

BISHOP CANNON PUTS WET ISSUE IN CONFERENCE

DALLAS, Tex., May 11.—Although under fire by fellow churchmen for his professed political and prohibition activities, Bishop James Cannon Jr., of Washington, today was believed to have succeeded in taking the prohibition enforcement issue to the floor of the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, in session here.

Meeting in the absence of its chairman, Josephus Daniels, of Raleigh, N. C., former secretary of the navy, the committee on temperance and social service yesterday indicated it would immediately send back for consideration the report of Bishop Cannon, made in his capacity as chairman of the standing board of temperance and social service.

In making his recommendations, the bishop urged that congress be memorialized to take more stringent enforcement action, and that the United States supreme court be praised for its attitude toward "suppression of the entire liquor traffic."

Daniels and the aggressive bishop previously crossed verbal swords over the latter's proposal to sanction the congressional and supreme court expressions without the formality of sending them to committee.

Political Charges
Considerable uncertainty was voiced among delegates in regard to their attitude toward accusations of the Rev. Rembert G. Smith, of Washington, Ga., that the Washington church leader and three other bishops had indulged in "unwarranted" political activities in 1923.

Bishops Cannon, Edwin D. Mounson and John M. Moore were charged with violation of a church rule laid down in 1734, providing equal rights for Roman Catholic citizens. Bishop H. M. Dubose also was accused of undue political activity.

The first three churchmen were alleged to have attacked ex-Governor Alfred E. Smith, democratic presidential nominee in 1928, "not only because he favored modification of the dry laws but also because he was a member of the Roman Catholic church."

Little concern over the accusations has been shown by the bishops.

Bishop Cannon and Bishop Mounson said they did not have any statements to make, and Bishop Moore was equally reticent, declaring he "couldn't know what to say if I said anything."

Bishop Dubose said the "most serious view that can possibly be taken on the charges are that the actions alleged were the common place of citizenship rights and privilege under the law."

"I simply exercised my right to vote my conviction in the presidential campaign of 1928 and urged my neighbors and friends to do the same," he said.

CHURCHMEN SCORE MOB'S VIOLENCE

DALLAS, Texas, May 10.—A resolution deploring mob action at Sherman, Texas, yesterday, when George Hughes, negro, was crucified, and reaffirming lasting opposition to all mob violence was adopted unanimously by the quadrennial conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, today.

The resolution termed the occurrence a "shocking affair" which the conference viewed with a "sense of horror."

PENDLETON "PUG" PROVES FUGITIVE

PENDLETON, Ore., May 9.—George (Curley) Scott, alias Clayton D. Foote, Jack O'Day and George E. Bell, an escaped prisoner, was arrested by deputy sheriffs at a ranch near Pendleton today. He is being held for federal officers from Alcatraz Island prison, from which he escaped in 1927. He was serving a five-year sentence for assault, robbery and desertion from the army. He is a boxer of considerable ability and had appeared on several cards in Pendleton.

INLAND EMPIRE BANK CHAIN TO ENLARGE

SPOKANE, Wash., May 11.—The Chronicle said yesterday that negotiations are almost completed for the affiliation of the American Trust company of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, with the Old National Banking corporation of Spokane. The merger would add to the Old National deposits about \$1,250,000 and the American would be the 24th bank in the Old National chain of inland empire institutions. The Old National corporation resources would be increased to more than \$44,000,000.

TORNADO IN TEXAS KILLS AND INJURES

AUSTIN, Tex., May 11.—One man was known to be dead and several others were reported injured in a tornado which struck Anderson Bend, thirty miles north of here yesterday. The storm was accompanied by heavy rainstorm. S. W. Tucker, 36, was killed when struck by a timber. Harold Johnson, of Anderson Bend, was seriously injured and four others slightly hurt. Tucker, Johnson and others were in a house when the storm broke. Johnson was pinned under a truck which blew over on him as he was fleeing through a yard.

OREGON'S WEALTHY GET INCOME FROM STOCKS AND BONDS

SALEM, Ore., May 11.—Wealthy people of Oregon derive most of their income from stocks and bonds, according to figures compiled by the state tax commission on the basis of returns under the intangibles tax act. The smallest incomes from intangibles are from notes and mortgages.

The total number of persons paying the tax up to this time is 18,487, and they paid on a total income of \$21,318,724.98. The amount of the tax at 5 per cent after the \$200 exemption for each taxpayer is up to this time \$907,065.78.

The returns show that 13 persons paid on incomes of over \$50,000. The source of the total tax payments received have been classified as follows: dividends on stocks \$8,719,629.88; interest on notes and mortgages, \$6,923,736.77; interest on municipal bonds, \$2,346,344.32; interest on corporation bonds, \$2,336,299.30; interest on bank deposits, \$921,465.51 miscellaneous, \$971,249.12.

CHINESE BANDITS BURN AND MURDER ON GREAT SCALE

SHANGHAI, May 11.—Following previous dispatches reporting the massacre of 15,000 inhabitants of Yungyang in Honan province, April 23, other Chinese press dispatches today stated that bandit armies had destroyed 500 villages in central Honan, the inhabitants being "murdered, kidnapped and outraged to unknown numbers, while the countryside was reduced to desolation."

Flames of the burning villages, it was said, lasted for four days and could be seen for many miles. Many of those kidnapped were murdered and their mutilated bodies flung into creeks or left in the roadways.

The brigands were opposed by nationalist government troops, but only a few outlaws were killed.

The notorious "Widow Chang" was believed to be the leader of a party of 200 brigands.

COLOMBIA BANDITS SLAY AN AMERICAN

BOGOTA, Colombia, May 11.—Advice from Bucaramanga today reported the killing of Paul Keating, described as paymaster for the Tropical Oil company.

Keating, accompanied by a police guard, was traveling in a pay car near a place called Centro, carrying payroll funds amounting to 35,000 pesos (about \$33,350).

When the workmen had gathered to receive their wages, two robbers opened fire with revolvers on the paymaster and his guard, killing them. The robbers then seized the pay car and compelled the driver to speed away. Later they put off the driver and continued their flight.

The police have started a hunt and spread the alarm through the country.

OIL CITY, Pa., May 11.—Paul LeRoy Keating, who was killed by bandits at Barranca Bermeja, Colombia, left here for Colombia in the employ of the Tropical Oil company October 30. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard J. Keating.

Keating's body will be returned to Oil City. The Tropical Oil company is a subsidiary of the International Petroleum company of Canada.

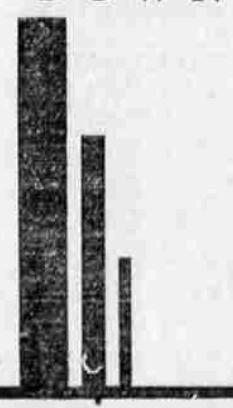
