FINAL FRENCH UNIT QUITTING GERMANY

MAYENCE, Germany, May 20.—Evacuation of the Rhineland by the French army of occupation today entered upon its last phase, with movement of the first of 40,000 troops. Complete evacuation was scheduled before June 30.

In accordance with an order issued by the supreme command of the French army of the Rhineland yesterday, the smaller places were to be freed of military control first.

The French war office made it known that Weisbaden, Mayence, and other larger cities would not be liberated until the very end.

Already during the recent months about 20,000 troops have been quietly withdrawn, leaving 40,000 to evacuate by June 30.

TODAY'S MARKETS

PORTLAND, May 20.—Commodity prices hit the downward slide today.

Butter and butterfat declined in each, making the price of extras in butter, 35c and of butterfat delivered, 24c.

The price of sugar was reduced 2c following a similar cut by California refiners. This makes cane fruit and berry sugar \$1.90 and beet sugar \$1.75.

Egg prices were weak, but unchanged.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture says:

Portland's wholesale fruit and vegetable market opened the week with active trading and general firmness in asparagus, peas, strawberries, apples, and citrus fruits. Local asparagus and strawberries were in light supply. Peas from the

Dalles were more plentiful, and moved to retailers at 99c per lb. California peas are decreasing in volume.

Lettuce supplies are almost entirely from Oregon points now. At Brooks, Oregon, where several cars of lettuce were expected for shipment at this time, blight has so reduced the yield that there will be few, if any, carlots shipped.

Local beets, turnips, etc., are displacing California's offerings, and will soon dominate the market.

Total potato loadings of 500 to 1000 cars daily are discouraging to holders of old potatoes in storage. Prices are generally 25c to 30c per cwt. lower than prevailed a month ago, both at northwestern shipping points, and at Pacific coast terminal markets. Twenty-five cars of new potatoes passed northward through Roseville Saturday and Sunday, assuring the northwest of liberal supplies in the immediate future.

When Mr. Rawleigh made his home there about five years ago, he found little in the way of natural advantages or suitable surroundings to stimulate the latent desire to cultivate the earth. His home was one in a long row of similar dwellings built on swamp land that had been partly filled with ashes and rubbish by the municipality.

Undaunted by these circumstances, Mr. Rawleigh determined to construct a wonderful garden as he could. He allotted himself five years to complete the task, rebuilding the garden each year, eliminating defects. The garden of the fourth year was the prize winner, but the fifth garden already well constructed, will be better than them all, he holds.

Mr. Rawleigh is a genius with his plants, nearly all of which he raised from seedlings in his commodious sun-porch and basement. His roses started blooming on May 26 and were with him until Dec. 15. The water lilies in the pool were blooming into October. He believes that the secret of his success lies in heating all water which reaches the plants until it is of the same warmth that nature breathes into the spring rains. In the fall after the frosts come, he reverses the process and puts cold water in the sprinkler.—News story from Buffalo, New York, April 21, 1930.
