Poppy Seed Sale to Be Held May 28th and 29th

The annual Memorial Day poppy sale will be held in Roseburg on May 28th and 29th. This poppy sale sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary serves a double purpose. By wearing the Flanders poppy we honor the dead and serve the living. The poppy symbolizes the sacrificial blood of our departed heroes and the proceeds from the sale are used for needy ex-service men and their families. Sergeant Alvin York, the most outstanding hero of the World war, will make an appeal for the poppy sale over the National Broadcasting company and thirty-five associated stations in a coast-to-coast hook-up on May 25th. Umqua unit is endeavoring to sell three thousand poppies this year. In a few days the chairman of the sale in the several towns will be announced. Every poppy sold in the state of Oregon by the American Legion Auxiliary has been made by a non-compensated disabled service man with a family. The label on the poppy indicates that it was made in the only veterans' hospital in Oregon. These patients in the Portland hospital are paid one cent each for assembling or putting together this poppy. Many times these poppies are made year after year by a patient who has not been able to earn a penny of his own other than by the making of the poppies. 140,000 poppies have been made this year in the Portland hospital, thus allowing these patients to earn \$1,400.00.
