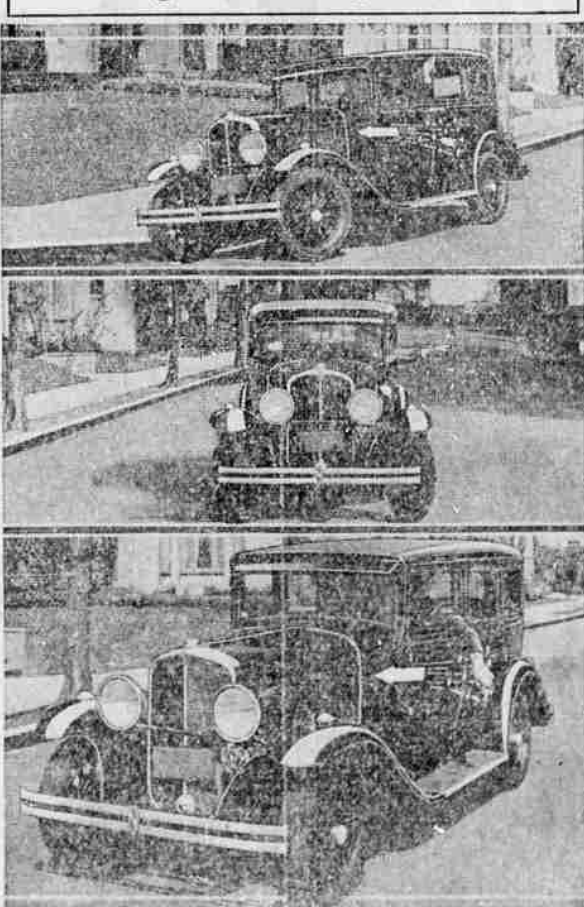

U. S. COURTS MUST AWAIT ACTION BY I. C. C. ON RATES

WASHINGTON, May 19.—The important ruling was made today by the supreme court that federal courts are without authority to prevent state railroad rates from taking effect pending action on them by the interstate commerce commission.

The decision was handed down in an appeal brought by the North Dakota board of railroad commissioners, to set aside an injunction granted by a federal court, preventing North Dakota from putting into effect in July, 1929, lower distributing or jobbing class rates between certain points in that state.

The commissioners were supported by the public service commissions of 37 other states.

The court pointed out that injunctions by federal courts restraining state railroad rates from taking effect until acted on by the interstate commerce commission would have the effect of indefinitely tying the hands of such state commissions.

The Great Northern and other railroads challenged the new state rates before the interstate commerce commission, contending that the reductions ordered would discriminate against interstate commerce.

The new rates were to take effect in July, 1929, but the railroads obtained from a statutory three judge federal court an order suspending them until the interstate commerce commission could pass on them.

The railroads defended the injunction on the ground that it prevented them from the injuries they would have suffered if the rates should take effect and then be declared discriminatory by the commission.

The public service commissions of 37 states were permitted to file a brief in which they contended that should the injunction be approved such commissions might as well go out of existence.

The North Dakota board attacked the injunction on the ground that the federal courts had no jurisdiction to suspend state rates declared a contrary ruling would substantially destroy the power to regulate state rates.

Would Drop One Link
WASHINGTON, D. C., May 19.—Permission to abandon 25 miles of railroad from Robinsonette to Homestead on the Snake river was sought from the interstate commerce commission by the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company today. The application said the line was unprofitable and would require heavy expenditures to keep it in service.

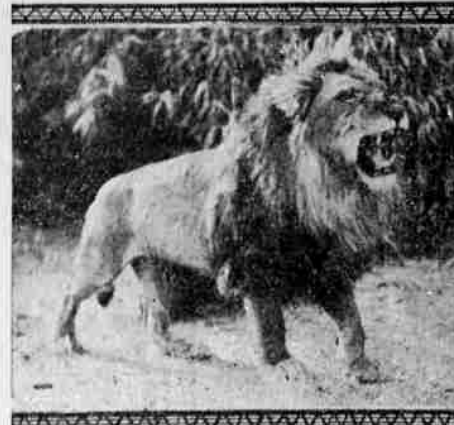
