TODAY'S MARKETS

(Associated Press Licensed Wire) PORTLAND, May 27.—Butter and butterfat prices hit the toboggan for further material declines as the produce exchange today. All grades of butter were reduced 1c and butterfat 2c. This makes extra in butterfat 2c and butterfat 2c. Portland, the lowest prices recorded in a long time. Receipts have been about 12 cars of butterfat. Storage facilities.

Prices were weak, but no changes were announced. Some reductions have been reported by independent sellers here and there, but the market was quiet. The Portland bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture says:

All fruits—apples, cantaloupes, and strawberries, in particular, are in light supply, partly due to removal of one full carload of local berries from Portland to Portland Sound points. Buyers and exporters have been able to obtain only limited supplies yet, due to the active demand for fresh berries.

The standard salad vegetables—lettuce and tomatoes—are more plentiful and are cheaper. Green peas are arriving from the Balles, and Roseburg usually, but local peas will replace these very soon. Supplies are light, and prices rather high, 80c per lb. to retailers.

California's new potato crop is about two weeks earlier than last year, and this fact is largely responsible for the slow demand for old potatoes at this time. Yakima dealers report about 12 cars of potatoes in old storage at that district. Compared with 200 cars at this time last year. Although total daily potato loadings are in the vicinity of 1000 cars, old potatoes only comprise about 100 cars, of which all but 70-80 cars daily originate in Maine.

THE DEAN OF EUROPE

Not the least of the gloomy prophecies about Ireland that have been uttered by the first few years of self-government is one concerning the president of the Free State cabinet, William T. Cosgrave. Ireland has not been wanting in gloomy prophecies from outside, particularly from across St. George's channel; but this one was a native, a colleague of the Irish, and was uttered by a man who, in 1922, were under arms trying to put down the Free State at its birth. The youthful general "Mick" Collins had just been killed by a bullet from the irregulars, leaving General Richard Mulcahy and Mr. Cosgrave to carry on. For the irregulars it was a moment of exultation, and the march to Glencree cemetery was hardly over when the staid old walls of Trinity college—a favorite, if ironic, billboard—blossomed with this verse, in white paint:

Turn over, Mick,
Make room for Dick,
And Willie's coming soon.
Perhaps the fault was not entirely with the prophet; certainly all Dublin at the time was sure the irregulars would make the words come true, if possible. Mr. Cosgrave has more than belied them, as has General Mulcahy. Mr. Cosgrave has remained in office ever since, setting a record among European heads of cabinets for length of tenure since the war; and after his recent parliamentary upset, when for a moment it looked as though his old enemy, Eamon de Valera, might replace him, he is in office with apparently a tighter hold than ever.—Clyde Beals, in the New York Times, April 15, 1929.

Gave all the land a sweet surprise.
He laid the rude shillalah down;
Let gracious smiles supplant his frown;
Let reason have her normal sway,

And anarchy soon ceased to stalk.

FISHING SEASON AT DIAMOND LAKE TO START JUNE 1

The road to Diamond lake, in central Oregon, is open and free of snow, according to Matt Ryckman, superintendent of hatcheries for the state game commission, who has returned from a tour which took him to all of the hatcheries and egg taking stations in that section of the state east of the Cascades. Diamond lake, a favorite resort for hundreds of resident and non-resident anglers, will be open for fishing June 1.

June 1 marks the close of the cougar killing contest which was inaugurated a year ago by the state game commission. At that time the office of Harold Clifford, state game warden, will make a check of the bounties paid during the twelve month period and award cash prizes amounting to \$500 to the five leaders among the cougar hunters. This contest according to Mr. Clifford, has undoubtedly accounted for the slaying of a large number of the big cats as hunters have been anxious to be termed the "cougar champion" of Oregon as well as receive a sizable sum of money in addition to their regular \$25 bounties.

CLERK PERISHES WHEN FIRE TAKES HOTEL AT BURNS

BURNS, Ore., May 26.—One man was killed, a woman injured and \$15,000 damage wrought by fire which destroyed the Grand hotel here early today.

James Brindley, 45, hotel clerk, was killed by death.

Miss Ethel Havens, of Bend, who had been working here as a waitress, suffered a broken toe and bruises and escaped from the burning building with difficulty.

Nine other occupants of the hotel escaped in their night clothing and without any of their personal belongings.

The blaze was thought to have started on the ground floor, probably in a meat market owned by J. H. Hansen, which was destroyed. The flames spread rapidly and engulfed the Hart Richardson confectionery and the H. and H. club restaurant before they were stopped. Absence of wind enabled the firemen to save the Odd Fellows building.

The hotel building, of stone and frame construction, was owned by Mrs. J. E. Rounseville. The loss was about 75 per cent covered by insurance.

Brindley was formerly a Western Union telegrapher at Spokane.

French labor insurance system in effect July 1

PARIS, May 27.—French workers earning low pay will be protected from sickness, old age and death after July 1, when the national social insurance law becomes effective.

Insurance is obligatory on all wage earners, who earn less than 1,500 francs a year. In the case of cities of 200,000 inhabitants or over the income limit is 1,800 francs.

The assessment is approximately 8 per cent for industrial workers and 2 per cent for farm workers, half to be paid by the employer and half by the worker.
