

STOLEN CHICAGO BONDS VALUED AT \$75,000 RECOVERED

Los Angeles Officers Also Arrest Woman, Charged With Participation in 1929 Crime.

LOS ANGELES, May 16.—Bonds valued at \$75,000 identified as those stolen from the office of A. E. Brant, Chicago, Ill., broker, in March, 1929, were in the possession of the police today. The larger part of the loot, \$49,000 worth, was recovered from a Los Angeles broker, who told police he got them from Miss Hilda White, 26, who was arrested after 25 of the \$1000 bonds were seized in her apartment.

The other \$1000 bond was recovered through a Los Angeles bank, where its coupon had been cashed by a man whose identity the police withheld. They said the Chicago police had informed them of the cashing of this coupon, identified by them as having been clipped from one of the stolen bonds.

The unidentified man, the police said, declared he obtained the bond from the broker, who in turn said he came into possession of 50 of the bonds by answering a "blind ad" in a newspaper.

Subsequent telephone talks with another man, the broker reported, resulted in delivery of the bonds by a young woman he identified as Miss White. The broker declared he traded other negotiable securities for the bonds.

Miss White, who is under arrest on a charge of receiving stolen property, was apprehended in the lobby of a Los Angeles hotel, where she had an apartment. She declared the \$75,000 worth of bonds were given to her by a man named Robert Riddell, who she believed now is in Oregon. The police said her description of Riddell agreed with that given in Chicago police circulars of Max Berman, one of the alleged bond thieves.

Police throughout Oregon have been asked to watch for Berman, Riddell, and Louis Arnold, also suspected of participating in the theft.

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PEACE MOVEMENT BEGUN IN INDIA

BOMBAY, India, May 16.—Indian peace prospects brightened today when announcement was made in liberal quarters of an early expected government move for negotiations with Mahatma Gandhi, civil disobedience prisoner. A government meeting at Bombay and a secret session of the all-India congress, held simultaneously, proposed decisive action in some direction. It was declared, before the week-end.

While these reports were going abroad, Mme. Sarojini Naidu, successor of the Mahatma and Abbas Tyabji, was arrested early today for attempting a salt raid at Dharasana and shortly afterward set at liberty.

Violent rioting occurred late yesterday at Munsingh, Bengal, in which about 9 persons were injured. The clash occurred over delivery of liquor and herbs used to make liquor, for the government depot to retail shops.

Raid on the Dharasana salt pans by small parties today continued to be attempted but without success.

Young Campbell was employed as chore boy on the farm. Campbell, authorities said, confessed setting off the dynamite because they child-had him about his studies.
