COUNTRY HIGHWAY VITAL TO NATION

DETROIT, Mich., May 21.—Not since the busy days of "good roads" campaigns has there been any highway program of as much significance to the future of automobile and motor truck industries and the prosperity of the country as the program of the Michigan highway authorities to conduct, during the coming summer, careful counts and tabulations in 100 "sample" townships to determine the use of county and township roads.

"In planning the most intensive and complete traffic survey that has ever been made in any state, Michigan is taking the initiative in pointing the way to increased highway construction throughout the country. Commercial and agricultural organizations, public officials and industrial leaders in many states, I think, are watching the Michigan dirt road count closely and will be vitally interested in the results," Mr. Matheson continued.

"To learn something of the needs of the country roads apart from the state and federal trunk lines is, right now, of the most timely importance to industrial and agricultural prosperity.

"Super, high-speed highways and wider roads connecting the larger cities are increasingly necessary, of course, but the tremendous program of trunk line construction has progressed sufficiently to justify heading the demand of the great majority of rural residents for an extended 'farm to market' road development.

"A recent statement issued by a farm organization says that of the 6,300,000 farms in the United States, 1,928,704 are on graded and drained dirt roads, and 2,747,732 on unimproved dirt roads or a total of 4,676,436 farms, nearly five million, on dirt roads.

"The farmer must use trucks and automobiles if he is to keep up in the march of progress. According to figures prepared from records in New York state, the farmer on a dirt road uses his truck 20 per cent or 725 miles less each year than the farmer who lives on a hard-surfaced road, and his automobile 1,100 miles less. Farmers living on dirt roads not only own fewer trucks and automobiles than those living on hard-surfaced roads but are able to haul full loads on their trucks only one-half as often as farmers on paved roads.

COLUMBIA RIVER BILL OPPOSED BY WAR DEPARTMENT

(Associated Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, D. C., May 21.—Disapproval of the Steiwer bill to authorize the secretary of war to extend operations of the inland waterways corporation to the Columbia river in Oregon, is voiced by Acting Secretary Davison, who has informed Chairman Johnson that he does not favor the bill.

The main purpose of the proposed law, the acting secretary wrote, "may then be said to be to remove any restrictions now existing as to where the secretary of war may authorize operations of the inland waterways corporation, but without changing the method of procedure under which he may order the extension."

In conclusion, Mr. Davison's letter said: "It was clearly the intent of congress to limit under existing laws the field of operation of the inland waterways corporation as outlined above. The war department is not prepared to recommend legislation which would permit the secretary of war to extend these operations to sections not authorized by the law. I, therefore, do not favor passage of the bill."

ORGANIZED CRIME A DEADLY MENACE

NEW YORK, May 20.—While federal indictments against twenty-five Sicilians, in Chicago, reputed to be members of the Al Capone gang, were being returned, special investigations conducted by various organizations, among which are the Chicago crime commission and the New York World, are reported to have disclosed a large sale of the deadly Thompson sub-machine gun and increasing quantities of bullet proof glass to racketeering gangs. The gun, which sells for \$200, brings a premium of \$1000 if obtainable through legitimate channels.

The Thompson gun, a ten pound, 33 inch weapon which fires at the rate of 300 single aimed .45-caliber bullets a minute, in the opinion of ballist experts, is the most murderous portable weapon in existence, so deadly at close range that the Chicago police have discarded it as being too dangerous for work in crowded districts.

On the other hand cars with special steel bodies, and fast speed boats used by rum runners in the Detroit river, have been found fully equipped with bullet proof glass as a protective measure against both hi-jackers and coast guard raids.
