CONFEREES AGREE ON LUMBER DUTY OF \$1 A THOUSAND

Opposition Still Faced in House, but Acceptance Likely — Flexible Clause Now Up.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 21.—An agreement between house and senate tariff conferees upon a compromise rate of \$1 a thousand for dressed softwood lumber today apparently assures the most important manufactured commodity of the Pacific northwest that much protection at least, although a new fight against the lumber tariff is brewing in the house.

The \$1 rate is expected to hold the support of Senators Steiwer of Oregon and Jones of Washington for the tariff bill, but it is doubtful whether Senator Dill of Washington will vote for it. This may render the fate of the measure doubtful to the last, as it was only Dill's support which broke the senate deadlock over the flexible provisions of the bill on Monday. Then the vote was tied at 42-42 and Vice-President Curtis voted with the administration forces to break the tie.

Hawley Not Satisfied
Congressman Hawley stated after today's meeting that he was disappointed in the outcome, as all indications had pointed to a strong possibility of victory for \$1.50 lumber.

"If this tariff rate should increase the return to the manufacturer of the northwest in the amount of the duty it would mean an additional income of \$16,000,000 a year more for the industry, as we manufacture 16,000,000,000 feet of dressed lumber annually in Oregon and Washington," said Hawley. "Meanwhile we intend to make a strong campaign for an increase in the duty before the tariff commission, under the powers which will be given by this bill."

Flexible Clause Next
The conferees still have to agree upon the authority to increase tariff duties. They probably will effect a compromise which will retain the flexible powers given the president in the existing law, but may change the measure of the permitted increase from the present 50 per cent limitation to the difference between cost of production at home and abroad.

On the latter basis, it would be possible for the lumber duty to be increased more than 50 per cent, lumbermen now in Washington believe.

After the conference report has been agreed upon it will be submitted to both houses, and the senate will vote first upon acceptance of the report and passage of the tariff bill. The house will act last, which will make it extremely difficult for the republican opponents of the lumber duty to vote against the report, as in doing so they would jeopardize passage of an administration measure of tremendous importance.

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CALIFORNIA NOW FOURTH STATE IN EXPORTS VOLUME

LOS ANGELES, May 21.—California has taken fourth place among the states as a source of American exports, James A. Farrell, president of the United States Steel corporation, so declared today in opening here the 17th annual convention of the national foreign trade council of which he is chairman.

"Los Angeles, he said, 'has shown the most startling increase in foreign trade, exports having multiplied in value 200 times in fourteen years.'

Some two thousand delegates representing the leading business and manufacturing concerns of the U. S. were present for the three day convention.

Speaking on the "world trade outlook," President Farrell said:

"The international commerce of the world is passing through a period which finds no close parallel in recent years. The present rate of activity is shown to be considerably slower than that of only a few months ago. The rate of the first eight or nine months of 1929 proceeded at an unusual pace, so that despite the slackening that occurred toward the close of the year the aggregate for the full 12 months constituted a new record both for the United States and for the world.

"Our exports for 1929 approximated five and a quarter billion dollars. In volume they were the greatest ever recorded, a fact which is emphasized by consideration of the lower commodity prices which obtained generally throughout the year.

"Probably the outstanding feature of American foreign trade during the last score of years has been the marked change that has occurred in its character, the

steadily decrease in the proportion borne by raw materials and food-stuffs in the total of our exports and the corresponding increase in the proportion won by the products of manufacture.

"There is genuine encouragement of this fact for it is notable that the gain was achieved in precisely that element of our export trade that is directly responsive to merchandising enterprise and skill."

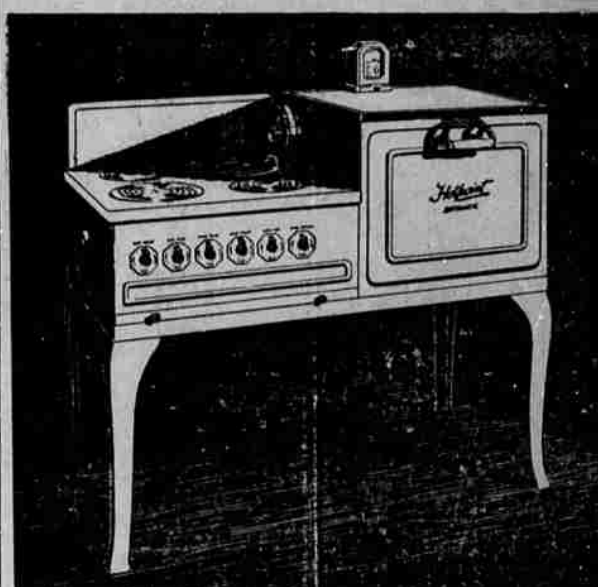
