GLENDALE MAN TO MAKE SEARCH FOR LOST MINE

Will Endeavor to Locate Rich Prospect in Josephine County Described by Dying Friend.

GLENDALE, May 15.—Seeking a lost mine, or to be exact, the lead to a possibly rich gold mine, Frank Hughes and William L. Barton, veteran prospectors, led by L. C. Bayse, left here Tuesday on a prospecting trip through some of the hills of southwestern Josephine county.

Bayse is taking a lay off for the first time in six years from his duties in charge of the oil pumping station of the Southern Pacific company here. He is qualified as a "sourdough" miner as he worked on the placers in the Waldo district for ten years before engaging in railroad work.

A number of years ago Jim Tiller, now dead, told Bayse about a certain spring that he discovered while soldiering in that portion of the country about 50 years ago. The gravel in this spring was rich in small nuggets and "colored." Tiller told no one of his find at the time as he intended to come back later to trace out the surface showing and file a mining claim accordingly. Circumstances prevented him from returning to this section of the country for many years.

When he did it was so changed that even though he had carefully noted his surroundings he was unable to find the spring with the golden sands in its bottom. A few years before his death Tiller told his friend Bayse about his early day find and gave him a description from memory of the approximate location. As a number of rich mines have been found in the Waldo district, for years the scene of the largest placer operations in Oregon, this section is well known for its mineral possibilities. It is quite possible that Tiller did make a rich find.

Now on his first vacation for many years Bayse is on a quest for a spring, the lost soldier's dream that will lead him to fortune. His Glendale friends say that as a prospector Bayse is a better rummy player.

JAPANESE ENVOY TO U. S. PRAISES NAVAL AGREEMENT

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

PORTLAND, Ore., May 15.—Katsuji Debuchi, Japanese ambassador to the United States, who arrived here yesterday on a four-day visit, today lauded the London naval conference as a "guaranty of world peace."

The ambassador, accompanied by Mrs. Debuchi, said that the conference removed two sources of international misunderstanding between Japan and the United States—business competition and naval competition. "In business the United States and Japan are not rivals," the ambassador said. "We are always interdependent as regards business in many lines; for instance, we sell raw silk to your country where are located the finest silk mills. The United States in turn sells the manufactured silk to all parts of the world."

Mr. Debuchi said Japan was "very fortunate" to sign the naval treaty at Washington, but it only affected battleships and battle cruisers. "Unfortunately it did not apply to auxiliary warships," he said, "but the four-power treaty did fix up for the east the matter of fortifications which was a great step for friendly relationships." Turning from naval supremacy, the ambassador said that Japan was feeling the urge of modernization. Dancing, he said, was becoming a vogue as in Europe and America. Mr. and Mrs. Debuchi were entertained at various private and public functions.
