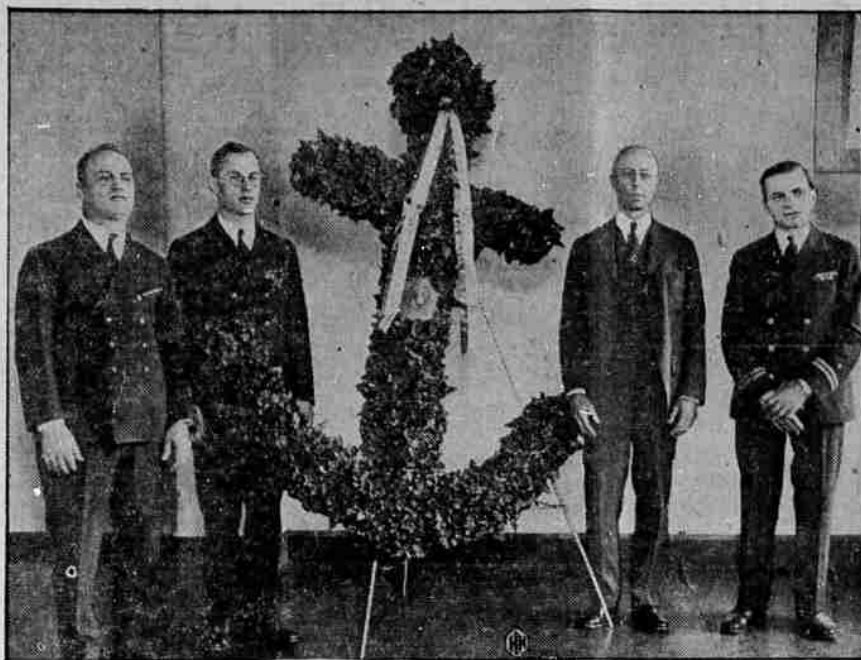

EASTERN OREGON CONDITIONS O. K. FOR RANGE STOCK

SALEM, Ore., May 25.—Early spring conditions were providential to eastern Oregon livestock men, says Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, after a 1400-mile trip through the heart of the range section of the state. Few haystacks are to be seen, except in the irrigated districts, he says, but ample spring rains have brought out range grass in abundance, and the desert is now covered with the best forage crop in years.

Little hay will be cut this year in many of the wild grass districts of central Oregon because the mountain snowfall during the winter was so light that there is little run-off of irrigation water. The spring rains have saved the situation and Lytle says the central Oregon stockman will depend upon desert feed next winter.

Sparse production of swamp and tule hay, says Lytle, will force many of the sheepmen back to the methods of 10 years ago when wintering on the desert and range lambing were common. Inter or shed lambing has not been profitable in some sections, he says.

"Sheep prices are extremely low," Dr. Lytle reports, "and sheepmen as a rule are feeling the depression. Production costs will necessarily come down another year, but this year the money had been spent before the slump came. Cattle are down in price, though not to the extent that sheep are. Abandoned stock ranches are somewhat in evidence, but the actual grazing areas of the ranches are being used. A shortage of cattle is noticeable throughout the range country."

"Getting rid of 10,000 or more wild range horses has been a boon to the interior stockman, for it means that Oregon can support 80,000 more sheep than two years ago."

Lytle says that hauling water by truck for stock enabled about 20,000 sheep to be ranged last year in a portion of the Deschutes national forest that had not previously been used for summer grazing because of water shortage. Whether the prevailing cheap lamb and wool prices will warrant this being done this summer is doubtful, Lytle says.

The lamb and calf crops are reported good, the wool clip of average quality and everything satisfactory except the price.

The health condition of eastern Oregon livestock was never better, Lytle says.

He was brought in to this city late Saturday evening to have his injuries, which are not of a serious nature, treated. Later he was taken to his parents' home in Glide.

LEGION'S ANNUAL POPPY SALE WILL OCCUR THIS WEEK

Wednesday and Thursday the Memorial day poppies will be on sale in Roseburg and every poppy worn on a coat lapel means that the wearer has thought of the boys who sleep beneath the poppies in the far away fields of Flanders. For many ex-servicemen the war is not yet over. Thousands are still living in veterans' hospitals throughout the country. Every poppy sold in the state of Oregon by the American Legion auxiliary has been made by a non-compensated disabled service man with a family. The label on the poppy indicates that it was made in the only veterans' hospital in Oregon. These patients in the Portland hospital are paid one cent each for assembling or putting together this poppy.

Many times these poppies are made year after year by a patient who has not been able to earn a penny of his own other than by making poppies. 140,000 poppies have been made this year in the Portland hospital thus allowing these patients to earn \$1,400.00. The American Legion auxiliary sponsors and finances the making of these poppies. With the exception of contributions to the national hospital and child welfare funds, every penny earned from the poppy sale is used for hospital and child welfare work in our own state. Last year \$10,000.00 was earned from the poppy sale and expended for the relief of disabled service men, their families, orphaned children of service men and in providing comforts in the veterans' hospital in Portland not supplied by the government.

It is estimated that more than 200,000 children have been left orphans since the war-children of service men. The American Legion and American Legion auxiliary are attempting to care for and educate these children. Only 36,000 of these children receive compensation from the government and none of them more than \$10.00 a month. Is it any wonder that the American Legion auxiliary needs to hold a poppy sale?
