

DOUGLAS COUNTY FOR GEO. JOSEPH AT THE PRIMARY

Multnomah Senator Has 71 Lead Over Corbett in Complete Returns; Norblad Third.

Bailey, Democratic Victor, Has More Than Three Rivals Combined; Pierce Wins.

Douglas is included in the list of Oregon counties won at last Friday's primary by George W. Joseph, republican nominee for governor. Complete unofficial returns from all of the 53 precincts in the county give Joseph a plurality of 71 votes over his nearest competitor, Harry L. Corbett. Governor Norblad was a close third, trailing Corbett by 28.

Douglas county was also with the winner of the gubernatorial nomination on the democratic ticket, State Senator Edward F. Bailey of Junction City. Lane county was out of a total of 859 votes. Bailey received 496, or 123 more than the grand total cast for his three competitors. Douglas democratic also contributed to the overthrow of Oswald West as national committeeman for the party, piling up a majority of 181 for his opponent, Walter M. Pierce.

Republicans of the county voted to reaffirm their present national committeeman, Ralph E. Williams, giving him a majority of 723 over his opponent, Walker. Again in common with state-wide result Douglas republicans favored J. U. Campbell for supreme judge over George S. Shepherd by a majority of 720. Campbell will be the opponent of Justice O. P. Coshov, the only democrat on the court, at the next general election.

LOG CABIN IN CALIFORNIA BIRTHPLACE OF GEO. JOSEPH

Republican Nominee For Oregon's Governor Son of Scotch Presbyterian Father While Mother Was Daughter of Methodist Minister—Projected Into Campaign by Recommendation For Disbarment.

George W. Joseph, republican nominee for governor of Oregon, was born in a log cabin in Modoc county, California. His father, Edwin Worthington Joseph, was a native of Zanesville, Ohio, and of a Scotch Presbyterian family. His mother, Della Jane Heath, was the daughter of the Rev. George W. Heath, a pioneer Oregon Methodist minister.

Young George received his education at the Lakeview, Ore., high school and entered the law office of W. A. Wilshire of Lakeview. In the early 90's he came to Portland and read law in the offices of Watson, Hume and Watson, being admitted to the bar in 1893.

Joseph joined the Klondike rush and spent a year in the Alaskan gold fields. Returning he again practiced law in partnership with Julius Meier, until the latter became a member of Meier and Frank.

Joseph's political career began in 1910 when he was elected to the state senate from Multnomah county. He did not seek re-election until 1920 when he was again elected to the senate and served two terms.
