

## FIRE SAFEGUARDS RECOMMENDED FOR PRISON AT SALEM

SALEM, Ore., May 9.—(Special)—A new pumping plant, an auxiliary high pressure water system, new heating plant, sprinkler system in various departments new roofing for the main building and the organization of a fire brigade are among the principal recommendations of State Fire Marshal Clare A. Lee as a means of affording emergency fire protection for the Oregon state penitentiary.

These improvements, with other fire protective equipment and safe guards throughout the plant, however, are suggested only as a temporary protection for the lives of the inmates and the great property values at risk. The report says: "Permanent relief will not be realized until a new building, or group of buildings is constructed after modern plans, of fire resistive materials and provided with standard fire equipment." While no cost estimate is embraced in the report, Fire Marshal Lee states that the recommended improvements and safeguards will aggregate thousands of dollars.

The report is the result of a complete survey of the state prison plant made by order of the state fire marshal, at the request of the prison administration, which request was prompted by the deep concern for the safety of the inmates of the institution under the serious over-crowded conditions, following the dreadful holocaust at the Columbus, Ohio, prison when 229 prisoners lost their lives from fire and smoke and heat suffocation. Since the survey was made, Superintendent Myers has already begun compliance with some of the recommendations suggested, with limited funds at hand, among the most important of which are the furnishing of fire doors off the stairway of the new administration building and the installation of a fire resistive ceiling in the garage outside the walls, over which sleeping quarters are provided to relieve congested conditions in the main building.

The Oregon penitentiary was constructed in 1871, to accommodate a maximum population of 500. The population at the time of the survey, the report states, was 897 and, at the present rate of increase, (forty per cent for the past two years) it is estimated that the number of inmates will reach 1,200 within the next two years.

Dempsey is recovering at the Mayo clinic following a minor operation.

"Carriers," Dempsey said when questioned about the big Italian "has not fought anyone tough enough to give a real indication, but a man of his size must be considered."

"Max Schmeling will be a close match for Jack Sharkey," Dempsey continued; "the fight will be so close that only when all the little things that happen during the training period have been considered we will be able to guess accurately on the winner."

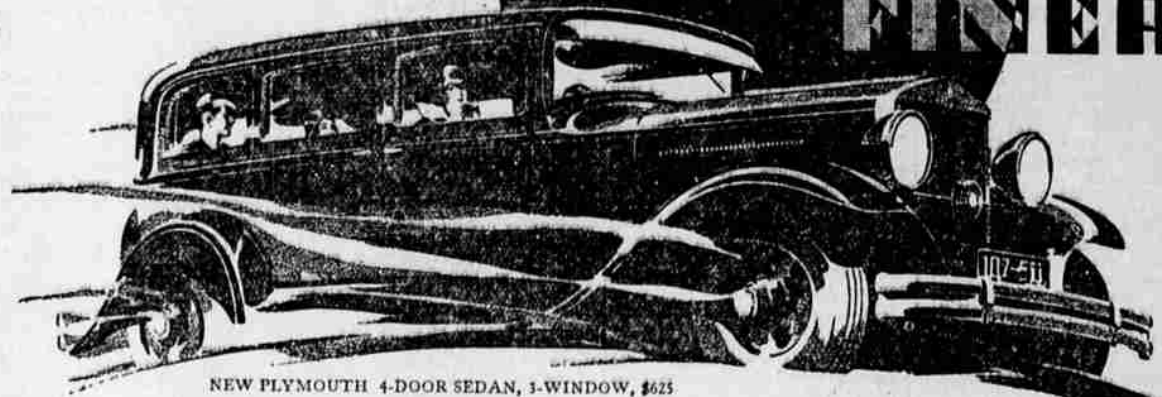
