Douglas County Pioneers Honored With Reception Given by Local D. A. R.

The Woman's club building housed an honored and honorable group of people on Saturday afternoon, May 17, the occasion being a reception given to the pioneers of Douglas county by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Words of greeting were extended by Mrs. W. M. Campbell, the vice-regent. Mrs. Dorothy Winston Landers, Miss Vera McClintock and Mrs. Ralph Church pleased the visitors with vocal solos.

Mrs. Homer Grow, Mrs. Leonard Riley, Jr., Mr. R. L. Cannon and Mr. J. B. Caldwell entertained with piano and violin selections. Hon. A. C. Masters addressed the group in a very convincing manner, his theme being the "Spirit of America" which reached its culmination when the pioneers made the trek across the pathless plains to establish the great empire of the west.

The most impressive feature of the program was the presentation of an historic flag by Mr. John B. Caldwell of Portland. This sixteen foot flag was handmade by the pioneer women of Canyonville in 1883. It has floated at half mast on three occasions of our nation's deepest mourning: The death of each of our martyred presidents, Lincoln, Garfield and McKinley.

It was the first flag seen by the children of southern Douglas county, and great was the occasion when they rode on the liberty car during the stirring days of the Civil war, with this emblem of our country floating over them.

Mr. Caldwell's wish is that this flag be preserved in a suitable case in the courthouse. He made a substantial gift toward that end. Mr. Caldwell accompanied the presentation of the gift with a speech that touched the hearts of his audience. Mrs. William Bell, custodian of the flags, accepted the flag in words that radiated keen appreciation of this priceless historic gift.

Mr. O. F. Henderson was the recipient of the gift presented by the Daughters of the American Revolution to the pioneer who has longest lived in Douglas county, he having come in 1845.
