WAR MOTHERS IN FRANCE RECEIVE GERMAN SALUTE

THIAUCOURT, France, May 22.—General Otto Gessler, former minister of war in Germany, who is leading a party of former war officers on a tour of inspection of the German, French and American cemeteries war zone, stood at attention as 23 American Gold Star mothers today arrived at the gates of the St. Mihiel cemetery. The Germans clicked their heels and bowed as the mothers alighted from their buses.

The American mothers, under the impression that the former German minister and his officers who were all in civilian clothes, formed the reception committee charged with welcoming them, returned the salute. Later when informed of the identity of the party, all the mothers expressed pleasure. "They were such nice men, so gentlemanly," they said.

This was the mothers' second visit to the cemetery and they planned to spend the remainder of the day at Nancy.

Parade to the cemetery the mothers drove over the famous St. Mihiel battlefield. The guide explained to them every detail of the American attack of Sept. 11, 1918, which resulted in straightening out the St. Mihiel salient and the capture of 433 cannons and 16,000 prisoners.

The motor buses stopped at Fleury a few moments to allow the pilgrims to view the monument there erected to Franco-American fraternity of arms and then went on to Thiaucourt.

PARIS, May 22.—"All well and

happy" was the phrase from the official report sent to Paris today of every one of the five groups of American war mothers visiting various cemeteries in France.

Officials of the pilgrimage said one fear they had was that the mothers might find the change to French cooking would cause minor troubles. This had proved unfounded and the mothers have shown themselves thoroughly adaptable in this respect.

Today was a quiet one, the mothers again visiting the graves of their sons. In addition the three-Aiano group at Soissons made a special pilgrimage to place flowers on the tomb of Quentin Roosevelt. The Surtees group at Paris today visited the tomb of Napoleon.

DR. M. K. HALL DIES
