An Act of Mercy

BISHOP JAMES CANNON, Jr., of the Methodist church, south, first denied the charges brought against him of stock market gambling, then confessed, expressed contrition and pleaded for mercy. Mercy was forthcoming, when a disciplinary committee brought a report clearing him of blame. And the committee's action was appreciated enough.

No greater degree of actual moral turpitude is involved when a bishop plays the stock market than when a layman does so, but his followers and the public look to a bishop for leadership along lines of exemplary conduct and have a right to expect it. Added to this consideration in Bishop Cannon's case was the further one that he has been pretty militant in denunciation of law and ethics in relation to the prohibition law. Those opposed to him on this issue, or some of them, were glad to see him embarrassed by exposure of his own activities in violation of moral ethics in another direction. So public clamor against him became pretty strident.

But after the bishop had confessed his fault no good purpose could have been served by unrelenting or even censuring him. It is the part of Christian forbearance to forgive in such circumstances and where shall we look for exemplification of Christian forgiveness if not to the church? Bishop Cannon has been humbled and subdued and that is enough for justice.

Grover Whalen, who left a position with a large department store which carried a salary of \$100,000 a year to become police commissioner of New York City at \$10,000 a year, has resigned his office to return to his ribbons and a life of leisure. He went into office 17 months ago with a distinct pledge to solve the Arnold Rothstein murder mystery. That mystery is as far from solution as ever. As police commissioner Mr. Whalen enunciated the dictum that "There's lots of law at the end of a night stick" and his minions acted upon it with considerable harshness in dealing with gatherings of communists and unemployed people on several occasions. In general Mr. Whalen accomplished little for the improvement of New York police conditions during his tenure. Probably nobody else could do much either under the Tammany system. It was an official city greeter when personages came to New York that Mr. Whalen shone best. In that role he is completely at home and efficient. But he will hardly be remembered long for anything constructive he has done as police commissioner.

EARLY in June men who dry Oregon prunes and sell them will meet in Eugene. The session is called by the State Horticultural society. The object is standardization.

Five recommendations have been made:

That one grade be established and that fruit not meeting the grade be sold on sample.

That moisture content be not less than 18 per cent or more than 23 per cent.

That the Weiland flotation method be used to determine maturity.

That an advertising fund be created by a levy of \$2 a ton.

That a special advertising committee be composed of representatives from the cooperative prune associations, one from the packers and a third not connected with either group but preferably a banker, who could act as treasurer.

Oregon apples need no California brand to market them as Oregon prunes long have been marketed. The apples are standardized.

Oregon potatoes, graded, are bought with confidence as to quality for cooking and as to freedom from disease when planted.

Oregon wheat is sold around the world on a federal system of grades and standards.

Oregon butter is beginning to command a greater market because of the confidence that the next legislature will pass a cream grading law that will assure returns to producers in accordance with quality.

Oregon prune growers have had difficulty not with production but with organization and sales. Here is a proposal from an official source that they follow the experience of all successful industries—rigidly standardize their product and sell it by aid of modern merchandising and advertising.

