One of the important events in the club calendar of the week was the meeting of the Roseburg Woman's club on Tuesday afternoon at which time officers for the coming year were elected.

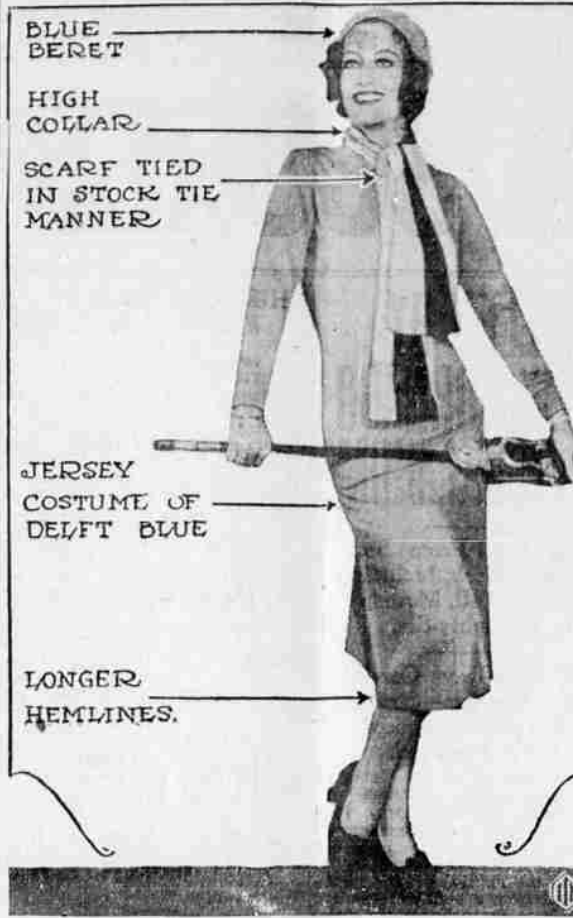
