CHINESE REBELS BADLY DEFEATED

SHANGHAI, May 14.—The nationalist government armies today captured 10,000 northern rebels and hurled the invading forces out of Anhwei province, government dispatches announced.

Numerous field guns and seven thousand rifles were seized, said the dispatches, as the government troops pressed back the foe in northwest Anhwei and along the railway west of Suchoo to across the Honan province border.

The nationalists, said Nanking advices, are attacking Kweichow and expect by its capture to shatter the northern alliance rebel resistance in eastern Honan province.

Fall of the city would cause the rebels' retreat westward to center their defenses about Keifeng, it is claimed.

EIGHT AMERICAN "DEBS" TO GREET BRITISH RULERS

(Associated Press London Wire)

LONDON, May 14.—Eight American debutantes will achieve one of society's pinnacles tonight with presentation to King George and Queen Mary in the first royal court of the year at Buckingham palace.

Mrs. Charles G. Dawes, wife of the ambassador, will make the presentation. The girls, in court dress, will curtsy their acknowledgment of the royal favor.

For the first time in two years King George will be present. Last year the Prince of Wales stood by the side of his mother, Queen Mary, during the ceremony. Eight hundred British and foreign guests will be present.

Twenty-five American women were picked from 300 applicants for presentation during the season's five courts. At the second court tomorrow night two girls and six married women will be presented.

For weeks the debutantes have practiced the curtsy, the manipulation of the long court train, how to balance three feathers atop their heads and how to back away from their majesties without tripping.

Most of those introduced will wear white, but the older women to be introduced later in most cases have chosen colors.

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WESTERN OREGON PRUNES, CHERRIES STILL DROPPING

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

PORTLAND, Ore., May 14.—The summary of weather and crop conditions in Oregon for the week ending May 13 was issued by the United States Department of agriculture, weather bureau, today and indicated that temperature was subnormal most of the week, but became higher at the close.

The crop report follows:

Cereals: Conditions were generally favorable for wheat; winter wheat and barley heading in the middle districts; some local damage was done to barley by frost in elevated districts. Planting corn continues but the weather has been too cool for good germination.

Fruits: Apples are setting well and pears in southern districts are doing well except for some hail injury. Dropping of prunes and cherries continues in western counties; in eastern counties prunes are in good condition. Much damage was done to pears and strawberries by frost in the upper Hood river valley. Strawberries are being marketed in increasing quantities, but ripening has been delayed by cool weather.

Meadows, pastures and ranges: Pastures and ranges are furnishing abundant feed. The weather has been too cool for alfalfa and clover, and some frost damage occurred to alfalfa in elevated districts; the first cutting of alfalfa is in progress in southern counties.

Livestock: Stock continues to move to summer ranges, and all stock is making good gains. Shearing was somewhat delayed by unfavorable weather.

Miscellaneous: Potatoes are garden truck were somewhat injured by frost in localities. Some early planted melons failed to come up, owing to low temperature. Peas are coming into market.

APPLICATIONS FOR AUTO LICENSE ARE MAILED AT SALEM

SALEM, Ore., May 14.—Nearly 300,000 application forms for motor vehicle licenses are being placed in the mail this week by the secretary of state preparatory for the annual registration, which, for the first time, will be due July 1. The 1929 legislature changed the date from January 1.

The new license plates will be black with orange numerals and letters. With the exception of trucks operating under the motor transportation act, passenger cars and trucks will carry the same kind of plates. Trucks operating under the transportation act will be indicated by the letter "M" before the numerals.

SALEM VETS SEEK AIRLINE SAFETY

SALEM, Ore., May 14.—The state department of the American Legion will be asked to incorporate a platform looking towards the safe guarding of airlines by the state highway department, a resolution to this effect being adopted by Capital Post, No. 9 Tuesday night. The resolution asks the 1931 legislature to enact a measure giving the highway department full authority over aerial travel and to enable it to prevent the erection of hazards near landing fields.