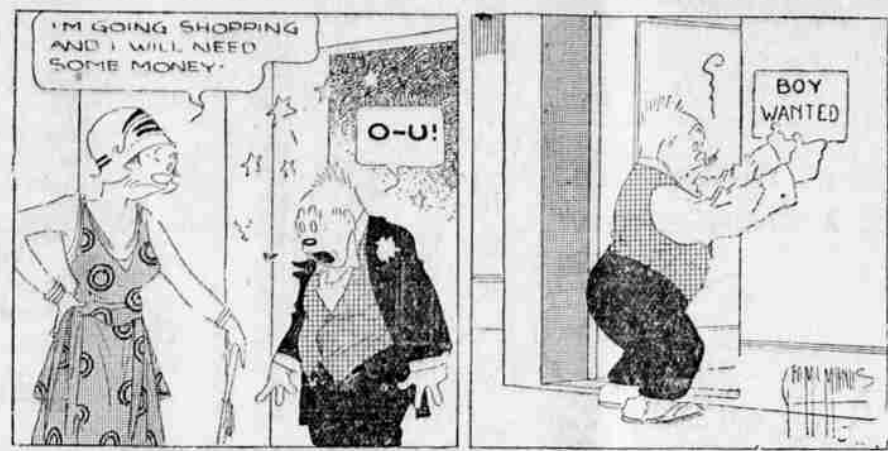
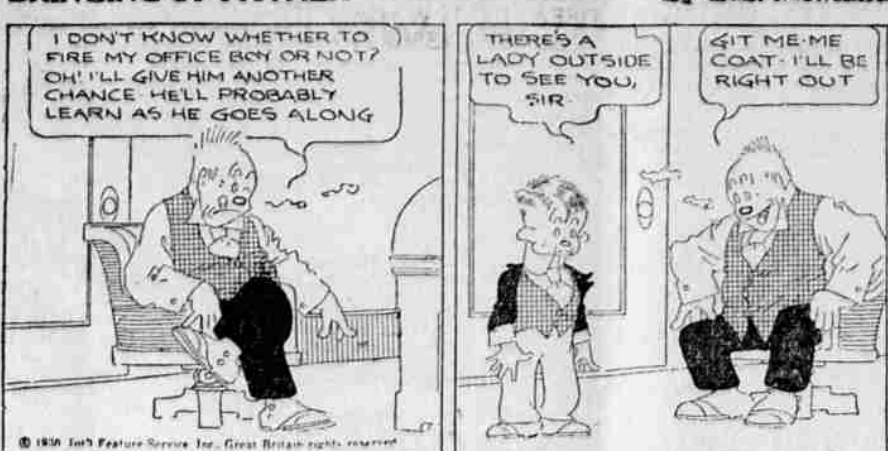
NOTED PAINTER DIES

Talks on Health

HEALTH is an important matter. Perhaps the most important thing in the world. Without it nothing seems worth while. Those who lose it would give everything to regain it.

Many persons write me during the course of a week asking about the various diseases. One letter has just come to my desk, asking about acne, that very common skin trouble of young people.

The underlying cause of acne is impaired health from one cause or another. All impurities of the skin are likely to indicate that something is wrong with the choice of foods, or with other habits of living. Neglect of the diet leads to many ills.

Acne is a disease of the "sebaceous glands." These glands are scattered over the skin, being located wherever the hair grows. At the base of each hair there are two glands. They furnish the hair with an oily or greasy material, lubricating it and keeping it soft. Without this oil the hair would be brittle and readily broken.

Many boys and girls from the age of twelve to twenty are made miserable by the skin disease commonly known as "blackheads." Pimples and hard, red sores frequently accompany this condition, a form of acne.

Very often acne is most persistent. The face is disfigured by the scars of these sores, some of which last for years. It is very embarrassing, too, for it comes at a time in life when young people are becoming interested in social life.

Improper diet has a great deal to do with acne. Children, and many adults for that matter, eat too many sweets and starches and rich foods in general. Too much fats, hot biscuits and nut sundae are sure to bring their day of reckoning. It is this sort of thing which leads to constipation.

When the diet is made up of such things there is no appetite for the very necessary foods, coarse bread and butter. No one can have good health who does not include these in the daily diet.

A person who has a bad skin should drink quantities of water. In this way the wastes of the body are carried away, as they should

be. Activity of the bowels and kidneys is most essential. Exercise in the open air, vigorous enough to cause the skin to perspire, is another important thing. Perfect cleanliness of the skin of head, face and body is very necessary. The victim of acne should take a warm bath daily, rubbing vigorously afterward with the bath towel.

Have a simple diet, with plenty of fresh vegetables and fruits, milk, cereals and only very moderate amounts of meat and fish. Be out-of-doors in the fresh air and sunshine. Get plenty of sleep. All these things are necessary to maintain good health, and as your health improves your skin should also take on a healthier condition.

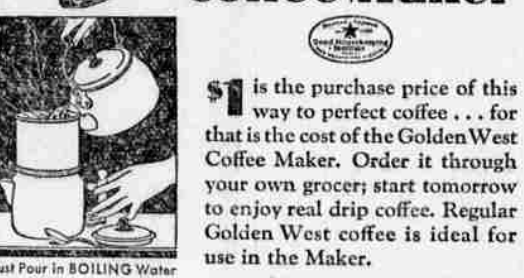
