and L. B. Sandblast, both Portland, and both republicans.

**Cashow Has 2 Rivals**

C. A. Howard, Salem, superintendent of public instruction, runs unopposed. For position number five on the supreme court two republicans are seeking to unseat Oliver P. Cashow Roseburg, Ore., democratic incumbent. The republicans are James U. Campbell, Oregon City, and George S. Shepherd, Portland. Harry H. Bell, Salem, incumbent, runs unopposed for position number six. C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner, also is unopposed.

Because of the apathetic attitude of the electorate, political observers who have followed many Oregon elections, have refrained from outwardly attempting to select the winner of the nomination for the gubernatorial post. All are agreed, however, that since filings closed at the state house, the contest for governor had simmered down to three candidates and possibly four.

**County Forecasts**

Political observers said that from the populated areas of the state and scattered reports from rural districts, it was indicated the race had boiled down to a tight race between Corbett, Norblad, Joseph and possibly Hall, on the republican side and Bailey and Wilbur in the democratic camp.

In Klamath county, political observers said, Corbett seems to have a safe majority. Norblad and Joseph, they said, were runners-up. Conditions in Umatilla county are considered unstable with some quiet but progressive campaigning broadening the scope of Corbett and Norblad. Observers said that Joseph and Hall had made some impressive appearances during their swings under the region. Wilbur and Bailey, with the former man holding a slight advantage, apparently will run a very close race.

Electoral indifference in Union and Wallowa counties has caused prognosticators to keep a wary eye in that direction. Although they said Corbett appeared to be the favorite with the republicans and Wilbur with the democrats, Hall and Joseph are giving Norblad a stiff contest for second place.

Marion county, reports indicated, sees Norblad entering the home stretch leading by a neck with Corbett and Joseph running a close second. Bailey, they said, is an easy Marion county choice of the democrats.

Jackson county observers predicted a race between Corbett and Norblad with Corbett leading "by a nose." Observers qualified this statement with the possibility of a "surprise" at the eleventh hour. Hall, whose house-to-house campaign in Medford and Jackson county stood him in good stead, was reported a good second and Joseph "no better than fourth."

**Roseburg for Corbett**

Support of the various candidates in the rural districts of Douglas county is relatively unknown. Hall has some quiet workers in the field and there is a marked leaning in some sections toward Joseph. How Corbett and Norblad will run in the rural districts, observers said, cannot be predicted, but in the city of Roseburg Corbett has the most active following. Bailey, it was predicted, will be an easy victor.

## FLYER DROWNS ON HAWAIIAN COAST

HONOLULU, May 15.—One man perished of the thirteen army and navy fliers whose planes were caught yesterday on the rough waves between the islands of Maui and Oahu. The twelve others were rescued. Staff Sergeant Joe Becker of Brooklyn, N. Y., was drowned.

The Pelican picked up Lieutenant U. G. Jones and Walter Myers from their hapless amphibian army plane, one of the three aircraft which landed in the dangerous channel yesterday in an attempt to save the four fliers of a big army bomber which had been forced down.

The amphibian had drifted about 40 miles from the spots where it landed and was found twenty miles southwest of the island of Kahoolawe. The crews of another army amphibian and of a navy seaplane containing four naval fliers and two of the ill-fated bomber's crew were picked up last night by the steamer Hawaii.

The two missing fliers were members of the bomber's crew of four. Which two they were was not known here.

**SILLY**, of course. Tragically silly. The absurd things men will do in anger are a perpetual source of amazement to all intelligent people. But before condemning this silly old man in Richmond too severely for his hasty temper, think of this: The world war, with all its terrible consequences, with all its grief and suffering and horror, arose out of causes that were fundamentally as TRIFLING and SILLY as the quarrel which led this old man in Richmond to kill his fellow veteran.

**DID** you catch this item, contained in a dispatch from Salem: "With state property taxes already lower than they have been for 17 years, Oregon taxpayers may enjoy the prospect of another very material reduction on all property taxes because of the ACTUAL REVENUES to the state from the excise and intangibles taxes, which are exceeding the fondest expectations of their sponsors."

**THE** excise and intangibles taxes, which are income taxes under another name, may not be perfect and probably need some amendment to cure defects that develop in practice.

**BUT DON'T FORGET THIS:** They are beginning already to reduce the excessive burden of taxation on real estate—which is what they were intended to do.
