

FLOODS INUNDATE REGIONS IN THREE SOUTHERN STATES

(Associated Press United Wire)
EL DORADO, Ark., May 20.—Flood water today covered the entire town of Calion, 16 miles from here, driving many of its 900 people to high ground.
The Rock Island railroad station was virtually the only building not reached by the overflow from the rising Ouachita river which was expected to exceed the stage it reached during the 1927 flood.
Approximately 25 families were sheltered in box cars and others in private homes not endangered by the water.
Red Cross and other relief forces which had centered their activities near Smackover turned their attention to Calion today. The water in that section covered an area ten miles square.

SHREVEPORT, La., May 20.—The Shreveport Journal was advised today by Major Robert Wood, of Jefferson, Texas, the town was inundated by flood waters from the Cypress river.
The major said water was three feet in front of his home and ranged from a few inches to five feet over the town. His family abandoned the house.
Jefferson is a town of 2,500 population.

NEW ORLEANS, May 20.—Northern Louisiana and northern central Mississippi today hoped clearing skies would alleviate the flood situation which in the past few days has inundated thousands of acres of farm land.
In the Red river valley about two hundred families were homeless, and many were being rescued by farmers living in the uplands. One negro was drowned near Rodessa when caught by the swift current of Black Bayou, while trying to cross an overflowed stretch.

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time they had been tried and early reports indicated some confusion. The big contests centered on the candidates for United States senator and governor, with the wet issue cutting into the calculations in a way that led seasoned observers to hesitate about forecasting the result. Campaign managers, however, all claimed victory with varying degrees of positiveness.

Grundy vs. Davis
For the senatorship, Grundy is battling to retain the seat to which he was appointed by Governor Fisher when William S. Vare was rejected by the senate. Opposing Grundy are Secretary of Labor James J. Davis, backed by the Philadelphia and Pittsburgh organizations, and Francis H. Bohlen, professor in the law school of the University of Pennsylvania.

Grundy and Davis are standing on the enforcement plank adopted at the last republican national convention and are backed as they are by Gifford Pinchot, who seeks the gubernatorial nomination. Davis is on the complete state ticket that carried Francis Shunk Brown, Philadelphia, former attorney general, for governor.

Others in the Contest
Bohlen has two associates on the "wet" ticket—Thomas W. Phillips Jr., of Butler, for governor, and Charles Dorrance, Scranton, for governor.

Pinchot, seeking the nomination for the office he filled from 1923 to 1927, has one running mate—Charles F. Armstrong, of Leechburg, a former member of the legislature and coauthor of the state prohibition enforcement act. Pinchot is a "bone dry."

Bohlen said the voters should determine what they want on controversial questions and to that end he favored a referendum to decide definitely whether the state prohibition enforcement law should be repealed or continued in force. Democratic candidates are:

PORTLAND, May 20.—Formal meetings of the grand encampment of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows of Oregon got under way here today with fifteen hundred delegates present from every Oregon county. Many other visitors were here from neighboring states. The Rebekah assembly opened this morning with the seating of the grand officers. This was followed by conferring the assembly degree, the flag ceremony and a tribute to presidents.

A special session of the grand lodge to confer the grand degree will be held at 4 p. m. Patriarchs Militant of the Odd-fellow organization met yesterday to appoint committees. Degrees were conferred in the afternoon. Officers of this organization are elected biannually, and will be named next year. S. E. Watkins of Newberg is adjutant.

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which is its first south of the equator.

Plans were to fly over the four land groups which lie between the Iberian peninsula and Brazil, although weather conditions might cause alteration of the route. It was expected to drop a bag of mail at Tenerife, Canary Islands, 750 miles from here, and at San Vicente, Cape Verde Islands, 845 miles further southwest.

Aboard the Graf as she sailed today was a large quantity of last minute mail which arrived in two planes from Germany. These planes took off this forenoon and escorted the Zeppelin when she left the field.

All Space Occupied

After thorough tests had been made of the motors, Dr. Eckener signaled to Captain Ernest A. Lehmann who gave the word to begin the voyage. The zeppelin soared away from her ground position and presently dumped her water ballast in a great shower. This gave impetus to her rise but drenched the crowd below. The people laughed it off as the price of seeing the historic event.

There was not an inch of spare space left aboard the zeppelin. A large amount of mail had to be left behind. There was neither room nor postage for it, the civil guard, crack police force, was delegated to watch for stowaways. The officer in command was asked if any had been found. He emphasized his negative reply.

dola of his ship. "I shall take a direct line to the city, passing over Tenerife, Canary Islands, and the Cape Verde Islands."

The passengers were delighted with the crowd which came with the early day-break to see the start of the trip. All the color of Seville and Andalusia was there. Gypsy horsemen in their native costumes came in from the hills, and priests from La Rabida, where Columbus in the days of his persecution was sheltered, came with facsimiles of Columbus documents. The crew of the Zeppelin took some of them and later released them from the air to the great delight of the crowd below.

Heavy detachments of the guardia civil in tri-cornered hats and olive green uniforms patrolled the field and kept spectators within bounds. Several hundred soldiers, some in resplendent Spanish uniform, were about also. They remained at the field all night ready to aid in looting the Graf.

Weather Favorable
Throughout the night new supplies, fuel, water ballast, and mail and cargo were loaded onto the Zeppelin. So much mail came for the transatlantic trip, that some Spanish post offices ran out of stamps. The last things put aboard just before 8 a. m. today were a bag of potatoes and a can of olive oil. Weather conditions were ideal.

Dr. Jeronimo Mejias, veteran of previous Zeppelin flights, King Alfonso's personal physician, leaned from a cabin window and unfurled a Spanish flag as the airship rose. The crowd applauded vigorously. Lieutenant Colonel Ferrera threw a bouquet of flowers through the window to his wife. The Infanta Alfonso of Orleans threw kisses to his wife.

Alfonso, a crack airplane pilot, about 44, set out upon his journey with only two suitcases and a small paper bundle, because of limited space.

As the Graf zeppelin pointed her nose seaward from Seville today, she began a voyage into a new part of the world for dirigibles. This will be the first time that the Graf will find itself south of the Equator and the first opportunity South Americans will have to see the huge ship.

The South Atlantic, over which the Graf is now cruising, has been crossed nine times by airplanes. The first flight was made in 1922 by Captain Saaduro and Coutino, Portuguese, from Lisbon to Rio Janeiro by way of the Canary Islands.

"You are hard put this morning to get something on the anti-saloon league," he remarked to Blaine.

Yardstick for Candidate

The "score card" would grade candidates for office as follows: General appearance, five points; intellectual qualifications, 10 points; ability as a public speaker, 10 points; morality, prohibition sentiment and practices, 50 points; record as an official or in civic enterprises, 15 points; church affiliations, two points; family relations, two points; observation of Sabbath, two points; associations and kind of company kept, two points; membership in lodges and fraternal societies, two points.

Previously the anti-saloon league superintendent presented a statement of the organization's attitude toward public officials. It read:

"We steadfastly believe in that constitutionally guaranteed right of the people peaceably to assemble and petition the government for redress of grievances."

"In harmony with the spirit of that guarantee we confidently assert our right as American citizens so to state our convictions as to day these convictions on the consciences of those state and national legislators and officials who
