms of property a total of \$339,544. In Lane county B. W. Doyle, Los Angeles, and local parties have started a township operation near Sweet Home on a 1000-acre tract to house employees of contemplated mill developments, expected when the Oregon Electric railway starts building its extensions this month. The San Diego Fruit & Produce Co., has also started operations on a 500-acre tract in Coos county purchased for \$140,000 to grow peaches and to men and tractor are preparing soil to produce 75 cars, worth \$200,000, to be shipped in September when other centers are off the market. Swift & company have started the manufacture of a high quality butter at Redmond that will be canned and shipped long distances. A new payroll at Salem will afford employment within 90 days to many local people and an outlet for the waste from flax milling operations when the Western Paper Board Products company gets into production. A La Grande business man has started a large cherry orchard and has 1919 of a total of 2000 cherry trees planted. The monthly report also shows that 749 families have written that they will come to Oregon this year and locate permanently.

FOREST BLAKELEY FUNERAL WILL BE HELD ON FRIDAY

Funeral services for Forest S. Blakeley, one of the best known residents of the Glide district, who died in Portland Tuesday, will be held Friday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock from the Roseburg Undertaking Co. parlors. Rev. C. A. Edwards will officiate and interment will take place at the Oak Creek cemetery, where the Glide grange will conduct the burial service.

Mr. Blakeley was born at Glide, October 22, 1878, the son of Samuel and Matilda Blakeley, who came to Oregon from Iowa in 1852. He was married October 11, 1902, to Elizabeth Shrum, who is also a member of an old pioneer family of this county.

He is survived by his widow and one daughter, Mrs. George Casebeer, and by three brothers, Arthur, Lester and Robert Blakeley, all of Glide, and two sisters, Mrs. John Alexander of Glide and Mrs. W. J. Garner of Dallas, Oregon.

Mr. Blakeley spent his entire life engaged in farming in the Glide district. He was active in the work of the Glide grange, of which he was a charter member.

COMEDY TO SHOW HERE MAY 13 WINS PRAISE OF CRITIC

Unusually favorable press comment is being given by Portland reviewers to the Moroni Olsen players' comedy, "White Wings," now being shown in Portland, which will be offered at the Antlers theatre Tuesday, May 13, under the auspices of the Roseburg Kiwanis club. The reserved seat sale for this show opens Monday, and persons holding tickets should reserve their seats at the Antlers box office at that time.

Harold Hunt, dramatic critic for the Oregon Daily Journal, speaks of the show as follows:

And the horse ran away with the show! If you will pardon a paraphrase of a nursery rhyme that just would pop into mind with every appearance of Joseph, favorite steed of Herbert, the cabby, in "White Wings."

But before we tell more of Joseph and the other characters of this delightful four-act satire in which the Moroni Olsen players opened their last appearance in Portland for the current season at the Studio building theatre Monday night, let us consider this play in comparison with the two in which these players appeared earlier in the season.

"White Wings" is, without question, by far the best of the trio from an audience viewpoint, for it is not an historical play, nor is it a psychological drama, of the type of "The Makropoulos Secret."

Instead, it is a comedy based on the eternal combat between the old and the new in life, between those who find conditions of their day satisfactory and cannot bring themselves to take up the new and keep step with modern civilization.

It is a comedy, but not of the hilarious, farcical type that convulses an audience. Rather it is the kind that keeps one chuckling to himself, that sends one away with jolly recollections of bright lines and situations, to laugh far more heartily, probably, at the recollection than at the actual presentation.

It is a satirical poke at those who saw in the automobile, in the days when the new universal necessity was a coughing, scolding, temperamental infant, only a passing fancy, one that could never supplant their beloved horses. And, to typify this generation, the author, Philip Barry characterized these as the "white wings" that aristocracy of street sweepers once prominent in the affairs of a great city. On the other side, he drew a picture of the proponents of the automobile, considered insane fools by those who lived in the past. And between the two he built up a romance, the youth being the last of the line of "white wings," sworn to uphold the traditions of his ancestors, the girl a daughter of one of the "insane fools." How this romance finally was brought to a happy conclusion when the girl ended the life of Joseph, the last of the horses, is the thread of the plot.
